# **Coronation Weekend in Hunton**

King Charles's coronation was celebrated in true Hunton style.

The Village Club opened its doors at 8.30am on Saturday. Duly decorated and with the television running for the pre-ceremony details, it was ready to welcome whoever wished to share the company of others. Although it was not known how many people would come to watch the proceedings by 11am the club was buzzing, the bar busy and the room full. The atmosphere was warm and friendly and with plenty of refreshment and bacon rolls, it was declared a huge success.

This event was followed by a special service in St Mary's Church on the Sunday morning. The church flower arranging team had done a wonderful job decorating the church, with three show stopping crown flower displays.

The bells were rung to call us all in and then our very own village treasure, Rev'd David

Jones, led a lovely and relaxed celebratory service. The hymns were old favourites, ones some of us think we know word for word and are occasionally reminded that we don't! Praise my Soul, I Vow to Thee my Country, Jerusalem ... what's not to love? Marion played the organ beautifully and one attendee who is not typically seen in the church, showed us all just how hymns should be sung! The service ended with two verses of the National Anthem and then coffee, tea and coronation biscuits.

On Sunday afternoon the Village Hall hosted a tea party. Doors were thrown open at 3pm. The hall looked fit for a king with decorations made by Hunton School strung along the walls, the most glorious floral crowns, table decorations and above all plenty of food! The hall was full with about 130 friends and neighbours; newcomers were also welcomed. Conversations flowed so any background music was deemed unnecessary and for the whole afternoon there was not a lull

in the conversation. Chair of the Parish Council, David Heaton, gave a light hearted speech outlining the disasters of previous monarchs' coronations. We all drank a toast to King Charles III and, as suggested from the floor, gave three cheers to rattle the rafters. It was affirmed by all that this coronation had been a resounding success!

## Flowers at the Coronation

My cousin Bek and I founded Blooming Green in 2007 and, although quietly ambitious, we never imagined we would supply flowers to the King! Last week we were thrilled to be one of 80 members of Flowers from the Farm, whose seasonal, sustainable flowers decorated the Quire and the Grave of the Unknown Warrior in Westminster Abbey as part of the Coronation. As 20 million people tuned in live to watch the state occasion, Bek and most of the BG team were proudly flower-spotting and knowing that the flowers we had grown were now a part of history. I was too busy arranging flowers for a wedding in Greenwich, but watched some of the ceremony on a laptop whilst toasting with fizz alongside the caterers!

Flowers from the Farm is a not-for-profit membership association that champions nearly 1,000 artisan growers and promotes local, seasonal cut flowers and foliage. A cross-section of the membership were invited to contribute flowers and supply Shane Connolly, the floral designer to the Coronation. After the ceremony, the flowers were repurposed by the charity, Floral Angels, and donated to care homes, hospices, shelters and other vulnerable members of the community.

Through his installations in Westminster Abbey, Shane Connolly wanted to shine a light on the work of flower farmers and farmer-florists across the UK. Today, 85% of the UK population lives within 30 miles of their local flower farmer and the most sustainable cut flowers you can buy are from a local, professional grower, in their natural season. A bunch from a UK flower farmer typically has just 5% of the carbon footprint of an imported bunch. If you'd like to find out more about what we do, and grow, do come and see us this flower season. We will be open as part of Open Farm Sunday at Loddington Farm, on June 11th and start our Pick Your Own Flowers, every Saturday, from June 25th.

On the very day that Lisa Halliday exchanged on the sale of her Hunton home a number of us gathered in the village club to say thank you for all she has done to contribute to the life of the village during her 16 years living with us. In spite of having a demanding job in the City with its then obligatory commute (no working from home allowed then!) Lisa started to get involved in village life.

She sang with the Huntones, supported churchyard working parties, became Secretary to the Friends of St Mary's, helped to organise nine village fetes running the dog shows (brave) and the raffle (not a popular job), she became Treasurer of the village Club, a general fixer for the Peace Cottage committee and last but by no means least, a key member of the core Hunton Herald team, organising the distribution network and helping with the advertising! Whatever needed doing, Lisa was happy to help, often working quietly and cheerfully in the background but doing work that was essential. She will be greatly missed, not just for what she did but for her cheerful recognition that if something wasn't going to be done, if she could, she would help. How much poorer our village would have been without her contribution!

After leaving the City Lisa was accosted by two local "bon viveurs" who wanted her to set up a brewery in the building next to her house. As Lisa didn't like beer, she instead opted to set up a bakery before realising that she no longer liked early starts, so the baker became a dog groomer. # The Bells of St Mary's

In recent months the bells of St Mary's have been undergoing well deserved maintenance. They were last rehung in 1900. The Kent County Association of Change Ringers has a team of volunteers, experienced in bell maintenance, who have been down to inspect the safety and provide routine upkeep of the bells. A few minor issues were acted upon and the bells are now in good mechanical order and will last many years with routine inspections and oiling at regular intervals. However, the ropes, which were given to St Mary's in the mid 1990's need replacing. The present ropes were given 'new' by the tower of St Mary-le-Bow, Cheapside, London (Bow Bells) as being unsuitable for their tower. After nearly 30 years the 'Sally's (the fluffy woollen part of the rope) are wearing and it will not be long before they unravel. The tail ends are all badly worn, taped and some of the strands are wearing through. The main ropes, the top end from the bell to the Sally, are fairly good, many having been replaced in recent years with rope from Chatham Dockyard's Ropery

It has been decided, by the team of bell ringers and following advice, to replace all the ropes at a cost of about £1,500. We have the money in the Bell Fund, money given when the bells are used at weddings and by teams of ringers visiting the tower over the last quarter of a century, saved for that very purpose. The ropes are made up from a long length of pre-stressed polyester rope, a wool Sally and the tail end from natural hemp. The new Sally's will be alternate red and blue with a white stripe! Very smart! Fitting isn't a difficult task and the order and their manufacture will take place over the coming months with hopefully the first

'ring' in time for the only booked wedding of the year in August.

### Yalding Art Exhibition is Back!

Please put the weekend of 17-19 November straight into your diaries. Many of you will have visited one or several of the high quality art exhibitions that this charity has organised in the church of SS Peter and Paul Yalding, so you know that you will be in for a treat.

The cream of artists from Yalding and the surrounding area will be displaying their paintings, jewellery, ceramics, sculpture and much more. Friday night the doors open for a preview of the exquisite works – presenting a golden opportunity to be the first to buy something for yourself or a present for someone else. For a small donation you will be able to enjoy an evening of high art, delicious canapes whilst sipping a glass of your favourite tipple. Live musicians will provide a relaxing atmosphere. Throughout the Saturday and Sunday of this wonderful weekend, the doors will be open to peruse the exhibits, make your purchases and to enjoy a hot drink and a delicious array of cakes.

All the money raised will go to SchoolGambia, a charity based in Yalding for 23 years, that funds and supports the teachers, pupils and education of children in the village of Farato in the Gambia. The work of the charity began with building two classrooms for eighty 3-7 year olds and has expanded to 16 classes for over 640 pupils. Children from every walk of life and academic ability are able to access the school. Nearly all the teachers are from the village of Farato, highly trained both by the national college and by SchoolGambia workshops. They operate a reading scheme written especially by SchoolGambia, incorporating the Gambian government's adoption of phonics and introducing stories that feature Gambian children and culture. As a result of all this, the pupils from Yalding School, Farato consistently attain the highest marks in the country in national exams and frequently win scholarships to overseas universities. The school also has a high reputation for supporting children who are slower to capture ideas and concepts. A trained teacher supports these pupils with a carefully chosen individual programme and frequently these children gain in confidence and perform well in the classroom as well as in national exams.

The Art Exhibition of 2021 raised enough money to build a large library in the school grounds that is used by pupils, teachers and adults in the village. The money raised at the Art Exhibition 2023 will go towards refurbishing the nursery classrooms that were built by villagers over 20 years ago. The objective is to create a light, airy and interactive learning space for these young children to enjoy the foundation of their education. So many of them have developed their skills in the Nursery and grown up to obtain good jobs some returning to the school to work as IT leaders, teachers, secretary and bursar.
