Rich or Poor?

I've just finished reading a letter from an unnamed Turkish Christian. It is printed in the latest *Christian Solidarity Worldwide* magazine - a sort of Christian version of Amnesty International.

There are only about 2000 Christians in Turkey, in a population of 75 million. The writer tells of how very difficult it is to be in such a minority, and asks the challenging question of the rest of the church: "**Brother**, where are you in the hour of our distress?".

It reminds me of how privileged we are to have freedom to worship Jesus Christ without fear in this country, and how important is the fellowship we share, particularly when we meet together.

Around 70% of people in this country call themselves Christian. Maybe you are one of them. Yet fewer than 10% of us come together to worship God on a weekly basis.

Is that why, I wonder, the persecuted church feels forgotten by their brothers and sisters in the rest of the world?

Is it that those of us who are free to worship without fear, forget to worship at all?

It is that we have forgotten that God wants to be at the centre of our lives and not just an add on for when we need help?

Is it that when we fail to put God in his rightful place in our lives, we also forget about his people - our spiritual family?

Is it that we, who seem to be rich, are more spiritually desperate than those who cry to us for help?

Could it be that this letter from Turkey is a wake-up call to Christians in the "free-world" to come back to the heart of worship in Jesus, who was persecuted because he held you at the centre of his heart?

If you have been away from the fellowship of the church for a while, why not take the opportunity this autumn to come back. You'd be welcome at any of our services. We can arrange a lift if you let us know your need. Or if you prefer, why not try a fellowship group? If you can't get out, you could call us to ask for a visit or home communion.

Our fellowship is precious. In it we all become rich.

Hunton Club Book Group - August Book Review

The Glass Palace by Amitav Ghosh

A stately and vibrantly detailed family saga set in south-central Asia against the tumultuous backdrop of the 20th century. *The Glass Palace* is the story of Rajkumar, an Indian shop boy orphaned in Mandalay, who, on the eve of the 1885 British invasion, falls in love with Dolly, a handmaiden to the Queen of Burma. The conquering British send Burma's King Thebaw and his loyal court, including the young handmaiden, into exile in remote India. Rajkumar, left behind in Burma, is adept at working the new colonial system, and he manages to build a thriving lumber business in the growing teak trade.

Years later, elegantly dressed in English clothes, Rajkumar sets off to India to find Dolly. The long years in exile have devastated the royal family, leaving Dolly as their only servant. Through the wiles of the colonial administrator's wife, Uma Dey, Rajkumar wins an audience with Dolly and convinces her to return to Burma and marry him. She agrees, and shortly after her departure everything falls apart. The royal family is embroiled in scandal, the administrator commits suicide, and Uma, grieving more over the absence of her dear friend Dolly than over her husband's death, eschews the traditional life of an Indian widow and goes abroad, where she becomes a revered leader of India's burgeoning independence movement. This is only the beginning. The story of Uma, Dolly, Rajkumar and their children, nieces, and nephews takes us from the rubber boom of the industrial age to the front lines of World War II, from India's struggle for independence to Burma's fall and its transformation into Myanmar under a military dictatorship.

The draw of distant and lush lands, of the rubber plantations of Malaysia, the teak forests of Burma, the bustling city streets of Rangoon and Singapore, bearing witness to the demise of the Burmese monarchy and the rise and fall of the British empire, these were the historical events that enticed us into wanting to read this book. The reality of the novel surprised some of us and we were left feeling just a little disappointed. The characters were one-dimensional, there were too many names to recall, the military sections dull and we became bored with the detailed description of each and every car that any member of the family drove! Most of us finished the book but some members didn't. We felt that some chapters were really exciting and encouraged us to read on, then we'd move onto a section that would cut our interest. Somehow the promise was not quite met. Although one or two of us gave high scores, the majority didn't which gave us a score of 7 out of 10.

Our book for September is The Sixth Lamentation by William Broderick.

Out and Out

Topiary

Topiary is probably the best fun you can have in the garden with a pair of clippers in your hands. The art of clipping shrubs into controlled shapes dates back to Ancient Egypt and appears throughout gardening history as the mainstay of formal gardens and the anchor for informal gardens. Today topiary is ideal for use in smaller gardens when not only the shape but the size of the plant can be determined.

Box is probably the best plant to use for a first foray into this art, its small leaves and dense growth are ideal as is its ability to recover from close clipping. Yew is also good but is best used for a larger feature.

Simple geometric shapes are easiest to start with, then as you get more confident a cone could be converted to a spiral or a ball into a chicken. Clipping need only be done twice annually and even this task is described as pleasurable and highly satisfying by those who have had the fun of creating their own topiary sculpture.
