February, the shortest month in the year, is upon us. Christmas seems a distant memory and Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent, soon to arrive. Another year is well under way. The older I get, the faster time seems to pass by. The seasons no longer seem to be so defined with primroses in the churchyard at St Mary's already in bloom and many of the bulbs well through.

Each year I promise myself that I will enjoy each day, each season as it comes along rather than be forever looking forward to the next. I love snow, or the thought of it. But after the first fall, when everything is white and the sounds muffled, the slush arrives. Then I want the warmth to return and the melting, dirty snow to disappear.

I've booked my holidays already this year. Something I've seldom done before. Already we've decided what needs decorating in the house and doing in the garden. The year is planned and all we want is the weather to go with our dreams.

Are you, like me always, looking forward? Always wanting the next thing to happen because it ought to be better than the present. Worrying about things that might never happen. Always trying to be prepared for the worst? No wonder the years go by so fast as we fill the time with looking behind us and worrying about what we've done or preparing for the future rather than living in the present.

Luke tells us how Jesus told his disciples not to be forever worrying about everyday things; food, clothing etc, for life is more important than that. God wants us to have faith in Him and to trust in Him for the things of everyday.

Trusting in God means being concerned with his Kingdom and in doing that He provides for our daily needs. That's not easy in the World today when self-survival is valued so highly. ## OUT AND OUT Snowdrop Mania?

Snowdrops are one of the best known, most eagerly awaited flowers in the garden. Very few people would not recognise this delicate, elegant flower which is incredibly robust and has leaves adapted to pushing their way through unyielding frozen ground. The common Snowdrop (Galanthus Nivalis) is the true harbinger of Spring, marking the very beginning of the gardening year. However, there are also twentyone other species and many, many more cultivars.

At first glance Snowdrops all look pretty similar with their strap like leaves and white tear drop flowers but it is the subtle differences which turn normal gardeners into fanatical galanthophiles (Snowdrop collectors).

If you are going to the Snowdrop day at Southover in Hunton you may get a taste for these subtle differences. Look for differences in leaf colour and shape, are they glaucous or shiny green, thin or wide, smooth or pleated? Then consider the flower, do they have the standard three petals (tepals) on the outside and three smaller petals on the inside? Look for differences in the shape, size and movement of the flower, then look at the markings, usually a green smudge on the inner tepals, some are yellow and some even appear on the outer tepals. It doesn't take long to get addicted.

If your preference it to just take in a mass of these delicate flowers Southover has this, as does the churchyard in Hunton where snowdrops have gently spread over the years to carpet areas near the main door and in the new churchyard. However you like to see your Snowdrops Hunton can accommodate you.

Police in Mid Kent are appealing for information after two pygmy goats were stolen from the rear garden of a house in Darman Lane, near Paddock Wood on Christmas Eve. The pygmy goats are described as a brown and white male and a black and white female goat.

It is believed the male and female goats were taken at around 8pm on December 24<sup>th</sup> 2006, by two or three male offenders, who were possibly using a blue coloured 4x4 vehicle.

#### DECEMBER BOOK REVIEW

#### TOUCHING THE VOID BY JOE SIMPSON

In June 1985 Joe Simpson and Simon Yates, two young, but experienced, climbers set out to ascend the unclimbed west face of the remote 21,000 ft Siula Grande in the Peruvian Andes. They managed to achieve the summit before disaster stuck, leaving Simon Yates with an agonising decision to make - to cut the rope holding Joe or to surely die with him. A few days later Simon staggered into base camp, exhausted and frostbitten, to tell their non-climbing companion that Joe was dead. For three days he wrestled with guilt. Then, a cry in the night woke them and they found Joe, badly injured, crawling through the snowstorm in a delirium.

Our members looked forward to reading of Joe's struggle for survival and the seemingly impossible journey he was forced to make. However, we were all disappointed in the book. We felt very little emotion was captured and that something vital was missing throughout the story. We also felt that the two climbers were rather reckless and irresponsible. We were baffled by some of the technical terms used in the book and several of us felt we should have gone to fetch a dictionary whilst reading but agreed that we really couldn't be bothered. A glossary would have been a help.

Two of us did not finish the book with one member only reading to the end of the first chapter. It was interesting to note that those of us who had seen the film thoroughly enjoyed it and felt it was far better than the book.

The score we awarded was  $5\frac{1}{2}$  out of 10.

Our book for January is My Sister's Keeper by Jodi Picoult.
