Dear Friends,

God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself' (2 Cor 5:19)

Without vision the people perish' (Proverbs 29:18)

You know the saying you wait for the bus which never seems to come, and then three come along at once.

I have just attended two conferences within the space of two weeks. The first was actually a retreat for the clergy of the Malling Deanery. It was organised by our Rural Dean, Jim Brown of East Malling. The retreat was led by Bishop Brian and the venue was a retreat house about one hour's journey from Calais. Four cars transported the twelve clergy to Dover and hence to the ferry for the 75 minute crossing. Bishop Brian gave us a number of talks on the subject of 'reconciliation'. His Lent book on this subject is being published in late November. One phrase which struck with me was: 'when one fails to forgive another, it imprisons both the unforgiven person and you'. It reminded me of something similar I learnt a long time ago: 'to be unforgiving towards another is as if one locks that person in prison and throws away the key'. The Scriptures tell us: 'God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself'. Again, Jesus tells us to be reconciled one to another.

It's often a hard lesson to learn and carry out! We need to seek God's grace to be our help in all such times.

A week later another ship came along – it was the 'Black Prince' sailing from Liverpool to Dublin. It was the occasion of the Annual Conference of CVM (Christian Vision for Men). This was an opportunity for some of our '5P Men's group' in the United Benefice to attend this. Six of us hurtled up the motorway in a hired people-carrier to board the ship and enjoy two days of excellent teaching, worship and fellowship. There was also the opportunity to visit the city of Dublin. 'Band of Brothers' was the theme and it was certainly that as some 300 men came together.

The vision which had its beginnings 15 years ago with Max Sinclair (who lives near Sevenoaks) has as its goal 'to win the men of this country for Christ'. It seems an impossible vision, but over the years many have come to know the Lord Jesus as a reality through this organisation's passion. The 5P group affiliated to CVM earlier this year and we are grateful to Mike Marsh of Coxheath for his heading up this and organising events throughout the year to bring men together.

There is a statistic which brings home to us the need for men to come to faith. That is, that if a man comes to Christ there is near a 90% probability to bring his family to Jesus than any other member of that family. The Harvest is indeed ripe!

Hunton Book Club - Book Review Dirk Bogarde by John Coldstream

The authorised biography of Dirk Bogarde by the former literary editor of the Daily Telegraph is an erudite account of the life of the film actor and best-selling author. Ironically, the book seems insufficiently edited; the research is so thorough that it is hard to imagine that there is anything left to say. There are detailed descriptions of proposed film projects which never came to fruition. A dedicated student would find the book an invaluable source but a reader looking for entertainment is likely to prefer Bogarde's own witty style in his series of autobiographies.

We gave the book a score of four out of ten. Next month's book is Mister Pip by Lloyd Jones.

Out and Out

Bonfires

Bonfires are central to the traditional celebrations of November the 5th and who doesn't love to hear the crackle and fizz and see the shapes etched into the darkness by leaping, shifting flames?

But bonfires used to clear rubbish can be a cause of aggravation when smoke drives people inside on warm summer's evenings or leaves drying washing with an unpleasant smell. So what are the guidelines for causing least aggravation?

A good gardener should aim to keep bonfires to a minimum by composting as much material as possible. Woody material can be shredded or taken to the dump for disposal, as can diseased material and pernicious weeds. A lot of my woody prunings go into an 'eco pit' where it slowly rots down, but I will burn prickly prunings and a huge pile of twiggy apple prunings which may harbour honey fungus.

To keep smoke nuisance to a minimum try to dry out material before burning, choose a day when there is a light wind to blow smoke away from neighbouring properties and never burn household rubbish which contains plastic, rubber, foam or paint. Using an incinerator can also help. But don't forget that the best time to have a bonfire when it will cause least aggravation is on November the 5^{th} .

Praise God also that I am able to drive, even a manual, and have no horrible flashbacks or phobias.

This is really about Christ's power to heal, rather than any bravery on my part.

God has been faithful throughout this difficult time - alongside me.

'Come near to God and He will come near to you' is the promise found in James 4:8, and one that I have found to be true. May you also know the strength and peace of the presence of Christ alongside in all the interesting episodes of your lives.
