# March 8<sup>th</sup> 2024. Devastating Fire at Gennings

As a village, we send our thoughts and kind wishes to all of those effected by the devastating news of the fire at Gennings on the evening of Friday the 8<sup>th</sup> March 2024. It was a very anxious and frightening time for all concerned. Thankfully, no one was physically injured; nonetheless, the emotion of that sudden event would have been considerable.

The fire broke out at about 9pm and was quickly attended by 50



firefighters. Sixteen fire engines were at the scene at the height of the blaze; they attended from all over Kent. As a village, we are very thankful for the way in which the county pulled together to assist. The gravity of the fire was such that local and national press were quickly on the scene and information was shared on social media. Consequently, news of the fire circulated quickly amongst the village community. During the Sunday service at St Mary's Hunton, our Rector, Revd. Lorna Falkner, prayed for the 'Gennings' community. At the time of writing this article, the cause of the fire had not been established.

Press reports noted that the strong easterly wind, that evening, had fanned the flames. Firefighters worked to save as much of the building as possible. Despite tremendous efforts, the roof of the Grade II listed, 18<sup>th</sup> Century building, suffered immense damage and partially collapsed.

The most significant damage occurred at the main house, which forms the major part of the 'Gennings Estate' buildings. This is an 18<sup>th</sup> century house on the site of earlier buildings. The property was once known as 'Jennings'. The first house was built in Elizabethan times and has been subject to many alterations over time. Historically, 'Gennings' has been the home of many significant, influential and interesting people. Indeed, evidence suggests 'Gennings' is highly likely to have been an inspiration for Jane Austen's book 'Pride and Prejudice'. Further history can be found in 'Hunton, a Kentish Village' (available in the Village Club and St Mary's Church).

#### **Chasing Sheep!**

'Chasing Sheep is best Left to Shepherds,' is a piece of minimalist music by Michael Nyman from the film 'The Draughtsman's Contract' by Peter Greeenaway. It has also been adapted for various recordings, including one of the 'Shaun the Sheep' films. It reminds me of the bit where the farmer is counting his flock as they run past, going through the hedge and back round again; this makes me chuckle! Sheep are clever and cunning, don't underestimate them! Herding sheep is an art, it may look simply like chasing them from one place to another, but it never is that simple.

Each sheep has its own personality, some trust you and will gladly follow and help to make a complicit flock. But you just need one that is an independent thinker. She knows you are up to something and decides that actually she doesn't want to follow everyone else. This is fine if she doesn't coerce the others. However, she could easily get the flock moving in the opposite direction. We have tried to breed this trait out of our sheep, as it makes for an easy life when moving a flock single handed.

We had a resident Sheltland for a while; they are wilder in character. They can spook a tame flock and undo any well-rehearsed transition around the farm. Once she was coming in for shearing, but to get her through the gate was impossible. We would get her close and she would bounce away on her springy legs in a spronk on all fours. She was like a dancer, added a mocking defiance to her behaviour! Once eventually around the gate, in the yard, we were at last a step closer to the barn; the other penned sheep watched her with eyes rolling upward! In the end we needed the assistance of the shearer to catch her. Defiantly, this was not before she had chomped through our newly planted hedge while diligently keeping her keen eyes on us.

Fortunately, our sheep are now so tame because we have eliminated haughty and scatty ones! The flock know our routine and where they are going. Sometimes, they even run ahead, so we have to be careful to avoid being tripped up. Their vision allows them to see round behind them, this means they run slightly across you to keep you in view. Moving mums with lambs, that's a different matter entirely, it's like herding cats!

#### A New Church Governor for Hunton School

On the 18<sup>th</sup> of March, the Parochial Church Council (PCC) of St Mary's Hunton approved the appointment of Hazel Russel as a new Church Governor for Hunton School. #### World Book Day at Hunton Primary School

Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> March marked World Book Day. The children were set with a challenge to dress up a potato as their favourite book character or word. There were some outstanding entries that included: Freida Kahlo, Harry Potter and 'Tayta' Swift! During the day, the children engaged with and spoke about the books they loved. Here at Hunton, we try our very best to promote a culture of a 'love for reading' and try to reflect this throughout library areas and by our determination for every child to be a fluent reader by the time they leave our primary school. After some brilliant World Book Day activities, the children had an assembly to judge the best potato and for every child to receive their £1 book voucher. We also thank all those from the Hunton village who come in to hear our children read- it makes such a difference.

### Oh, for the Wings of a Dove!

The area around Hunton is fortunate in still retaining Turtle Doves – the country's fastest declining breeding bird. Local landowners are rallying round to help save this beautiful dove for future generations by providing areas where the birds can forage on bare soil for wildflower (aka farmland weed) seeds. The RSPB is providing extra seed to help the birds get quickly back into breeding condition in the spring after their 3,000-mile flight from their West African wintering grounds. Our tall hedgerows and scrubby field corners are ideal for concealing their scrappy nests too. But what they must also have is easily accessible water,



so they can produce plenty of 'crop milk' from their diet of dry seeds with which they feed their young. There may be no shortage of water in Hunton, but the doves have tiny legs so almost need to paddle to reach it. Additional shallow-sided ponds have been dug to accommodate them by Natural England and the Medway Countryside Project.

With an estimated 700 pairs, Kent now has a third of the UK's population. A great proportion of these are to be found in the Low Weald. A special project is running in the Marden area to study their behaviour and habitat needs. By attaching GPS tags to three birds last summer, Kent Wildlife Trust scientists discovered some are further ranging than previously thought. Hunton could well be on their itinerary! Funding from the Kent Wildlife Trust (KWT) is allowing for more GPS tags this year to see if we get a repeat of last year's wide-roaming birds. Additionally, an MSc student will be working with us studying Turtle Doves and Nightingale nesting habitat too. Please let the Hunton Herald editors know if you see any special birds. Turtle doves come into gardens and happily forage under bird tables. These birds are recognisable by the blue and black neck stripes and tortoiseshell wings. Or you may hear their gentle *'turr-turr'* purring on the warm summer air. With your help, our grandchildren will not have to rely on Christmas cards to know what these beautiful birds look like!
