Chainhurst Egg Factory Latest News

After several months of nothing apparently happening, some renewed activity on the Planning side is now occurring, and this scheme from 2020 may make it to MBC's Planning Committee in the near future.

Maidstone Council had commissioned two (third-party) reports on specific technical issues on the Reed Court Farm application by Fridays, where they were not convinced of the suitability of not only some of the Applicant's reports but also (possibly) the Regulators' responses. As a reminder, all the adjacent Parish Councils, your Borough Councillors and the Chainhurst residents' group We Love Chainhurst ("WLC")(www.welovechainhurst.co.uk) have sent in objections to the proposals and the latter have sought legal review of one aspect, which caused further reports and design changes by Fridays.

The two new reports, which should by now be posted publicly on the MBC page for MA/20/505751, relate specifically to the landscape setting/evaluation and the flood risk & water quality aspects. WLC will be raising some concerns about the points raised by the Landscape & Visual Impact Review, which finds some concern over the 'rating' of certain visual impacts, which should be higher than the 'moderate' significance in the original LVIA, and is concerned about the revised footpath route next to one large shed (post-dating the original LVIA) and the proximity of one shed to ancient woodland.

There are also several aspects of the Flood Risk & Water Quality Review to raise, albeit a lot of the third-party document finds concern with the DHA consultant's design methodology, its paucity of quantifiable data or an evidence basis, and its conclusions about nitrate effects on the River Beult SSSI, as well as noting (as WLC have been saying since January 2021) that the Flood Risk & Drainage Strategy document doesn't in any real sense have a drainage assessment within it.

It may be the case that the Applicant will revise their proposals for a third/fourth time when they read the reports, or it may be that MBC Planners just put these reports in to the Planning Committee as they stand, without design revisions by the Applicant. Another round of Comments and Objections to MBC seems inevitable, adding to the 750 documents already on the PlanAp page over the past two years! Meanwhile, all UK flocks are in their sheds for Winter for the 2nd time since lockdown, due to Avian Flu – is 'free range' is really just a marketing slogan on egg boxes?

20th Birthday Present

Double Glazing at the Hunton Almshouses

With all the talk about an energy crisis and escalating costs, we are delighted to confirm that the Peace Cottages Almshouses have been the subject of a "Double Glazing Project".

A number of years ago, the windows and doors at the back of the cottages were double glazed. In the last few weeks, all of the original double glazed window panels have been removed and replaced with double glazed window panels, conforming to the latest government building regulations, which aim to significantly improve insulation and comfort.

The other windows, which only had less efficient secondary glazing, mainly those facing West Street, have been removed and replaced with new double glazed window frames and window panels.

In addition, all of the front doors have been replaced with modern composite doors, which provide far better insulation and security. All of the above has been achieved with tremendous co-operation from the installing company and the residents. So hopefully the residents will stay warm and comfortable throughout the forthcoming winter months.

Hunton Village Club AGM

The Club's AGM was held on Friday 2nd December where just 24 members, including the committee, attended. The turnout was a little disappointing given that the current membership stands at 98. Following the minutes of the previous meeting the chairman gave his "State Of The Club Address" reporting on the various events that have been held during the year which included the Queen's Jubilee celebration, the Beer and Gin Festival, various walks and lunches, film nights and quiz evenings. A new fence had been erected and the hedges removed to be replaced with a terrace or stepped retaining sleepers to car park level. The purpose being to have a low maintenance frontage. A new large screen TV had also been purchased. The Chairman thanked the volunteers who serve behind the bar and the many others that gave of their time and support the club in other ways enabling it to remain in profit. He also thanked the committee, in particular Lisa Haliday who was stepping down as Club Treasurer after many years in the position. Lorraine Redfarn, the membership secretary advised that based upon 2019 figures the Club had a net loss of 20 members. For 2023 she is intending to start a new membership numbering system so members will most likely have different membership numbers than at present. It was agreed not to amend the annual subscription of £20. The existing Committee were re-elected with Mike Dixon becoming the new Treasurer. The meeting discussed future projects, which include extending the car park over the grassed areas, new cellar beer lines and a new bar surface. After a general discussion the meeting formally closed at 8:45 p.m. allowing the bar to reopen. Other Club News

It will not have gone unnoticed that a few weeks ago the hedges and remains of the previously felled holly trees were removed from the front of the Club. It is probably an over statement to describe them as hedges as they mainly comprised ivy, brambles, hawthorn, nettles and other wild plant life. They were not particularly attractive and grew at a great pace. Over the years they became larger and much more difficult to maintain. So, with a view to low maintenance and improving the external appearance of the Club the growth was removed and the remaining holly tree stumps either side of the car park entrance were ground down. The opportunity was also taken to grind down two other tree stumps in the grassed area. A black membrane has been secured over the soil as a temporary measure to prevent weed growth and soil slippage onto the pavement. The plan is to have oak sleepers adjacent to the pavement stepped up to further sleepers to the grass at the car park level. The area between the rows of sleepers will be covered with a weed proof membrane and pea shingle. It is hoped that work on this will commence in the near future.

Phase two will likely see the removal of the grassed areas to enable more parking space to be made available but this is unlikely to occur for some time as there are other projects in the pipeline which will take precedence.

Favourable comments have already been received regarding the "opening up" of the front of the Club with one person commenting that they did not realise the Club was there until the hedges were gone!

Due to an unfortunate clash of events, we must change the date of the Beer Festival for 2023. We had announced that it would take place on Saturday 9th September but now it will have to be Saturday 2nd September 2023.

Garden tips for Winter

Make sure the winter protection around your more tender plants is secure. Use bubble wrap or fleece, and place a mulch of straw or deep leaf litter for dahlia tubers and cannas if you are leaving them in situ.

Care for and cover any garden furniture you want to leave outside. It's your last chance to get the tulip bulbs in - bury chicken wire over the top to deter the badgers from digging them up?

Make sure your stored fruit and your supply of seeds are safe from voles and mice that may find their way into your shed.

Still plenty of time to plant bare rooted shrubs and trees.

Start pruning fruit trees if they have completely defoliated.

It is time to take hard wood cuttings from a range of shrubs and climbers. Choose a healthy shoot that has grown this year and remove the soft tip. Cut into sections 15 - 30cm long. Making a sloping cut above a bud at the top and a straight cut below, just under a pair of buds. Place in a sheltered spot in the garden soil outside or in a pot and place into a cold frame then leave until next Autumn.
