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West Street Footpath

An urgent call has been sounded - yet again - for a roadside footpath to be constructed from the village to the church, in a bid to make it safer for those walking to St Mary's and the village hall.

Parish Councillors have been pressing for years for a path as the road is used by speeding motorists making it dangerous for pedestrians - especially younger walkers.

In the past plans have been suggested for placing the path on the north side of the road, but with several different landowners this proved a problem. Lorraine Redfarn raised the possibility of siting it on the opposite side of the road.

Gary Thomas, giving a report from the TRAMPS transportation group to the Annual Parish Meeting, said that plans for a footpath - either to the church or from there to the foot of Hunton Hill - were included on a list of schemes needing priority action.

However, he added: "It could be several years before such a scheme finally gets the go-ahead - if ever! Walkways and cycle paths always seem to get the go-ahead for new housing estates in the area but villages like ours don't get improvements."

When Councillors discussed the possible installation of a sports wall for youngsters - similar to the one at Loose at the King George V Playing Fields in Hunton, it was stressed that a footpath would then be vital for youngsters visiting the site from the village.

Dear Friends,

HUNTON CLUB BOOK GROUP APRIL BOOK REVIEW - MISS GARNETT'S ANGEL BY SALLY VICKERS

Miss Garnett's Angel is the story of a respectable, middle-aged English woman who is overwhelmed by her first visit to Venice. Art, one of the themes that weaves through the book, links the story of Tobias and the Angel with the greatest emotional crisis in the life of the cool, retiring Miss Garnett.

Not all members enjoyed the way the two stories intertwined. Some members found it intriguing whilst others were disappointed with the storyline. Some felt that the story fizzled out at the end. However, most liked the fact that Miss Garnett's experience changed her life.

The group gave a very mixed response ranging from 2/10 to 8/10 for this book. Overall, we give it 7/10. **May's chosen book** is the Kite Runner by Khaled Hosseini. It is set in Afghanistan in the 1970's .

'Are the needs of our youngsters being ignored?'

Hunton Parish Councillors are being asked to consider providing the youth of the village - aged from 11 to mid teens - with a shelter and sports facilities to "keep the youngsters off the streets."

The idea for such a scheme has come from a meeting in Coxheath, called by the village community warden Claire Roberts and PC Gary Shaw. It was agreed to press for a steel framed sports wall with provision for basketball and football, linked with a youth shelter for Coxheath. This would be similar to the one provided in Loose - at a cost of around £25,000 and after a six-year battle by parish councillors.

"I know of youths in Hunton who have made their way to Loose just to play on the equipment," said Hunton councillor Lorraine Redfarn, who attended the Coxheath meeting with fellow members Keith Eatwell and Les Leonard. They were impressed with what they heard and agreed to raise the issue at the May Annual Meeting.

Mrs Totts the Coxheath Council Chairman reported that she had approached village youths and asked them what they would like. "They said that they wanted somewhere to sit and talk without being disturbed or moved on by the police. They often felt they were being ignored and adults were letting them down."

A Maidstone YMCA worker felt that every village had a duty to provide facilities for this age group, who were often over-looked and blamed for any outbreaks of vandalism. However, play equipment was nearly always provided for younger toddlers.

PC Shaw said that in most communities youngsters gather at a central point - in Coxheath at the main crossroads and can be viewed with alarm by villagers. "They need to be diverted into a 'safe' location where they can meet and enjoy themselves." The Loose Chairman explained that Open Days were held to promote the youth scheme while questionnaires were circulated. Finance was available from many sources including the County and Borough Councils as well as from the Lottery Fund.

Out and Out Alliums, a bulb for summer.

Most gardens manage a show of spring bulbs, they are easy to plant and return each year without too much bother, so why not extend the season with a summer flowering bulb? The most ornamental Alliums are just coming into flower now, my favourites have mauve globular flower heads which float or bob above their neighbouring plants. Allium 'Purple Sensation' has tall flowers and a rich purple colouring. These are good amongst herbaceous plants as they hide the leaves which will be dying off as the flowers start to open. Planted in widely spaced drifts these flowers will give uniformity to the border.

Another excellent Allium is *Cristophii* which has shorter stems but much larger mauve flowers with a wonderful metallic sheen. Also try *Shubertii* which has flowers that look like a firework frozen in mid-burst. These are slightly tender but survived in my garden through last winter although I did plant more to ensure a show this year. These alliums, planted in Autumn, prefer to be in sun with well drained soil, the dying leaves can be cut off as the flowers open if they are visible. Lastly don't be too quick to clear away the seed heads as these hold their shape once dead giving a further season of interest and seedlings if you're lucky.

All three alliums can be seen in gardens open for the National Garden Scheme in Hunton on the 18 June.

Theft Warning

PC Gary Shaw our local constable is very concerned over the increasing number of thefts from gardens. The culprits are bold, are entering premises during daylight hours, and are stealing machinery then or coming back later even after being challenged. He suggests you challenge the occupants of any unknown vehicle entering your property or driveway, even if their enquiries regarding scrap or the possibilities of gardening work seem plausible. Make sure you take the details of these vehicles. He says it is important to "get the registration number, colour, and note any marking" such as a dented wing or repainting. However he stresses that people can help themselves, having had reports of tractors being left unattended with their engines running and he notes that "ride on mowers are easily moved...so consider using ground spikes to fix them". Gary Shaw also says it is important to have a record of serial numbers of the engine and chassis in a safe place. And, just as usefully, mark machinery with your post code using UV pens, etching or welding the number to the frame.
