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Road Erosion

Hunton Parish Councillors have expressed alarm at the erosion of the road bordering the King George V Playing Field and fear that there could be a major accident with the roadside hedge collapsing and causing a vehicle to veer off the highway.

Kent Highways, in replying to the Council's complaint, say that future kerbing work is being considered but the works are "dependent on funding and priorities."

Maidstone Borough Councillor, Colin Parr, pledged to raise the problem when he next meets highway authority officers and he will also raise the Council's call for a footpath between Bensted Close and the village hall.

"They have assured us that remedial work has been carried out," said Colin adding that he was trying to establish a better dialogue with Kent Highways so that mini joint transport group meetings can be held.

Signs to Stop Juggernauts Heading for Hunton

Signs have been erected outside a lorry depot in a bid to stop juggernauts trying to negotiate narrow lanes in the village.

The signs, in several languages, have been put up by Berry Gardens, the large distribution depot in Redwall Lane. This follows action by residents living at Elm Corner who contacted Berry Gardens after a huge lorry was stuck at the junction of Redwall Lane and George Street for more than four hours last month.

Fay Joyce, who has been pressing for action, said: "They have been very helpful in putting up the signs which tell the drivers not to turn right along Redwall Lane towards Hunton". "We are very grateful and hope this will at least discourage some of the larger vehicles".

"But it is a first step. We will now be asking the parish council to urge Kent County Council to put up more signs to tell drivers that Redwall Lane is only suitable for lorries from Linton Hill up to the depot and not for its whole length."

Dear Fellow Readers

I'm just back from Butlins in Minehead having attended Spring Harvest, a Christian Conference held now for 30 years and attended by about 30,000 people over a 3 week period each year in Skegness and Minehead. Six days of teaching, worship and holiday all rolled into one.

For that short period the events of the world are blotted out. Interest rates, murders, election swindles, corruptions are no longer part of life. No more thoughts about the mundane matters that take over our thinking and our lives. (Fortunately, some important news slips in over the fence, so we heard of the success of Cardiff, Chelsea, Liverpool and Manchester United!). We are taken out of our everyday existences for a moment.

Arriving back home to the real world, the first news on Breakfast TV was of the proposed ban by Southwark Cathedral of the hymn, Jerusalem by William Blake, being sung in the cathedral. It had, in the words of the spokesman, become words more associated with the Last Night of the Proms, football, national events and of course the anthem of the Women's Institute. It had lost its focus on the praise of God, so was not a hymn.

Our theme this year at Spring Harvest was Hope. Hope is a strange word, for in everyday usage it can focus on a 'wishful thinking' kind of hope. The hope comes without any real concrete evidence to suggest the outcome will be as we would like or wish. We use the expressions such as 'hope is fading....' or, 'we hope a drug or an operation will......', we hope for better weather.....' etc. meaning that we are not certain of the outcome. We buy Lottery tickets in the 'hope' that we will win.

Yet, hope, when used in the Bible is never used in the 'wishful thinking, sense. Such hope is not built on the right conditions, nor on the prevailing circumstances being right, nor what man possesses, what he can do for himself or others can do for him. We perhaps don't think of the word hope being used in terms of certainty, expect, rely or trust. That hope, expressed in the Bible, is based on faith in God, in a God who sent his Son Jesus into the world to be the saviour of that world. Not a wishful thinking hope but on the sure hope found in Christ Jesus.

Blake's great hymn, is a hymn in my book because it speaks of that sure hope that comes from Jesus, the Lamb of God, coming to a world lost in human values and forever seeking happiness in the things of little lasting worth. What Blake called for is a world in which the values of the new Jerusalem would flourish based upon God's certain values of social justice and freedom.

I hope the hairs on the back of your neck rise each time you sing Jerusalem as you 'hope' for the certainty of the life based in Jesus Christ, knowing that in all your joys and sorrows, in all your pain and grief, Jesus walks with you on your journey.

Out and Out Orchards

The orchards of Hunton are the most important areas in the parish for wintering birds. The fallen fruit attracts large flocks of thrushes, with up to 1000 Fieldfare and smaller numbers of Redwing, Blackbirds, Song Thrushes and Mistle Thrushes. Flocks of Starlings add their ventriloqual noises to the babble. Hedges within or around the orchard attract Chaffinches and the occasional Brambling as these like to feed on the ground but close to a hideaway should a Sparrowhawk appear. Near ground-level there is a good field of view due to the regular tree spacing, but the tangle of branches at our eye-level means birds can quickly hide. Echinchola Crusgalli, an uncommon millet-like grass seems to thrive in one of the orchards and is very popular with many seed-eaters such as Linnets, Reed Buntings, Yellowhammers and Greenfinches. As Winter moves into Spring, and the fallen fruit is largely gone, the large flocks of Thrushes and Starlings move out to pastureland, or the village playing fields where they search for worms and insects in the short grass.

Could you be a Friend of St Mary's Church?

Since the Anglo-Saxon era, more than a thousand years ago, there has been a church on this site in the village. The church that can be seen today has it's origins in the Norman period, with later additions in the succeeding centuries right through to the nineteenth century. The church has been the centre of village life throughout this period and not just as a place of worship. It is worth remembering that it was also the centre of local government until the late nineteenth century. But these were only functions of the building, the building itself is, to a large extent, the expression in a physical form of generations of local people. The structure is built of local rag stone and the tower roof is clad in shingles; very much Kentish style. Within the church are monuments paid for and, to some extent, made by local craftsmen. Significant artefacts include the fane memorials; Prime Minister Campbell –Bannerman memorial and the stained glass, some of which dates back to the fifteenth century.

To maintain the structure and fabric of a building, which in parts is nearly a thousand years old is expensive. To help with this, the idea has been floated of forming a 'Friends of St Mary's', a charity with its own constitution acting outside the PCC, for the raising of funds, for the preservation and improvement of the structure and fabric of the church. Hunton Club Book Group March Book Review

The Alchemist by Paulo Coelho

This is the story of Santiago, an Andalusian shepherd boy, who dreams of travelling the world in search of a treasure as extravagant as any ever found. From his home in Spain he journeys to the exotic markets of Tangiers and then into the Egyptian desert, where a fateful encounter with the alchemist awaits him.

The critics tell us that every few decades a book is published that changes the lives of its readers forever. Paulo Coelho's The Alchemist is reputed to be such a book. Indeed 27 million copies have been sold worldwide and the novel has already achieved the status of a modern classic. So why did we fail to agree with this opinion? The majority of us were disappointed, felt the story rather weak, not stimulating and wouldn't recommend it to anyone. We did feel that perhaps something of its attraction may have been lost in translation but maybe we were clutching at straws in an effort to try to understand why we failed to share in its appeal to others.

A few of us did enjoy the read however and liked the profound messages but only one of us would sit down to read another book by this author.

Our score reflects our opinions and gave us an average of 5½ out of 10.
