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Road Safety Improvements for Hunton

Great news for Hunton's road safety improvement campaigners with new Kent County Council traffic regulations to reduce the speed limit through the village from 40 to 30mph.

The lower limit will come into effect in West Street from just north of Bensted Close and 85 metres south-west of Grove Lane. Bensted Close will become 30mph, as will the 40mph section of Elphicks Farm Road (Bishops Lane).

Hunton is one of 10 villages affected in the Kent County Council (Various Road Speed Limits for the Borough of Maidstone) Consolidation Order under the Road Traffic Regulation Act 1984, after consultation with the Chief Officer of Police.

The other village order that will affect Hunton motorists travelling to Maidstone is in East Farleigh where the 40mph speed limit in Dean Street will be reduced to 30mph from its southern terminal point near Horse Shoe Farm to 25 metres north of Workhouse Lane.

Arthur Morris

Publican Arthur Morris, described by his regulars at the White House, Barn Hill, as a "caring person who would always go out of his way for anyone needing help," has died aged 69. The well attended funeral took place at West Farleigh church in mid-March.

Arthur, a keen member of the Maidstone Licensed Victuallers Association, came to the district from his native Wales to complete National Service in the late 1950s when he met Jan at local stables. Later the couple were married.

Arthur and his wife Jan were licensees for 36 years, running the One & Only in Maidstone before buying the freehouse on the Hunton parish border. During their time in the licensed trade, with the support of their generous customers, they raised close to £50,000 for worthy causes and charities.

"While at the White House we have developed successful teams for those playing the French game of petanque after laying pitches at the back of the pub as well as more traditional pub games like darts. The pub has also become a popular venue for local walkers," said Jan who has pleased regulars with her brave decision to carry on running the business.

(did you see the lively discussion on Richard and Judy recently, about the nature of Jesus' resurrection)?

As a firm believer that Jesus is well and truly alive today, I know that when you decide to put your faith in him, it costs everything... submitting to Jesus as Lord and King means a whole turn around in a person's thinking and living. It brings with it new responsibilities... but, because he *is* alive, that faith becomes a channel through which you will receive new life, in oh-so-many-ways. So that once you have him in your life, you cannot image life without him, and all the so called "costs" pale into insignificance.

So, whilst conspiracy theories might have their attraction this Easter, don't let them trick you into avoiding the real issue and missing out on the amazing new life that is on offer.

Year of Wonders by Geraldine Brooks

Spring 1666: when the Great Plague reaches the quiet Derbyshire village of Eyam, the villagers make an extraordinary decision. They elect to isolate themselves in a fateful quarantine. So begins the Year of Wonders, seen through the eyes of an eighteen year old as she confronts the loss of her family and the disintegration of her community. Based on a true story, this novel explores love and learning, fear and fanaticism and the struggles of seventeenth-century science and religion to interpret the world at the cusp of a modern era.

Most of us enjoyed the book finding the historical aspect interesting. We also thought it was well written with the author showing a nice style of writing. If there were any complaints there were just three: (1) the storyline became a little too repetitive; (2) the heroine was just slightly too good to be true and (3) the ending was a trifle hurried and unrealistic. Scores out of 10 ranged from 5 to 9 giving an average score of 7. Our book for March is the Bookseller of Kabul by Asne Seierstad

Starfish Malawi is a Christian organisation seeking to make a difference to as many people as possible in Malawi.

Friends Malawi is the schools' arm which has linked up 100 schools in Kent, Sussex and Essex with schools in Malawi. Hunton School is one of these.

The next vision is to link villages in Kent with villages in Malawi so that individual needs can be identified and help can be directly given.

We went out to Malawi as a family last Easter and were privileged to meet some of the people of Malawi and to have the opportunity to see first hand how they live, to understand their village structure and to see their needs. (which are varied and many).

Malawi has been struck, like many African countries, by Aids and other illnesses that have left many orphans and single parent families who are not only looking after their own children but also the children of many other relatives who have died. We were struck strongly by how the villagers were willing to put themselves out for each other. In one instance some villagers would regularly work for free on some land owned by an orphanage so that the children had food to eat and were able to go to school instead of working the land themselves.

Out and Out - The Heat is On

Two hot summers and recent hose pipe bans have got gardeners thinking how they can adapt to cope better with these challenges. There is plenty of good advice around involving organic matter, planting times, careful watering and saving water. All this advice will help the garden cope but here are some alternative tips to help you. Enjoy your garden in spring and early summer, aim for impact with bulbs which will retreat before the summer heat. Relish the simplicity of a perfectly trimmed evergreen hedge, welcome brown lawns, they don't need cutting, and turn a blind eye to crispy plants they'll probably regenerate with the autumn rains; if they don't replant with something that will. Avoid plants such as phlox and rudbeckia which wilt at the first sign of dryness, they only inspire guilt and don't show much gratitude for your efforts with a watering can.

I would love to hear how you coped over the last two summers, tips sent to the editor will get to me and could be printed. My last tip comes from Vita Sackville-West of Sissinghurst fame - don't stay in your garden over the summer - go on holiday!!

Freedom Day

March 25th marked the 200th anniversary of the Abolition of the Transatlantic Slave Trade. Something to celebrate? Well in a way.... because we know now (as if there were any doubt) that it is wrong to treat people as commodities which can be bought, sold and owned. Wilberforce fought a very long and uphill battle to get slavery stopped.

The Film

You might want to go to watch the newly released film "Amazing Grace", about the life of Wilberforce and the struggle against slavery, directed by Michael Apted, with Ioan Gruffudd playing the role of Wilberforce.

Knowing his family's East Farleigh connections, the makers of the film visited the ancient Parish Church of East Farleigh, during the filming. The title is a reference to the hymn "Amazing Grace" and the film also recounts John Newton's writing of that same hymn, when he realised the wretchedness of his sin, in being involved in the slave trade.
