Dear Fellow Hibernators

Easter Sunday falls this year on April 20th; Easter being the great festival and celebration of the Christian Church. When I first came to Coxheath, in 1967, it fell on Sunday March 26th. It is a movable feast and can fall on any Sunday between March the 22nd and April the 25th. The date is calculated according to the moon. In the service on Easter Sunday the opening words are usually the greeting: 'Christ is Risen, Alleluia'; to which the congregation reply, 'He is risen indeed, alleluia'. This reminds us that, after the events of Good Friday when Jesus was crucified, the 'enemy', death, was defeated. Christ's rising conveys the understanding that life goes on and there is hope.

As a youngster, living in the suburbs of London, Easter was the first real school holiday of the year, and we would go off to stay near Grannie in the countryside. One year, we went to Glastonbury to see her and the banks of grass leading up to the Tor were covered with primroses, lambs grazed in the fields, catkins hung from the trees and the leaves were just showing life. It was wonderful! The long cold days and dark nights were almost behind us. I had the same feeling when I first came to Coxheath, walking the footpaths along the Greensand Way. The difference was that in Coxheath the wind still blows cold until the end of May. But still, the sun shining gives us hope and still does.

I hope that Easter offers you 'hope'. That the warmer weather brightens your lives, and we see people coming out for walks on the footpaths as the blossom breaks through. The longer days remind us of God's power and authority in a world that at times seems to have lost order and purpose. Have a great Easter and look forward with hope.

Check your smoke alarms are in date!

Kent Fire and Rescue Service (KFRS) is urging people to check the expiry date on their smoke alarms, as they only have a lifespan of up to ten years. Between 2022-2024, approximately 6,600 expired smoke alarms were discovered at properties in Kent and Medway during Home Fire Safety Visits carried out by KFRS with some residents unaware that they expire or how to check them. Having an in-date smoke alarm is important in helping keep homes safe, as once they expire the sensors in the alarms become less reliable. This means that they might fail to sound in an emergency or could go off for no reason and could impact how effectively they work if there was a fire. We recommend testing once a week. If there's no expiry date, it means you'll need to replace the alarm and even if the smoke alarm still sounds, if it has expired then it needs replacing as soon as possible. If you can't change the smoke alarm safely, we recommend asking a friend or family member for help. This was never more evident than at the recent Gardening Club Supper, where green-fingered enthusiasts put down their trowels and enjoyed an evening of great food, good company, and lively chat - all without a gardening glove in sight! A big thank you to Lesley Lee and her helpers for making it all happen. Here's to more evenings like this because ,it's not just about what's on your plate, but who's around the table!

Thanks also go to Peter Hall, who gave a very informative update on the 'Landscape Recovery' project in Marden. Led by Peter's vision, the project'



focuses on a variety of community, environmental and wild-life initiatives. These included such things as the management of land in order to mitigate flooding in our area. In total, there are twenty-eight farming members involved in the project, known as the 'Marden Farming Cluster'. Together, they unite 10,000 acres of land; of which, Peter is responsible for 400 acres. Amazingly, there are now, over, 1,000 members of the 'Marden Wildlife Group'. Through the partnership with 'Marden Medical Centre', good mental health is prescribed though access to nature! Ray Morris, a good friend of Hunton, has worked tirelessly with Peter to improve bird habitats. Bird species are thriving!

Evidence-based research underpins the success of the project. As Peter said, "Science and technology rather than muck and magic". By donating all of his fruit crop to the 'Felix Charity Project' he is helping to make a huge difference to the lives of others. This charity organises an army of volunteers to harvest the apples, pears and plums. These are then transported, for free by Amazon, to a London base where they are distributed or cooked. Many community groups benefit. Notably, in 2024, 105 tons of fruit provided 38 million free meals-WOW!

Managing Farm and Flock

The challenges of managing both a healthy environment on the field and the health of the sheep can be a contradiction. Take worming for example, something of an issue for all animal keepers, pets or otherwise. The anthelmics (wormers) can have an impact on the soil ecosystems, which includes earth worms and the dung beetles (of which 50% of dung beetle species are now extinct); this therefore impacts on the quality of the pasture. Extensive use of wormers has also created resistance. However, not to use them has a negative impact on animal welfare. They can affect animal growth rates, wool growth, scouring, infections, anaemia, and even kill! We have taken steps to reduce our need for worming because, lambs, in particular, do not have mature enough immune systems in the gut to expel these worms.

Having introduced some bioactive crops such as: chicory, birdsfoot trefoil and sainfoin, we then allow the flock regular access to it. As a consequence, it has shown to decrease the negative effects of parasites in the gut. Additionally, we have reduced the size of our flock and rotate the sheep grazing pastures. Determined to get on top of our worm issue we have decided not to lamb our ewes this year. Hopefully, this will protect the pasture from the high number of worm eggs. With the help of an intervening good hard winter, or two, we hope to significantly reduce the pasture of worms. Our aim is that our worm management doesn't have a negative impact on the soil biology. We believe that keeping the animals is an important part of maintaining the soil ecosystem. We have huge numbers of worm casts in the fields and flocks of starlings, invertebrates and buzzards also love to feast on the worms. Good pasture improves the health of the animals grazing on it. The alternative bioactive crops add a variety to the flock's diet and the flowers provide for pollinating insects what's not to like?

On behalf of the Parish Council's 'Traffic and Road Safety Working Party', you may remember that lain Simmons set up a display and feedback area, during the 'Plant and Produce sale in 2024'. The specific focus of this was to encourage residents to express their views on traffic issues in Hunton. The findings of this are now being amalgamated with further information from a survey conducted by Hunton School. Furthermore, we have recently received a letter from our local MP, (see below).

Letter from our MP, Katie Lamb

Hello! I'm Katie, and I'm now the Member of Parliament here in the Weald of Kent. I represent our area in the House of Commons, acting and advocating on behalf of all my constituents. I'll be writing in the Herald every now and then to keep everyone in Hunton up to date. Right now, I'm very focused on transport. As you'll know, getting around our beautiful rural home isn't always easy. All too often our roads and pavements are closed for works; or there are big lorries on inappropriate country lanes; or there's no longer a bus route! We deserve better! That's why I've joined the 'Transport Select Committee'. This is a cross-party group of MPs who work to scrutinise the Department for Transport and all sorts of other relevant bodies and organisations. I successfully pushed for the Committee's first enquiries to be on bus services in rural areas, and 'street works' (when utilities dig up the roads). I want to know how people find the roads and buses — and anything else transport-related. So, I'm sending out a survey to every home, asking your thoughts on local transport.
