## Do you want to advertise in *The Herald*?

It is used by many residents looking for local suppliers and services. The cost of advertising has been almost unchanged for the past 15 years and so is very reasonable; between £43pa to £150pa, depending on the size of the advert. # What happens to our advertising revenue?

After covering its cost, and over its 19 years of operation, the *Herald* has distributed more than £18,000 to village causes with the four largest recipients being the school, the maintenance and fabric of the church, the Village Club and the Village Hall who together account for over 80% of funds distributed. We currently have an undistributed surplus of about £5,000.

## **Pastoral Letter**

"To be hopeful in bad times is not just foolishly romantic. It is based on the fact that human history is a history not only of cruelty, but also of compassion, sacrifice, courage, kindness. What we choose to emphasize in this complex history will determine our lives. If we see only the worst, it destroys our capacity to do something. If we remember those times and places — and there are so many — where people have behaved magnificently, this gives us the energy to act, and at least the possibility of sending this spinning top of a world in a different direction."

These are the words of Howard Zinn. An American historian, playwright, philosopher, activist and Second World War veteran. I came across his words when wondering what on earth I could write about the hope of Spring and the joy of Easter at this time of turmoil and fear in the world. I confess I have felt deeply hope*less* in recent weeks, watching the news unfold — war, violence, domination, the hunger for power — causing depths of human suffering most of us can't begin to imagine. In our farm communities around the benefice, we have those among us whose families are being directly touched by the horror of war. It is easy to feel utterly hopeless, utterly useless, in the face of what we see.

In the church at this time, we are anticipating the glorious celebration of Easter — a festival of freedom and new beginnings. The triumph of light over darkness. Life over death. Hope over despair. It may seem counter-intuitive somehow, to celebrate such a triumph when the world is in crisis. So, let me encourage you with some words from Jesus in John's Gospel. "In this world you will have trouble. But take heart! I have overcome the world."

On the cross, Jesus carried the weight of the darkness of the world on his shoulders. A weight that none of us could bear. In his Resurrection, we find hope for life beyond the darkness of the cross. Hope that is there is a better way for humanity. A way that we might learn to reflect the God in whose image we have been made.

So, as we acknowledge the awfulness of what is wrong in this world of ours, let us also look for what is magnificent. Let's remember the magnificent things of the past; the places and people who have fractured the darkness through history. And let's look out for — and join in with — the magnificent things that are happening now; the people and communities and organisations that are fracturing today's darkness with the light of Hope.

May you and your families know deep and abiding Hope in your hearts and homes this Eastertime.

A pond or water butt, an old log pile and natural food in the shape of seeds, berries, fruit and blossom, are all that's required to turn any garden into a natural habitat for an abundance of wildlife.
