# Costly and confusing - working party to report on footpath

An initial costing of £70,000 given by Kent Highways for installing the much-needed footpath between Bensted Close and the Village Hall, has now more than doubled to £175,000.

The figures for a length of 500 metres, include excavation and soil removal (£18,000); to replant a new hedgerow (£3,000); new highway construction (£75,000); drainage works (£27,000); and carriageway re-profiling (£52,000).

Hearing these details given to the November Parish Council meeting, Chairman Roger Sawtell, felt there was still confusion over the exact work and the ownership of the land involved. As it was such a major project he felt that a working party needed to further analyse exactly what was involved and make a report.

# A call too far - phone box to go

Hunton's only telephone box in West Street, outside the village club, is to be removed by BT after a questionnaire sent to villagers failed to raise enough support for keeping the service.

There were only 27 replies from the 350 residencies contacted through the Hunton Herald and just six of those wanted to keep the phone after hearing that it would cost an annual payment of £500 for a term of agreement over 15 years.

BT decided on the removal after giving figures showing that during the past year there were only 216 calls made from the kiosk.

## Exploring play equipment and upgrading facilities

The King George Playing Fields Committee is looking into a scheme to upgrade the children's play equipment at a cost of around £1,740.

Committee Chairman Keith Eatwell reported the costing from M&M of Marden, (on the approved suppliers list), for resurfacing beneath the swings and climbing frame and carrying out other essential work.

The committee is also considering installing CCTV equipment to prevent vandalism; the Bowls Club is planning an extension to the front of their pavilion; and a volunteer work party has carried out resurfacing work and pothole filling in the playing fields car park, with materials costing £96.

## Houses shake as traffic continues to speed

An impassioned plea for new measures to slow down traffic in West Street before there is a fatality, has been made by new Parish Councillor Ron Porter.

He reported that for one woman living in West Street the speeding traffic was having an adverse affect on her life, while others said that their houses shake when heavy lorries rumble by.

Mr Porter queried whether the council should seek to use Speed Watch cameras to collate figures to show the speed of vehicles using West Street outside the village school. "I think the authorities would be staggered at some of the high speeds."

But John Wilson of neighbouring Farleigh said that from his experience such figures were not of help when petitioning the Highways Authority to take action.

Kent County Councillor Paulina Stockell said that she would ask Highways officers to carry out a speed survey over several days in West Street.

#### OCTOBER BOOK REVIEW - MISTER PIP by LLOYD JONES

On an island called Bougainville in the early 1900s, civil war rages. Rebels have taken up arms and soldiers helicopter in from nearby Port Moresby. All the whites have fled the island except one, Mr Watts, a New Zealander married to a local woman. He offers to replace the departed teacher and reopens the village school except there is only one book - Great Expectations. Mr Watts uses Pip's travails in Victorian England as a way of showing the children that there is more to life than the misery that now surrounds them. We join one child, Maltilda on her journey of discovery, tragedy and hope when Mr Watts inflames the children's imaginations with dreams about Dicken's London.

This is a delightful book which we enjoyed reading. Jones' work is descriptive, multi-layered and enthralled us all, transporting us to share in the life of the islanders in the South Pacific. When the horrors of war interrupt they shock us with the starkness of atrocities. A thoroughly good read!

Our score reflects our opinions and gave us an average of 7 out of 10.
