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## All we want for Christmas...

Hunton churchgoers are just hoping and praying for one special Christmas present this year - for St Mary's to be open in time for the festive services, traditionally among the best attended of the year.

Extensive tests have been carried out to check for asbestos dust or fibres in the centuries old church - the latest results coming through on Monday November 20th. These confirmed earlier reports that there is no evidence of asbestos contamination, other than that in the organ blower box which is to be removed in early December.

As soon as possible after this has been done, it is therefore hoped the old oak doors to the church will be opened again at the earliest opportunity, although it will not be possible to use the organ.

But PCC members warn that everything takes time with the Diocese having to be notified and authorisation gained for any further work that is necessary. Maidstone Borough Council's health and safety office will also need to confirm that tests establish beyond doubt that there is no danger to anyone entering the church.

The Rector, the Rev Peter Walker said: "Assuming the all-clear is given then at least we will be able to get back into the building again. Everyone sincerely hopes that this will be the case."

The dramatic closure came earlier this autumn when the organ tuner discovered that the blower box had an asbestos lining and his announcement began a testing time for the church leading to numerous meetings and consultations.

### Dorothy founded Burrswood as a Place of Healing

A group of parishioners recently made a visit to Burrswood – the Christian Hospital and Place of Healing. It was a windswept and rainy day as we arrived and made our way to the Church of Christ the Healer. Each Thursday they hold a healing service at 11.30am and also on a Saturday at 3.30pm. Burrswood was founded by Dorothy Kerrin who had received a miraculous healing when she was aged 22 and suffering with tubercular meningitis and peritonitis. When in a coma she had a vision of the Lord and angels asking 'will you go back?' She was charged to 'heal the sick, comfort the sorrowing and give faith to the faithless.' What a commission from God! Over many years and in due time Burrswood was established and has aided many others to also seek to fulfil that divine commission. People find the healing of Jesus through the skills of the nursing staff, doctors, counsellors and prayer. Stillness and beauty provide space for the Holy Spirit to enter people's lives afresh. The love of Jesus is at its very core. It is the love of God and Jesus which we remember now as we enter the season of Christmas. We read in the Scriptures: 'God so loved the World that He sent His Son'. What great love He has for us all!

As Jesus grew up and began his ministry with his disciples he taught them to do many things but primarily: 'to preach the Gospel to all nations and to heal the sick.' ## SPEED GUN COST FEARS ALLAYED

Residents' fears about excess money being spent on purchasing "speed guns to be used by volunteers" to check motorists driving through the village, are shared by parish councillors.

Members had been told the cost of acquiring the 'speed monitoring equipment' was likely to be £2000 to £3000. And although this cost could be shared by local councils or even be funded by TRAMP a group looking at traffic problems in Maidstone area rural lanes, Hunton councillors felt that checking on vehicles was best left to the police.

In the Speed Watch initiative, volunteers would be trained by police to supervise the equipment on roads known to have a speeding problem. Roadside recordings showing offenders repeatedly monitored above the limit would be forwarded to the police to take action if necessary.

One local resident has suggested that instead of volunteers learning to use speed guns they could come forward to help to operate the school warning lights; control the traffic as youngsters cross the road while also checking vehicles are parked safely. The situation could be improved if an approach to the highways authority to consider reducing the 40 mph speed limit to 30 mph in West Street was approved.

Council chairman Roger Sawtell stressed that it was difficult to see children coming from the school entrance onto the road in the evenings and street lighting was needed to make them more visible. The school has plans for a lighting and improvement scheme if the necessary funding is forthcoming.

The dangers of heavy freight lorries using Hunton Hill en route to farms in the area as well as depots in Paddock Wood and Marden, have also been highlighted. Gary Thomas felt that the authorities should be encouraged to provide routes for walking and cycling as many roads - like Hunton Hill - were dangerous to use.

The Parish Precept for the 2006/2007 financial year was set at £7500, enabling the Council to discharge more of its more urgent tasks from its own resources. Thanks were recorded to the Borough Council for the Concurrent Functions scheme which helped small villages like Hunton with expenditure which would otherwise be outside its means.

#### Flower arrangers needed

Since the end of September a 10-week Flower Arranging course has been held in the Village Hall on every Tuesdays from 1.00 p.m. to 3.00 p.m.

The Course is organised as part of the Kent Adult Education scheme and has been a great success. However for this to continue beyond the New Year it would be good to have some new members. ### Council 'should pay car damage bill'

The highways authority is being urged to compensate a second Hunton resident, lumbered with a heavy bill for a replacement wheel and tyre after being involved in a driving incident on Hunton Hill.

Ernie Chambers of Bensted Close told the parish council that his daughter was driving on the hill when she collided with a 'boulder' dislodged from the side of the road by a heavy lorry.

"She was on top of it before she saw it and if she had swerved she could have been involved in a collision with an oncoming car or a lorry which take up three parts of the road.

"It was highly dangerous and to make matters worse she had her four month old baby in the car. Finally adding insult to injury she had to pay £160 to repair the damage."

Earlier this summer another Bensted Close resident Judy Vicary damaged her car when hitting a pothole on the hill but so far she has been unsuccessful in her claims for compensation from the council.

Maidstone borough councillor Brian Mortimer suggested that reports made of every incident and accident should be passed on to the highways authority, urging remedial action. "Unfortunately it can take a fatal crash to prioritise improvements."

## A few days of breath taking beauty

Look at any book on winter gardening and there will be pictures of frost clad winter wonderlands with frozen crystals clinging wistfully to a remnant rose, and dead flowers made to sparkle by a mantle of ice.

These days are breath taking in their beauty but are so few that I no longer leave flower heads over winter unless they also look good on the more usual dull damp days.

Some left over foliage on herbaceous plants will be giving shelter to lady birds and other useful insects; seed heads can give much needed food to birds in the winter; and others can look structural in their dying back giving interest to the border.

Taking this into account my winter tidy up is piecemeal thinning out from the borders of what is past its usefulness or has collapsed into a soggy mess but leaving what still gives pleasure.

Another benefit of tidying like this is that you have to stand back and look at the border and it is often at these moments, when the garden is fading back to its bones, that you can judge whether the structure of the garden is

strong enough to support the flood of growth and colour to come.
