#### Serge Desmarais

As many of you are aware, Serge died on the morning of Friday 19<sup>th</sup> January. Although he had become increasingly unwell his death was unexpected.

Serge was born near Paris in 1946, into a wealthy French family. He led an eventful life, being an accomplished and daredevil skier as well as show jumping, racing power boats in south west France, driving a yellow Land Rover in African rallies, riding a motorbike into his 60s and driving fast cars always.

He moved to England in 2000, the year after he met Lynda. He acquired Hunton Court in 2008 and spent more than two years on an extensive restoration. Later he helped to protect Bishops Lane from the threat of unwelcome development by buying the 65-acre field on its northern boundary and planting it with 45,000 trees.

He was perhaps most visible in the village at the two historic re-enactment weekends in 2013 and 2014 when Waterloo was re-fought (to French advantage) and Redcoats were seen marching up and down West Street – a most surreal sight!



Although he was a very private man, he always had a ready smile and a wave for those he knew. He was also quietly generous on occasion, whether it was providing CCTV for the Club after a break-in or the gift of a wheelbarrow following a random conversation – it was his thoughtfulness which was memorable.

He left Hunton an even better place and he is missed. Our sympathies go out to Lynda and their families.

## Parish Council Elections – Thursday 2<sup>nd</sup> May 2024

Would you like to be a Hunton Parish councillor? As a local councillor you can become a voice for your community and make real change. Nomination papers can be obtained from the Electoral Commission website at:

Notice of election is published on Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> March and nominations start on Monday 25<sup>th</sup> March and close on Friday 5<sup>th</sup> April at 4pm. Find out what the role involves by contacting the Parish Clerk or Parish Councillor. Contact details are listed on the front page of the *Hunton Herald*. To stand for election you must be: A British or Commonwealth citizen; at least 18 years old; on the electoral register for the parish; or in the past 12 months occupied land or other premises in the parish, or work in the parish, or live within three miles of the parish boundary.

Hunton Parish will now fall within the Marden & Yalding Ward (previously Coxheath & Hunton Ward). Elections for the three Borough councillors will take place on the same day. Term of office is 4 years for both parish and borough councillors. The Polling Station remains unchanged, at the Village Hall.

#### Chainhurst Chicken Farm – Latest Shenanigans

Three years and three months since Fridays' consultant, DHA, put up the scheme details for 192,000 free-range chickens on the fields adjacent to the River Beult in Chainhurst, the project was placed before Maidstone Borough Councillors for a decision/vote on 15<sup>th</sup> February...Only it wasn't decided, as the only vote taken was to agree with the head planner's late decision to withdraw their 'rushed' proposal to go ahead with the scheme, and to do further work/analysis before councillors can say yeah or nay at some future date! This is a scheme that has had four versions proposed to date and which was due to be rejected last summer by MBC's planner before Fridays cut the number of sheds from three to two.

This seemed to be primarily because the reaction to the planners' proposal was universally to criticise it for its lack of dealing with outstanding and important issues (like flood risk and chicken poo in the river), as well as confusing content in the MBC document, DHA documents and information that has been fed onto the planning portal in the previous two weeks. As everyone had been led to believe, it would be listed for the March 2024 Committee, so it was a shock to hear on 7<sup>th</sup> February that it would be on the next week's agenda... After some seriously urgent work and documentation was undertaken by WeLoveChainhurst's volunteer residents' group, MBC asked for the application to be withdrawn a day before the monthly committee meeting.

Two local Marden Borough Councillors spoke eloquently against the decision to withdraw the proposal and to move to a debate on the day. Leader of the Council, David Burton, stressed that the failure to resolve the issue was detrimental to public confidence in the planning system and to residents' health; Claudine Russell gave quote after quote from the planner's document which reported that things had not been finalised yet. Representatives from WeLoveChainhurst were ready to give their 3-minute opinion against the proposal, as were two Marden and Hunton Parish Councillors as well as two more Marden & Coxheath elected representatives. The committee chair took a vote on withdrawal, and this was carried by 7 votes to 5 (along 'party' lines), so the group of 15-20 residents who had gone to the Town Hall to make their views heard got up and left to discuss their next moves and to seek further legal/technical advice.

In the meantime, the SSSI River Beult continues to deteriorate in condition even before any new influx of agricultural pollution from a potential 125,000 chickens ranging outdoors. The Environment Agency has just published its 2022 assessment of the river, downgrading the 'fish condition' from Good to Moderate. This followed the downgrading of the 'chemical condition' from Good overall in 2016 to Fail in 2019. It is perhaps pertinent that the applicant's consultant and MBC's specialist adviser continue to mis-quote the 2016 'Good' status as being its current condition in their technical assessments.

#### Hanky Panky

We're preparing for lambing though, as I write this, it is about six weeks away. When we first started keeping sheep, and lambing, we had six elderly ewes to show us how it was done. That was 2014. We have come a long way since. Our flock has grown in vigour and we're learning lessons year on year; we are a little more confident and less trepidatious come lambing but somehow we still feel like newbies. Every year has been completely different and has brought its own trials and tribulations.

The first year, with our elderly ewes, we had tiny feeble lambs, a high number of triplets and it was hard work keeping these little things going. We were inexperienced and ended up with a lot of tube feeding I seem to remember.

The Schmallenberg virus was around one year, though we were fortunate enough to largely escape disaster. One ewe delivered prematurely but luckily the rest of the flock was unscathed.

One year we seemed to have very few twins and more singles. That was not just experienced by us; the vet thought it might be to do with the weather conditions at tupping. However, we have since had a ram vasectomised, and now tease the flock before tupping to get the ewes ovulating. We have had good results, with even the Herdwicks having twins – not the norm in their native breeding grounds in the Lake District.

Last year was a difficult lambing; most needed help and we thought it was because we had transported them mid-pregnancy, but many shepherds had similar issues. We have had mums not wanting their lambs – probably when we've lambed a greater number of first-timers and they become spooked and flustered. Then we seem to be bottle-feeding their lambs for them from the get-go.

We've learnt that, given a second chance, mums that don't have much milk one year, will still not have much milk the next and we just perpetuate our own bottle-feeding workload. We have made a point of keeping only the best of the bouncy lambs to add to the flock and the robust healthy ewes; the independent mums and the tamer, less flighty girls so, mostly, we have a calm time in the lambing shed these days and a good-looking flock.

This year, however, we have had some hanky-panky going on. One ewe delivered in early January having had a liaison with a ram lamb – fortunately not hers. Then, with lambing still 'officially' six weeks away, we have had a lamb born yesterday! This birth, it seems, was from an encounter through a fence... We live and learn!

We were lucky that Neil, who crutched – when you remove the wool from around the tail and udder – our sheep last weekend, noticed one with a full udder. I am sure we would never have noticed she was due so soon – but the signs were all there. I do recall a ewe lying by the rams' field, with Spud the ram, being very pally (with the fence between them mind) and not particularly wanting to move, even for food. I didn't think anything more of it. Southdown sheep are short in the legs and stocky, not built for jumping, but whatever went on there, there were no witnesses! By the way, mum and lamb are doing well.
