We do, however, have bottled water available to us, though rather too much for one or two vulnerable elderly folks I know, who have had huge numbers of bottles delivered to their doors! Spare a thought, though, for people throughout the world who have to walk to collect water from dirty ponds and rivers.

2.2 billion people (over 1 in 4) lack access to safely managed drinking water. According to the WaterAid charity, the average distance that women and children have to walk to get water is 5 kilometres and water is very heavy, isn't it?

So, as the summer approaches, let's enjoy the nature that's all around us, fed and nourished by the rain. We are fortunate in these villages to be surrounded by beautiful countryside. Go for walks with friends; perhaps take a picnic to share. Don't forget to call in on elderly neighbours to make sure that they are keeping cool and hydrated in hot weather. Family outings are so expensive but a picnic in a park with a playground is affordable. Don't forget hats and sunscreen – oh, and an umbrella in case it rains!

Message from Katie Lamb

One of my favourite things to do in the summer is to visit many of our fantastic local vineyards here in the Weald. Kent has a long history of growing vines, stretching back centuries, but in recent years our corner of the county has become home to some of the finest vineyards and wineries in the country. From family-run producers to internationally recognised names, they're helping put the Weald on the map while supporting local jobs, tourism, and our rural economy. But just like many of our farms, pubs and independent shops our vineyards are being squeezed by red tape, high taxes and rising production costs. All of this pushes up prices, making it harder for our producers to compete and harder for people to support them.

I recently went to a friend's wedding in France. Driving around Provence the following day, I popped in to a little vineyard with a tasting room – not unlike one of our own small family producers here (though of course, none could truly compare with those we have here at home!). I bought a nice bottle of white for €18, roughly what you might spend on, say, a bottle of Biddenden Ortega (£15.95, about €18.50). But these two vineyards are not competing on even playing fields. Because whilst the French wine producer and the Kentish one are both paying sales tax (VAT in the UK) of 20%, in England, our vineyards are also paying another 18% – nearly £3 on a £16 bottle – in alcohol duty. The equivalent tax in France? Just three euro cents, €0.03. That means the Kentish producer is paying nearly twice as much tax per bottle as the French, and that means the vineyard needs to charge its customers almost a third more per bottle to make the same amount of money. And that's before business rates, corporation tax, national insurance or packaging duty, and before you factor in the huge subsidies the French government pays to their winemakers!

Over the last few months, I've written to every vineyard across the Weald and taken their concerns directly to HM Treasury. The new duty system is far too complicated, and it's often smaller vineyards that are hit hardest. The Government must do more to help English wine producers grow and succeed. It can't be right that English vineyards face higher costs and tighter margins than many of their French competitors.

But the future of English wine remains incredibly bright. The quality of British sparkling wine is now recognised around the world, and many local producers are telling me that this season's grapes are looking particularly promising. So, if you're looking for something to do this summer, why not spend an afternoon exploring one of our local vineyards? Enjoy the countryside, learn about the winemaking process, and perhaps treat yourself to a bottle of British wine and support local.

Church Monument to Sir Thomas Clinton (1355 – 1415)

Sir Thomas Clinton was a younger son of John de Clinton, 3rd Baron Clinton of Maxstoke, Warwickshire, Constable of Warwick Castle and Idonea de Say whose father was Constable of Rochester Castle. On the death of his father in 1398, he inherited the manors of Hunton and Bensted in Kent establishing his family home where Hunton Court is now sited.

Clinton married twice: firstly to Alice and secondly to Joan, the daughter and coheiress of Sir Ralph Meynell (d. 1388) of Langley, Derbyshire and Newton Regis, Warwickshire. Through Joan he acquired land in Burton Overy and Upton, Leicestershire, Newton Regis (Warwickshire), Langley (Derbyshire) and Staffordshire. With her he may have had one daughter, Anne.

He was knighted before 1386 and saw military service in Scotland on John of Gaunt's expedition to Spain and with Thomas Mowbray, 1st Duke of Norfolk, in Ireland in 1394 when aged 39. He appears to have entered a less martial phase in his 40s, becoming MP for Warwickshire in January 1397 and for Kent in October 1404. His parliamentary career ended when, aged 60, he joined the service of the Duke of Gloucester as part of Henry V's army in 1415.

He died of disease, probably dysentery, in August 1415 at the Siege of Harfleur (18th August – 22nd September 1415) during the Hundred Years' War. His family had the arch, now built into the wall to the left of the pulpit, created in his memory. In the 17th century there were still effigies of Sir Thomas Clinton and his grandfather in the windows in the north wall of the church either side of the Canterbury window but these have been lost.



Historical footnote: Harfleur was the first time that an English army had made significant use of gunpowder artillery in the siege of a large urban settlement. After Harfleur surrendered the English marched towards Calais, leaving a garrison behind at the port. Although considerably reduced by casualties and dysentery during the siege, they fought the Battle of Agincourt (25th October 1415) inflicting a huge defeat on the French. The West and inner South doors of the church date to this time.

The Clinton peerage was created in 1298 and passes through both male and female lines; as such it is one of the most ancient still in existence. The current (22nd) Baron Clinton (b 1934) is Gerald Fane-Trufusis and his son, Charles (b 1962), is in line to become the 23rd Baron. As the name suggests they are connected to the Fanes of Hunton.

Thank you Google!

There are a few benefits to undertaking a thorough weeding of one's garden that help to offset the increasing discomfort to back, knees and hands! Typically, this is an all too brief sense of satisfaction from a job well done and a tidy border or patch of gravel but occasionally you find something lost many years ago: a button, a coin, a ring, the backstory of which you can never know.

I was doubly blessed this week as it was my wife, Andrea, who was weeding (as is so often the case) when, in a patch of gravel, she found something that looked like a fossilised tooth. We took a photograph and sent it off to Google lens to identify. AI generated an answer for us: it was a tooth from a Sand Shark that dated back 48m to 50m years old! Could there be any doubt? About the age and type of shark perhaps but is it a fossilised shark tooth? I believe so! These are found in gravel sourced from the sea off the Kent coast and we bought the gravel locally so this seems highly probable. Has anyone else had similar good fortune?

From the Archive: After an excellent year for roses: July 2006 - Off with their Heads!

Is dead heading spent rose blooms worth the effort? Does it produce more flowers or just tidy up the plants? The answer depends on the type of roses you have.

Hybrid Teas and Floribundas are definitely worth deadheading to improve later flowering. Roses which only produce one flush of flowers such as the old shrub roses aren't worth doing except to improve the look of the shrubs. Some old roses, such as Rosas Rugosa and Moyesii, have spectacular hips in the Autumn which would be lost if dead headed. Climbing roses should have spent blooms removed but ramblers can be left to their own devices.

Deadheading can be done with secateurs, cutting just above a strong shoot or outward facing bud. Recent research has suggested that removing just the dead head is sufficient and needs only a thumb and finger and a deft snapping motion. The best part of this job is that it can be done in a long floaty skirt and wide brimmed hat, dropping the blooms into a trug as you waft about the garden on a balmy evening. Romantic gardening at its best but perhaps forget the skirt if you're a chap!
