for 70 years of dedicated service. A Service of Thanksgiving -Sunday 5th June.

A congregation of thirty-three gathered in St Mary's Church, Hunton to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee. The church was resplendent with special displays of flowers; notably, one in the form of a crown. A Union Flag was draped over the altar. Red, white and blue was all around. The service also coincided with Pentecost; when the Christian church celebrates the arrival of the Holy Spirit, sent by God. Annual Parish Meeting

On Monday 23rd May the Annual Parish Meeting was held in the Village Hall and about forty-five parishioners attended. The first part of the meeting included an open session where parishioners were able to comment and ask questions of the Councillors. Topics covered included: planning enforcement (or lack of) at Little Clockhouse Farm and the traffic in West Street. Possible remedies including moveable speed indicators and a mirror for Benstead Close were highlighted; Councillor Goddard is in communication with KCC Highways on these matters, with funding from the PC to help with this.

The second half was given over to brief reports from the various bodies and clubs in the village, most of which have been able to start up again successfully since the covid restrictions were lifted. Future events such as the Jubilee Lunch and the Friends of St Mary's Firework display on November the 6th, as well as the St Mary's Christmas Fair. Councillor Simon Webb gave the audience an update on both County and Borough matters. Perhaps more importantly for Hunton, Councillor Webb presented a cheque for £2500 to the Chair of Governors at Hunton School, Councillor Iain Simmons. This money, being a significant proportion of his members' grant, will enable the landscaping and planting surrounding the school's new outdoor building, which will be used for individual tuition and the children's wellbeing.

Before the official meeting took place, ornithologist Ray Morris gave a fascinating talk on the Marden Wildlife Group and their work with farmers and residents to highlight the wildlife in the Marden area, as well as measures made to enhance and protect it. A great deal of this is what is known as 'citizen science,' with residents recording what they have seen to build up a true picture of what is extant in the area. This is really important as, like Hunton, Marden is in the low weald area along the Beult which does not have any protected landscape designation; meaning it is more open to potential development. By recording their findings, the Marden Wildlife Group has enabled opposition to future development on environmental grounds. The feeling in the room was that Hunton would like to perhaps join in with this project to increase knowledge and information north of the river. You can Google Marden Wildlife Group to see their impressive website. Many thanks to Ray for a stimulating presentation.

Hatchgate Airfield

A few months ago, I asked if anyone could substantiate a story that the first flight from Paris to England may have landed in Hunton on the Hatchgate Airfield and, perhaps unsurprisingly, no-one could!

From a conversation with the current occupiers, it appears that the old sign on a barn in Mill Lane referred to a WW1 German bomber pilot landing there, thinking it was his home field! Whether this was a navigational error, or whether there is another explanation, we cannot know but either way he was apparently taken to a nearby house under guard and entertained there by a retired Admiral until the authorities arrived to take him away to live out the rest of the war as a POW.

My reservation about this new story is that the book, 'My Warrior Sons,' which catalogues the lives of the Borton family of Cheveny during WW1, makes no reference to this event. As Col Borton owned the airfield, and as his house was perhaps closest to it, there may still be further questions to answer - any help welcome!

Clock House Farm Tour

On the 19th of May, Roger and Leslie Lee arranged a comprehensive tour of Clock House Farm's impressive fruit growing operation along with their managing director, Oli Pascall.

Oli hosted the thirty strong group, relating the history of his family's farm, founded by his great grandfather in 1903. The farm initially grew hops and fruit before specialising in soft fruit.

The tour met at the Village Hall where Clock House buses transported us to the most local of their seven sites, visiting operations in Redwall Lane, Mill Lane then Lughorse Lane.

At Redwall Lane they showed us their new field of blackberries raised from seedlings grown at Linton Growing; a separate Clock House enterprise covering 30 Hectares which they established in 2020. Moving on to Hatchgate Farm in Mill Lane, we saw polytunnels housing predominantly strawberries and raspberries. Robots are already in use, keeping the crop healthy and using less



chemicals. A full trial using Government funding for a multi-agency project will start soon. Then, to the final stop at Lughorse Lane where Oli Pascal briefed us on the logistics and some of the challenges modern farmers face from staffing shortages to the many measures undertaken to reduce environmental impact.

Annual production from Clock House totals some 4.5 million punnets of blackberries, 8m punnets of raspberries and 4m punnets of strawberries. All of this represents 10% of the nation's soft fruit consumption. What impressed everyone was the scale of the operation at their 7 Farms. With forty-two full time staff, eight hundred seasonal workers and the best practices adopted to further improve biodiversity.

Altogether a most fascinating tour and we would like to thank Oli Pascal, Vali Neagu, James Dearing, Stephen Wilson, Nicholas Deppe, and Andrew Barclay along with many others who hosted the group.

Subject to farming schedules, Leslie and Roger plan to organise another tour this summer and will advertise the date in a future Hunton Herald.
