Hunton School News - Global Awareness Week

The school had a fantastic week where the children learnt a great deal about other countries, cultures and environmental issues.

Letter from Ruth

And finally...

I saiah 45 v 3

This is a promise of God to his servant(s), as spoken through the Old Testament Prophet Isaiah. It is a significant one to me because through it I have felt God calling me to minister to those with mental health problems. This is not a step I take lightly. My roots have grown down deep in this place and taking them up is not only do it because I believe this is God's will... and after all what a promise: I will give you the treasures of darkness. As I look at those verses from I saiah, an unexpected truth occurs to me - that it is in darkness, in the difficult times, in the bereavements and the losses, in the valley of the shadow of death, that God says He will increase my faith, your faith! That isn't what we expect, is it? Surely suffering leads to doubt and a loss of faith! I have spoken to many who have chosen that path. Certainly, when faced with suffering the guestion "Why" can be dominant. We can't understand God's reasoning. We can't work out why He doesn't answer our prayers the way that, say I would, if I were God. In the Old Testament, before Samson is conceived, God appears as a man to Samson's parents to tell them about the special child they will have, and when they ask what this man's name is He says *"I t is beyond understanding"...* in other words it is *"wonderful*"; in other words: *full of wonder*, in still others words *wisdom unreachable.* So maybe here is one precious jewel to be going on with, for you and for me... that we do not need to understand God's ways, for we will never do that, but rather we need to trust Him. Trust Him in the day. Trust Him in the night. That as we walk through the changes and the valleys of uncertainty, all God asks us to do is keep proclaiming his name "Wonderful". "I cannot understand you God, but I trust in your victory over death. I trust in you". And as you do that, you *will* in some very personal way hear Him calling your name and calling you "my beloved" and "my precious child". In that simple faith, may we walk as Jesus bids, together? With love and thanksgiving for all the years and all the encouragements.

Out and Out - A Lot of Light Weeding

Hunton Village Book Club Review for May 2008 'The Old Man and the Sea' by Ernest Hemingway

The Old Man and the Sea is a tale of a man and a fish, man versus nature and of the culture of manhood, courage and bravery in the face of existence. It's also a history of what life was like when individuals were more the central actor on the human stage and not groups or organisations.

At the most basic level, after 84 days without hooking a decent fish, the very elderly fisherman, Santiago, goes out in his small fishing boat and hooks a gigantic 18 foot long sword fish. The battle then begins and the fish drags the small boat and Santiago far out to sea. For two days they battle. Santiago wins, but then loses the great fish on the way home to the scavenger sharks who find him easy prey.

A couple of the club members enjoyed this book, thought it was well written and held their imagination. The majority felt the subject matter revolving around "fishing" was a theme which was not to their taste. As such the general consensus was that the book was a light read which may well have had a deeper meaning most of us failed to find.

The book scored an average of 6.
