Dear friends

March has arrived! Lots of special days occur in March.

On 1<sup>st</sup> March it is Saint David's Day, the Patron Saint of Wales, who died on this day in 589ad. It was declared a National Day of Celebration within Wales in the 18th century. He is the only native-born patron saint of the countries of Britain and Ireland.

Another is Saint Patrick's Day on 17<sup>th</sup> March. He is not only the Patron Saint of Ireland but also of Nigeria, Montserrat and of engineers! My husband and I happened to be in Ireland last year on St Patricks Day. Oh my goodness, there were parades everywhere, and, of course, lots of people wearing green because it is said that Leprechauns can't see you if you wear green and therefore can't pinch you!

For Muslims the whole month is Ramadan, meaning 'scorching heat,' a time of fasting from dawn to sunset. It is so called because of the climate in Mecca at the time when, according to Islamic tradition, God first spoke to the Prophet Muhammad when the Qur'an was revealed.

Mothering Sunday is 30<sup>th</sup> March. In the 1600s poorer families would send their children to work as domestic servants in the homes of affluent people. Once a year they were allowed to return to their 'Mother Church' where they had been baptised and take gifts of flowers for their mothers. Observance declined after the industrial revolution but was revived in 1913 when a "Mothering Sunday Movement' was started by Constance Penswick Smith. She reinvigorated the UK celebration and by the 1950s her legacy had encouraged the celebration across the UK and Commonwealth Nations, leading to the now familiar day of reflection and the celebration of mothers and motherly figures.

Before it was known as Mothering Sunday, this day was called Laetare Sunday, which means 'rejoice,' and there is definitely a cause for rejoicing in March because at 10.01am on 20th it is the Spring Equinox, hurrah! This is when days and nights are of equal length before the days continue to get longer thereafter. Spring has really sprung when daffodils are appearing, for Saint David, Wales, and for us! Those beautiful flowers really lift the spirits, and symbolise hope and renewal.

I saw a photograph the other day of some daffodils flowering amongst the rubble of Gaza. Now that is an image of hope and renewal for the whole world, isn't it? Enjoy the exquisite nature around us that God created and go well in the wonderful month of March.

## The Batman Cometh? (with apologies to Flanders and Swan)

Just as we were starting to plan for the full replacement of the cedar shingles covering the church steeple and tower roof, we were advised to get specialist advice on how to work around a potential bat population in the church. We were told to contact the Bat Conservation Trust for advice and perhaps the free bat survey which can be provided to churches.

It transpired that because of the extent of the planned work a free survey could not be provided but we were sent a link to a list of firms qualified to assist us. Warned that this bat advice could be expensive, we were still shocked that the cost of this work alone could be as much as £15,000 to £20,000 (although it could be as little as about £5,000, depending on what is found). The risk of this added cost would be in addition to an already stretching budget of £100,000 to £120,000 for the rest of the work!

Two further factors to consider were that:

after a recent decision by the current Government, our ability to reclaim VAT this coming year is less certain than it was and even less likely from April 2026, and the full extent of the planned work might take up to 4 months to complete during peak wedding season. As a result, we have decided to change our approach to instead target a partial repair of the leading edges of the tower only whilst perhaps taking advantage of the scaffolding to repoint the worst parts of the tower walls (subject to affordability) with scaffolding going up in the last week of September.

This should allow us to benefit from a free bat survey and free guidance as to how to complete the project without risking a £20,000 fine and/or delays in the work program. We hope it will also allow the project to be completed later this year, after the wedding season is over but before bats look to start hibernating, thereby having the best chance of recovering the VAT element of the build cost.

It is hoped our bat survey work will start in April and take a month to complete during which time our architect will be planning the work, getting the required approvals and inviting quotes from builders. We trust that our project settles down to a more predictable path without following the precedent set in the Gasman Cometh!

#### A Blast from the Past!

In a quiet month for Hunton news we decided to look for material that could be repeated from old Heralds. The following article was written 20 years ago by two much missed village characters, Les Leonard of Woolhouse Oast and Roland (Roly) Day of Elphicks Farm and Grafton House. Some of what appears could have been written yesterday...

Speeding traffic has always been a danger: Roland Day, a past resident of Hunton for 50 years until 1995 and now living in West Farleigh, where he was born nearly 90 years ago, says that careless speeding by drivers through the village has been a problem over the years.

This is one of the issues that Roland has taken up in responding to the Herald's call for "budding reporters" and he has put pen to paper with fond memories of Hunton, while always thinking of the welfare of residents.

He writes: "Firstly, Ron Porter's article in the Herald expressing concern about speeding traffic was well written and I trust that many parishioners (if not all) thought the same as I did. I do not like criticising the Parish Council as I was a member for several years and I know what good work they do. However, I would like to know if the council is applying enough pressure on the authorities; from my perspective it appears to be too much talk, all write and no action.

"Secondly, on the article suggesting that a mystery visitor was placing cones in West Street alongside the playing field, I'd rather

thought this person was doing a good job. The cones should curtail speeding traffic and lorries from driving too near the hedge which is in danger, if the cones are not there, of being pushed into the ditch and so cause the road to flood. I suggest the mystery person replace them or at least move them away from the King George V playing field, where they look unsightly. If drivers were sensible and stuck to the speed limit then the cones would not be a problem at all.

"Finally, on the growing problem of fly tipping and the increasing amount of rubbish that appears all over Hunton, it is difficult to know what to do, as it is generally dumped at night. Dumpers should experience this resulting mess around their own homes. Magistrates should be more severe when dumpers are caught and, while I know that their powers are limited, I feel it is time they became unlimited!"

Les was Editor for the first 5 years of the Herald and Roly claimed to have been the first person breathalysed by the police in Kent, may have been the elusive cone man and was also heavily involved in village life - who could forget his renditions of comic songs at the harvest lunches? Both were willing volunteers for all sorts of good local causes and are much missed.

#### Do WeLoveChainhurst too?

As you may recall, since 2020 Fridays have been seeking approval to develop Reed Court Farm on the banks of the SSSI River Beult into an industrial scale chicken farm. What impact might this have on us you might ask?

The application is for two 262m long, 30.4m wide and 20m high sheds (higher if you include the feed silos and vents required to push ammonia fumes out of the roof), fenced in with 2.5m high wire fencing. These sheds will house 64,000 chickens each, with range areas extending from each shed. It is difficult to see how our air and river quality would not be impacted adversely.

Footpaths would be redirected either along the river where it floods in winter and / or between the fences to the other side of the farm. Walks would cease to be the rural delight they are currently and may be inaccessible during any outbreak of avian flu or similar.

HGVs would travel from Marden through Chainhurst on Hunton Road (to deliver feed and remove eggs and waste) to the access point by the old Hoppers Huts. Our roads are not suitable for HGV traffic and, as with Wares Farm (Redwall Lane), we should expect to suffer from increased lost and misdirected illegal HGV traffic.

This application has been fought over for the last 4+ years. Fridays and their consultants have recently submitted more information in support of their planning application triggering yet another round of reviews, reports and objections.

WeLoveChainhurst (WLC) is working through those documents and submitting technical critiques of the new information, but in addition to that they need help from anyone who believes that this development is an unwelcome industrialisation of our community, detrimental to our environment and a danger to road users.

It is possible that this application will be considered by the Borough Councillors on the planning committee in April and WLC want them to be reminded how much opposition there still is to this scheme.

So, now is the time to remind the Maidstone planning team if you still object which you can do online, by email or by post (planning reference 20/505751/EIFUL). The deadline for the planning team receiving your objections is, we believe, 20<sup>th</sup> March 2025.

More details on how to object, including a template objection, can be found here - https://www.welovechainhurst.co.uk/object-now. What you choose to say is of course up to you. Just reasserting any previous objection would work, but you may wish to focus on a particular aspect of the application that matters to you e.g. damage to the SSSI River Beult, risk of adverse effects on wildlife, traffic issues, footpaths being re-routed, what the site will look like in our countryside, flooding ... there's a long list to choose from!

# Next Litter Pick – Saturday, 22<sup>nd</sup> March

Anyone moving through Hunton recently must surely see that the levels of litter are again building up. This is both unsightly and potentially harmful to cyclists and animals - wild and domesticated. Whilst we hope that the fly-tipping in Lughorse Lane will be cleared by MBC staff, we know that we get little practical help from MBC in terms of litter on our roads, verges and in our hedgerows as they consider our roads too dangerous to walk on. At times they have a point!

Many of you will know that there is a group of volunteer litter-pickers, supported by Hunton Parish Council and Clock House Farm (who collect "our" bagged rubbish and dispose of it with their own commercial waste). We meet at least twice a year and, for a while, leave our roads both tidier and safer. We plan to hold our next litter pick on or just before Saturday, 22<sup>nd</sup> March and all volunteers would be most welcome to join us. It is curiously satisfying and it does leave the village looking tidier for a while. For anyone doing their Duke of Edinburgh award it might be an opportunity to log some volunteering time?

As is usual, we plan to meet in the Village Hall car park at 10am on the day with rubbish sacks, high-vis jackets and litter pickers. If you already have a prior commitment then but would like to help, please do get in touch and we can arrange to provide equipment and collect filled bags in the week before. We suggest that volunteers choose where they are happy to pick up litter but it is very helpful for us in planning which roads to target if we know your plans in advance. In selecting your area to clear please note that you are all responsible for your own safety and should choose accordingly.
