Dear Fellow Readers

This letter is being written a month before you read it so it can be difficult to be topical in this fast changing world we live in today. But I can at least try to be relevant!

Last month was the traditional time when churches celebrated harvest. No longer the crops 'being safely gathered in ere the winters storms begin' for so many of our crops now come from all round the world and harvest is global. Yet the idea of thanking God for all the 'good gifts around us' and recognising that they do come from God, is a wonderful truth that poly tunnels, controlled growing and improved fertilizers, ought not to destroy. We need to give thanks for the world that God has created for us, for all that He provides so freely.

November, on the other hand, has become the time for remembrance: a time to look at the ways that the perfect order that God created has been marred by hatred, injustice, greed and envy. November is the time we recall the lives of those men and women lost or injured in war. Wars are still sadly part of our lives. Maybe not in the way our parents and grandparents were involved, but today, in the modern multi-media reported wars that are on our televisions screens every day, 24 hrs a day, week in and week out. In war we see the perfection that God created being destroyed, in human lives seemingly valueless, being cast aside in the greed of those who would seek to gain power, territory and wealth. Sadly, so many of the conflicts are fought in the name of justice and freedom for the oppressed.

But it's so easy to move on from these events, to think in both the harvest and war situations, to the next step. To move on to think of poverty without spending time giving thanks to God for the world he has created and for the good things that we enjoy. In thinking of war we move on to think of peace because perhaps it makes it so much better. Yet there is a time to remember and recall the awfulness of war, it's far from pretty sights, it ugliness, and its injustice. The individual suffering together with the vast number of dead and injured is a horrendous picture. The thought of peace is a much better.

The writer of the book in the Bible called Ecclesiastes, (Ecclesiastes chapter 3 verses 1 - 8) says that there is a time for everything. We ought not always to be rushing on to the next phase of our lives without 'working through' the present. For it is this present experience that forms our future thoughts and actions. In giving thanks to God for the riches of his harvest and his goodness to us so we can indeed move on to our concerns for those who do not experience the same richness. To reflect on the awfulness and horror of war and its effect on individuals makes our efforts for peace even stronger.

Out and Out - Do You Dig?

Digging is a great form of exercise for garden minded people, not only does it improve your physique but it also improves the physique of the soil. It gets air into the soil to encourage beneficial bacterial activity. Heavy soils are exposed to the elements to help break them down allowing better root penetration and any seeds or insects turned up will fall prey to hungry birds. Of course if you add organic matter as you dig this will improve drainage and fertility as well.

Digging should be taken gently, tackle a small section to start with and take small slices of soil to reduce the weight of the spade. For those people who find traditional spades tiring (and painful) for their backs it may be worth trying one of the long handled spades. I have one (bought in Scats) which has a long straight handle and a pointed blade. It took a while to get used to using this but once mastered it is much easier on my back as the weight is taken by your shoulders. In fact my family, who laughed at my spade at first, now make a beeline for it if any digging is needed; I now own 3 of them!

I love the rhythm of digging, the feeling of doing something beneficial and, with the sun on your back and the anticipation of a steaming bath to rest those limbs, how better to enjoy the autumn colours outside?

Hunton Club Book Group - September Book Review The Sixth Lamentation by William Broderick

What should you do when the world has turned against you? When Father Anselm is asked this question by an old man in the nave at Larkwood Priory, his response is simple: claim sanctuary. Then the old man demands just that: his name is Eduard Schwermann and he is wanted by the police as a suspected war criminal.

With her life running out, Agnes Aubret feels it is time to unburden her secrets to her grandaughter Lucy. Fifty years earlier, Agnes had been living in Occupied Paris, a member of a small group smuggling Jewish children to safety – until they were exposed by a young SS Officer, Eduard Schwermann......

As Anselm uncovers Schwermann's past and, as Lucy's search into her grandmother's history continues, their investigations dovetail to reveal a remarkable story.

This book held such promise for many of us, what a good beginning, drawing us into the wonderful story, then disappointment set it. We become lost among the pages, having to "look back" to keep the flow, to stay with the characters. We felt we'd missed out on something vital, yet didn't. Most of us continued to finish the book, although some members didn't. Others thought it wonderful, so our opinions are of a very mixed nature.

The story was neatly rounded off at the end, with characters being appropriately placed in their boxes. A quote from the book "only in books do loose ends get tied up" applies perfectly.

We had a score of 9 and one of 3 but overall our average worked out to 6 out of 10.
