Another Historic Hunton Connection

For over 30 years I have walked into the church, noticed the wall plaque to James Arthur Wellington Foley Butler, 4th Marquess of Ormonde, and wondered if he, who lived in the village until 1943, could possibly be connected to Arthur Wellesley, the Duke of Wellington (1769-1852). Incredibly, he was his godson!

Born in 1849 Lord Arthur (as he was known) became the 4th Marquess and the 28th Hereditary Chief Butler of Ireland in 1919 on the death of his older brother. Unlike previous generations, he did not live in the family seat of Kilkenny Castle as his son inherited it directly from the 3rd Marquess, to save on death duties. Lord Arthur married the American heiress Ellen Stager in 1887 at St George's Church in Hanover Square, London. She was the daughter of Gen. Anson Stager, of Chicago, Illinois, cofounder of Western Union and the chief of U.S. Military Telegraph during the American Civil War (1861-1865).

Ellen Stager brought a personal fortune to her marriage of US\$1,000,000 - the equivalent to about £34m today. In 1901-02, they purchased Gennings which remained their home until Arthur died on 4th July 1943. Ellen continued to live there until her death in 1951. His ashes lie in Ulcombe, Kent.

Lord and Lady Ormonde had four children. Their youngest daughter married Captain Edward Brassey Egerton who was killed in 1916, aged 27. Their eldest daughter's only son, James Drummond, was in command of a submarine off Malta in 1944 when it was lost with all hands; he was 26 years old and is on our war memorial plaque.

Pastoral Letter

Last month Lorna spoke to you about the feeling of having 'done nothing' – if you haven't read it, I suggest you track down a copy and reflect on how much you might actually do each day.....even if it's not the big, noticeable stuff that you think your friends are wanting to hear about.

This month I'd like to follow that by talking about the art of pottering – doing those small, daily tasks with intention and notice. A friend of mine introduced me, a few years ago, to a book called 'Pottering. A Cure for Modern Life' by Anna McGovern. The blurb on the back says it's "The perfect antidote to the stuff of life, pottering helps you discover the pace where contentment lies."

A piece inside helps to explain it better – "One of the basic principles of pottering is 'don't try too hard', not 'don't try at all': it is not 'sitting about in your onesie on your phone'. The very opposite, in fact. Pottering is relaxing *because* you are occupied."

Pottering helps us to focus on one task at a time and helps us to disconnect from the fast pace of modern life. In the bible we read that Jesus often took himself away from the crowds and the disciples and found places of quiet to pray. I would suggest that he was an expert in pottering; knowing that we need to find those places of peace, whatever and wherever they may be, to help us recharge, refocus and be able to cope when the demands of life crowd in on us.

We can't all suddenly disappear from life for a couple of hours as Jesus did, but we can learn to find our own rhythm that helps us face the challenges of daily life.

So, my suggestion, if you have times when you're feeling overwhelmed, is to put down your phone (or whatever digital device you are using) and do something simple like making a cup of tea taking time to focus on the task you are doing, thinking only of pouring the boiling water into the pot and pushing all those other tasks clambering for your attention to one side. Happy pottering!

Kent County elections and the recent changes

While you were all (?) voting in the Kent County elections on 1st May, some may have wondered why there were no Borough Council elections being held at the same time. That was because the system had been changed for last year, and Borough Councillors are now all elected for four years (from 2024-2028), rather than the annual elections for just one of our three Councillors. Hence myself, Grace Couch and Claudine Russell were voted in for four-year terms (and Hunton became part of the Marden & Yalding Ward, rather than Coxheath & Farleigh). Just to note, following the significant changes from the KCC elections, there are no Reform UK councillors elected or sitting on Maidstone Borough Council (MBC).

Anyway, the new voting system also means that there is not the same re-setting of the Council members that sometimes used to happen each May as/when political numbers varied, so MBC remains being run by a coalition of Green & Independents along with the Liberal Democrats, and the Program set by the Cabinet continues to be followed as it was approved earlier in 2025. However, the Mayor continues to be appointed annually, and that is based upon seniority and not on political allegiance. With the change to four year terms, we now know in advance who the next mayors should be, as there is no chance (as happened in 2024) that the most 'senior' candidate could be voted out of his/her Ward by their electors.

On Saturday 17th May 2025, Council approved the appointment of Cllr. Martin Round as Mayor for the next year, and Cllr. Brian Clark as Deputy Mayor, and they both then took part in the Civic Parade in town, in full regalia. Martin was deputy mayor last year, and he succeeds Cllr. John Perry who came from Staplehurst Ward. Martin Round is a Conservative party Councillor for Headcorn & Sutton Valence Ward, where he has represented them for over a decade and been a Headcorn Parish Councillor before then; he had a strong message to bring at his acceptance speech about the rural communities working together for the benefit of all residents. Brian Clark is a Liberal Democrat party Councillor for Loose & Linton Ward, and has been their MBC representative for 10 years; long before being a Councillor, he ran the Post Office at the top of Loose Hill, which is where I first met him about twenty years ago. They will both do a wonderful 'job' representing the Borough over the next 12 months, I am sure.

The APCM of St Mary's Hunton

The Annual Parochial Church Meeting (APCM) of St Mary's took place during the morning service on May 18th led by the Rector, Rev Lorna Faulkner. St Mary's Hunton is part of a five parish benefice led by Lorna and each parish has its own APCM although most of the organisations within the benefice are open to everyone in each parish.

As with most organisations annual meeting are usually poorly attended but by holding the meeting at St Mary's during a service the attendance is always good. The meeting firstly elects the church wardens and Iain Simmons was duly appointed without a vote leaving one vacancy. The seven members of the Parochial Church Council were appointed and we have a full membership of Moira Ensoll, Julia Gerrish, James Forster, Sue Heaton, Sarah Jones, Fay Joyce and Wendy Simmons.

The PCC organises the running of the church and meets about six time a year. Every six years the Electoral roll of the church is completely renewed and I am pleased to report that there has been an increase in membership of about 10%, up from 32 to 36. Membership is as the word suggests, 'members' who have the responsibility of election to the PCC and also elect members to the PCC. The APCM also receives the reports on the state of the building, activities either within the building or organised by the PCC and most importantly receives a report on the financial state of St, Mary's. 2024 financially has been a satisfactory year with income matching expenditure for the first time in several years. However, the meeting was also made aware of the proposed repairs to the tower for which we hope to obtain grants for various charities including the separate charity to the Church, -The Friends of St Mary's - who have generously supported the church over many years in keeping the building in good repair.

Garden tips for June

For those that have any box left, the best time to start trimming the hedges has traditionally been Derby day, the first Saturday in June. Avoid trimming box on a humid day as these conditions can encourage box blight and avoid doing it in bright sunlight too as this can scorch the leaves.

It should be safe to get annuals out into the ground as the likelihood of frost should have past. Keep tying in any tall perennials that are likely to flop and keep up the dead heading to ensure a continuous succession of flowers.

It is difficult to know what weather to expect for June. After a warm and dry May some flowering plants appear to be ahead of their usual flowering time. May has been unseasonably dry. We have had less than half of our expected rainfall for the period of January to May and if we don't get any rain by the time you read this, you will need to keep watering newly planted plants, and even those planted earlier in the year. If plants can't get enough moisture, they won't be able to

establish a good root system that can spread out into the soil and will soon become stressed and take much longer to establish. Applying mulch around the plants after watering will help to retain the moisture in the soil by preventing its evaporation. Leave lawns a little longer in the warmer drier weather by raising the mower blades to allow the grass roots to access moisture further down in the soil, and aiming to keep the grass greener for longer over the season
