At one such service our Rector, Peter asked the children 'What is on your Christmas Wish list?', and instead of the usual material gifts, a couple of children expressed the desire for people to be nice to each other, and for no one to be hungry.

I suppose you could put these sort of wishes under the umbrella heading of 'Justice for All' for surely war comes out of a sense of injustice: and if the world markets were truly fair..would any need to starve?

Although the sentiments for Justice are there in many of us, as we get older we tend to become cynical, and often sacrifice such good desires for more immediate concerns - like our own health and happiness. But the verse we have chosen for our 2007 motto card, reminds us of Gods unswerving passion for justice.

"I, the Lord, have called you and given you power to see that Justice is done on earth" Isaiah 42 v 6

Did you realise that the coming of Jesus Christ is at the heart of God's plan for justice and that still today, what Jesus did on the cross holds the power of God to execute Justice?

I believe that one day his Justice will once and for all; overcome the wrongs this world has seen…but in the meantime he calls us to share his passion.

HUNTON CLUB BOOK GROUP NOVEMBER BOOK REVIEW BIRDSONG BY SEBASTIAN FAULKS

This is a simple story of love and the nightmare of Flanders mud, neither sensational nor sentimental. The book takes us into the grim horrors of trench warfare, the murderous first day on the Somme, the loony schemes of the general staff, the pains and fears of ordinary men and their officers, the letters to and from home and the incomprehension of war.

Most members of the group found the first quarter of the book, the affair between Isobelle and Stephen, quite tedious and were relieved as Stephen's character developed when he went to war. Faulks' graphic account of the war was amazing and from an historical point of view we found it fascinating and incredibly moving, particularly how the monotony and horror of the fighting affected the soldiers and dehumanised them.

Some members found the story of the war intertwined with a modern story irritating and it almost interfered with the real message of the book.

Overall, we found this book to be incredibly moving, thought provoking and educational as far as events of the war were concerned. Our score came out as 8/10 with many wanting to read more of Sebastian Faulks' work. The book for December is Touching the Void by Joe Simpson.

Roland Day, who must be known to nearly all readers of this journal, called me this weekend with a confession.

You will all know that Roland has now reached that stage of life where perhaps sitting in a chair in front of the television would be acceptable behaviour for him, after all that he has done for the village of Hunton.

However, that is not Roland, he is often seen in his green pick up, clearing rubbish, tidying the Church yard and even attempting to fill pot holes. His telephone call to me was to express his concern about the increasing damage to our environment caused by the constant heavy speeding traffic through our Village, and to ask me to write on his behalf to the Herald.

Recently a lorry went through the hedge at the playing field causing much damage to the hedge. Out and Out

Birds in Hunton

Hunton with the Buelt Valley, Amsbury Wood and all the little copses, patches of trees, ditches and streams, ponds and varied gardens has a surprisingly diverse range of habitats. This leads to a diverse range of wildlife. Over the last year, I have recorded the birds on a regular run around the parish. The results of my observations have been posted on the Hunton Website (www.hunton.org.uk/outout). 69 different species almost certainly breed in the parish. Some of these are Summer migrants, but they are replaced by a further 15 species that regularly spend the Winter with us. Many other species turn up just very occasionally - usually on passage. Other villagers interested in birds, have told me of their excitement at seeing Osprey, Red Kite, Hen Harrier and others within the Parish boundary. Today, as the year comes to an end, I have just seen a buzzard, harried by a crow, circle and fly over Elphicks Orchard in the bright winter sunshine looking spectacular. Long expected as its numbers increase in Kent, it is a salutary reminder in this age of doom and gloom, that there is much to look forward to. David Newman
