Rector's Letter

Dates and anniversaries play an important part of life's journey. As I write this letter in September 2024 it suddenly came to me that September marked the 25th year of my retirement from teaching, a career that had lasted 35 years. It also marked my 24th year since I was first ordained on 29th September 2000. I was getting old!!!

Yet, autumn for so many years of my life, had marked the beginning of a fresh start. The school year had governed the first 50 plus years of my journey. Yet this year seemed different and I don't know why. Maybe it's the news, the international situation, the USA election for a new President, the financial problems effecting so many. In reality 'I'm all right Jack'. Yes, life has become more difficult, more complex, more demanding and more challenging? Certainly, we see and hear information more and more swiftly and in more graphic detail than we used to. Do I have an answer? Then as so often happens in my daily readings came this passage.

"And why do you worry about clothes? See how the flowers of the field grow. They do not labour or spin. Yet I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendour was dressed like one of these. If that is how God clothes the grass of the field, which is here today and tomorrow is thrown into the fire, will he not much more clothe you—you of little faith? (Matthew 6:28-3).

This passage from the Sermon on the Mount offers is a perfect example of how we sometimes worry about things which are actually fairly unimportant. The words may be very familiar to many. Yet it takes a greater effort to realize that Jesus is not just speaking poetically; he means what he says!

The point of this passage is in the words: which come earlier "Therefore I tell you, do not be anxious about your life." He is speaking to people who had nothing, for whom every day was a struggle to survive. He realizes that they cannot embrace the spiritual power within them if they continue to focus on the poverty in their situation. So, Jesus assures them—in very real and practical terms, that if they put their faith and focus on God, God will provide for their needs.

We may say that's not realistic; our human needs must take priority. Few indeed are the people who have fully trusted this teaching and fully surrendered their human condition to their inner divinity! But Jesus always meant what he said. The promise of this passage is always present for all of us. Our work is to remove the doubts and fears and false priorities, and trust our Oneness with God. It's a hard life and words whilst we know they are true can at times be hard to accept.

Cheers to Success


Hunton Village Club fundraising Beer Festival exceeds expectations!

Last month an article described a recent accident in Hunton which was attended by the police. Blue Drawing Room, picture gallery, grand staircase and the ballroom where Queen Victoria had her parties! We were so lucky as ropes were taken down to let Hunton through; we were allowed to go where the rest of the visitors could not! During the tour, we wrote in our notebooks and scribbled down certain things that came to our minds ready to do a piece of writing when we came back to school.

Hunton Backyard Ultra – September 14th

Overall we had 33 participants, with 17 early risers turning up to the Village Club at 5:30am for the official 6:00 am start.

It was an incredible effort from every single person that took part with 8 completing 73 km (45 miles), a 62-year-old from Goudhurst ran 62 kms and a 74-year-old from Maidstone 47 kms. Someone who had only ever ran 5 kms before, smashed his first marathon. A handful of participants who had run half marathons before, completed their first ultra-marathons (over 30 miles) and almost everyone ran further than they'd ever ran before.

It was a glorious day; the sun was shining, Spitfires were flying overhead and the Club was packed with runners fuelling, stretching and chatting away. A big thank you to all the volunteers who were stationed at the Club, to Phil for opening up the bar to serve some well-deserved and much needed pints, and to all the spectators that cheered us on.

Nature's Bounty

So what have you spotted in and around Hunton so far this year? For me it has been a year of firsts, starting with the discovery in late winter of 17 hibernating newts, including Great Crested Newts, at the base of a rotting fencepost. Then in early spring we came across our first colonies (aggregations) of beige and black "16 Spotted Ladybirds", thousands and thousands of tiny bugs cascading down the sunny sides of fenceposts, which from a distance looked like patches of lichen.

This was followed by my first sighting of a Marble White butterfly foraging in the meadowland of North Park, Hunton Court – a butterfly similar to the Cabbage White but covered in dark spots. Then a few weeks later an absolutely stunning Jersey Tiger Moth was found feeding on a honeysuckle in our garden. These day flying moths have green and dark striped upper wings and bright orange and red hind wings – beautiful.

More recently we have enjoyed walking through the Scott's fields at the centre of the village which have been a sea of colourful wild flowers: red clover, yellow vetch, wild carrot, hawksbit ... both a joy to behold and, as we edge towards winter, a great source of food for foraging pollinators.

Sadly for me, I had no further sightings this year of Red Kites, Honey Buzzards or White Tailed Eagles (unconfirmed). Also, was it just me or were there hardly any cuckoos heard this April? (To offset this disappointment, I did capture a cuckoo in flight on a wildlife camera – another first!)

Thankfully, as far as I know, no Asian Hornets have been spotted in or immediately around Hunton but we need to remain vigilant as confirmed sightings have been recorded as close as Staplehurst. In October, a good place to spot the Asian Hornet is around flowering ivy, one of the last food sources for insects before winter sets in, and where hornets will lie in wait and "pounce" as they come in to feed.

So, what have you seen this year? Please do tell the Herald if you have anything to share, it would be interesting to know what other natural riches Hunton has to offer!
