Club gets facelift - and new beer!

Action is being taken in a bid to make Hunton Village Club, which dates back 100 years, more "people friendly" while bringing it into the 21st century.

It is planned to make the Club more comfortable for members, their families and guests, by installing smoke extraction machines and a new and more efficient heating system, while generally modernising the premises with new furniture, and other fittings.

Secretary and treasurer Doug Redfarn told the Herald: "We have switched brewers from Courage to Greene King who are staging an IPA promotional evening on Friday 19th August. We intend making the Club a truly family friendly place for all members - young and old - and their guests. We want to get our message over to villagers and make them aware of what we are doing. Hunton lost its only pub the Prince of Wales back in the 1990s leaving the Club, and the Church, as the last remaining village meeting place.

"Basically, we want our members and their families and friends to be able to come into a welcoming and entertaining Club, enjoy a drink of decent quality, in a pleasant and smoke-free environment."

The club is looking to the future with the backing of a dedicated committee and Rose Mitchell, the club stewardess. A new group of members has been welcomed onto the committee to help identify areas for change as well as to promote the existing plans. These include Roger Crooks, Phil Nichols and Alan Blackledge-Smith.

Roger says: "The original Working Men's Club has been tremendous for the village over the years and it's values and spirit must be retained. However, we need to get people from both within and outside the village more interested in the club and its' activities, and more importantly, ensure they are willing to give us their support. To do this we have got to present a broader and generally more exciting appeal. We hope people will contact us for membership or if they would like to help in any way." **Contact Doug on 820495**.

Straight Eight concert raises £900

Villagers and friends from other parishes enjoyed a memorable summer evening at St. Mary's when the Straight Eight choir and accompanying musicians performed under conductor Peter Brice. More than £900 was raised for the church.

The concert opened with John Rutter's Requiem - a beautiful but difficult piece to sing given his typical use of "dissonance (menace) to contrast with serene and beautiful melodies throughout as light triumphs over darkness" There were two lovely soprano solos and fine oboe.

The second half was a lively and varied programme from the Baroque era through to contemporary works from Lotti to Lloyd-Webber. A delighted audience sang their hearts out in the Tallis Canon and the jaunty "Honey Pie" (ace tenor solo) and "In The Mood" got every foot tapping.

Raiders escaped down Bishops Lane

Ram raiders who struck at a shop in Marden last month used the country lanes through Hunton to make their escape. This has been revealed by parish policeman PC Gary Shaw who reported the villains cut through the padlocks on farm field gates before racing through Bishops Lane.

He further reported four crimes in the parish in recent weeks including the theft of a vehicle. In a separate incident a chicken and a goat were stolen with a carcass later being found. A ride-on mower theft from a property in Barn Hill, led PC Shaw to warn that this is a common theft at this time of the year when householders should make sure equipment and outbuildings are secure.

Alarm at 'volunteers with speed guns'

Plans for volunteers from the community to be issued with radar guns to carry out checks on speeding motorists travelling through Hunton have been revealed, causing concern.

Parish councillor Gary Thomas is attending a Speedwatch briefing at Kent Police College to find out more about the scheme. The Council was told the partnership with parishes was planned in a bid to reduce the speed of vehicles travelling through villages and breaking speed limits. It would be achieved by a "programme of education, engineering and enforcement measures." "Speedwatch would involve volunteers recording speeds of offending vehicles and reporting these details to the police. The launch will include a presentation on how it will be managed, including training, equipment use and funding," say organisers.

Out & Out A Feast of Foliage Dead heading flowers is such a tedious task that I find myself drawn to plants which offer theatre without flowers, plants which need a spring time hair cut then just perform with very little other attention throughout the summer. In my sunny borders there are three such beautiful plants whose main attraction is their foliage. Melianthus Major is a steely, blue-green colour with leaves that are pleated and crimped, expanding to form an architectural mound about one metre tall. Catalpa Bignonioides 'Aurea' will grow to be a tree but if the branches are cut back each spring to about 30cm from the ground then it will form a large shrub with big, golden, heart shaped leaves. Also Helianthus Salicifolius grows as a pale green multi stemmed fountain; it is light and airy giving grace and movement to the border. All three have also come through the recent hot dry weather without any signs of stress. They don't need tidying up and will continue to look good, leaving me plenty of time to dead head the rest of the garden.

Associate Rector the Rev Ruth Bierbaum who has been ably covering Hunton, Coxheath, Linton and the two Farleighs since Roger left, along with Rev David Jones, had to obtain special dispensation from 10 Downing Street to allow the Herald to be given details of the new Rector for publication.

She told parishioners: "Please put the date in your diaries and come to the service to welcome Peter and his Australian wife Diana. It is planned for everyone to get together afterwards in the village hall for refreshments."

Did we Make Poverty History?: here is OXFAM's response

AID - good news here but not enough. The G8 promised to increase aid by around \$50bn a year by 2010. During the next five years, the delay will keep 300 million people trapped in poverty.

DEBT - cancelling poor countries' debt is essential - so that they can invest in health and education. The G8 agreed to help 18 countries initially. That's good news but we're pressing for many more to get the same support.

TRADE JUSTICE - there was little progress to make trade fair. We urgently need the G8 to end the export subsidies that force so many millions to live in extreme poverty.

The Associate Rector Ruth Bierbaum says: "The progress that has been made will obviously mean the difference between life and death for millions and that is amazing, but we can be a more amazing generation if we keep the pressure on for the talks in December regarding Trade Justice. Why not write directly to Mr Blair to let him know you're watching and waiting?"
