Political Life Returns to St Mary's Hunton?

Not only is a memorial to the Liberal Prime Minister, Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman of Hunton Court in St Mary's marking Hunton's connection to the political life of the country but in recent days so has much of modern political life in Hunton been marked by a 'strike' in the tower and movement to the 'left and right' in the graveyard.

After a decade of silence, the strike has returned to the clock to ring out the hour during daylight hours over Hunton. In the Hunton Church History and Guide nothing is mentioned of the clock which is a sturdy piece of machinery built probably 250 years ago and still giving good time keeping with little attention required. Some years ago, the winding mechanism for the clock and the bell were replaced by electronic winding gears thus saving the daily climb to hand wind both weights. We are very grateful to one of the bell ringers in Maidstone who, hearing of the lack of strike, came down and managed to not only diagnose the fault but also solve it.

In the churchyard work has begun to straighten the headstones which have over the years decided to lean forward or back and some to the left or the right. These are very large stones and have to be treated with great respect and care, but many more now stand as erected in memory of the past of Hunton. Not only is this a safety measure but will also allow easier cutting of the grass in the old churchyard which is carried out on a regular basis by a team of grass cutters from the village. We owe a huge 'thank you' to this team and also the six or so working parties over the year who come to keep everything tidy, both within the church but also in the churchyard.

The new churchyard, so called because it was only consecrated in 1874 with the first burial dating from the late 19th century, is not included in any regular maintenance programme. This allows the spring and summer flowers to bloom before a cut in the summer and autumn and is now undergoing some tidying work and remedial attention to damaged headstones. This graveyard is still in use although spaces are getting fewer but, with cremations being much more the preferred method of funerals, the demand is reducing.

Wildlife Rescue

Having survived the night in a box in our greenhouse we delivered the bat to the wildlife hospital, where upon examination, it was found to have an ear infection! We have since checked on its progress and so far, so good. Folly Wildlife Rescue, a charity, is supported by local, knowledgeable volunteers and takes in all manner of wildlife casualties both large and small, including badgers and foxes. For that reason, I have always loved April and remember when growing up in the suburbs of London, the joy of seeing primroses and daffodils in the fields when visiting relatives in the country during the Easter holidays. The Gardening Club met on Friday 17th February for their usual Spring supper. This time there was no formal speaker, however David Heaton, Chairman of the Parish Council, updated the audience of over 30 members on plans for a series of ponds in the Parish to encourage Great Crested Newts. Hunton Court, owners of another local property and David are planning to create ponds with linked wildlife corridors to encourage the spread of animals such as the Great Crested Newt which exist in several places in the Parish. It is hoped that more ponds can be created in future. Many thanks to those who donated food for the supper and those who helped serve and clear up.

The next Gardening Club event is the Plants, Produce and Refreshments afternoon at the Village Club from 12 noon on Saturday 13th May. Everyone is welcome to buy plants/ produce and have a drink with food, there is no need to be a member of the Gardening Club or Village Club. Speedwatch

We are hoping that you will start seeing Speedwatch in place on West Street again soon, after my call for volunteers last year resulted in 4 new faces, who will shortly be trained up in the Kent Police Community Speedwatch (CSW) system. Our equipment has come out of storage (it was last used at the Fete, to find the fastest schoolchild!) and been charged up and tested, ready to Spring into action. We can only put Speedwatch equipment out in 30mph or 40mph zones, and we have to have our locations approved by the CSW Manager before we can start; previously, these were at the Church and opposite the School. As the equipment has to be off the public highway, we are restricted in potential locations, but the Road Safety Group is looking at possibly moving the sign locations for the 30mph zone, which would make the South Lodge entrance a 'new' location, no longer being too close to a change in speed limit.

As the new co-ordinator (many thanks to Helen Ward for keeping the seat warm, and the equipment safe, over the past years), I attended the annual CSW conference in Maidstone on 11th March, and met the Inspectors, constables and volunteers running the County's response. Each Parish/Area has its own group of CSW volunteers, of which there are 40 'active' and one which has been in place for 17 years continuously. I met the volunteers from Boughton & Wateringbury, and I'm aware of the Collier Street, Linton & Farleigh co-ordinators' names. In 2022, CSW volunteers logged 30,000 vehicles across Kent, 10% of which were speeding in excess of the specified assessor limits (35 or 46mph); 9,719 letters were sent out to those 'speedsters' and the effect over ten years has been a steady decline in average speeds across Kent, albeit that was still said to be 38mph in '30' zones! Those speeding 'events' also recorded registrations of 739 untaxed vehicles and 771 expired MoTs, which were passed over from CSW to the Traffic Enforcement unit in Kent Police for their action.

It would always be good to have more volunteers when we get re-started, as that will allow more times we can be out on West Street, as a regular presence would seem to be the best 'deterrent'. Please contact me on my Parish email (see front page) or via 'huntontrafficreporting@gmail.com'.
