Parish Council News

Village Fete to be Cancelled Disappointing news came at the Hunton Parish Council annual meeting when Keith Eatwell chairman of the King George V Playing Fields Committee said that the Village Fete has had to be cancelled. It had been planned for June 27th, but it was discovered that this date clashed with a number of other local events while a number of people who had offered support had pulled out.

"Next year we must start making arrangements much earlier and get volunteers in place," he said, reporting that the committee, backed by the three sports clubs and village hall, had carried out improvements to the play equipment bringing the swings and climbing frame up to RoSPA safety standards. Car park potholes had been repaired. Council chairman Roger Sawtell told the 24 villagers attending the meeting in mid-May that the gathering presented an ideal opportunity for all clubs and organisations within the community to come together.

The Bowls Club Brian Geddes of the 50-member Bowls Club reported a successful season in which the ladies team had competed for the first time in the Maidstone League and finished mid-table.

Fund-raising had taken place to extend the pavilion and improve the surrounding fencing. The next project is to upgrade the changing areas. During the season from April to September 135 fixtures had been played.

The Football Club Keith Eatwell said the Football Club's first team had been promoted and finished sixth in the Premier Division of the Maidstone League in which the club has been playing for 112 years.

The Reserves started well and ended fourth in their league and were beaten in the Tunbridge Wells Charity Cup Final. Sixty playing members meant that there was more choice for team selectors.

The Village Hall Alan Bishop said that the Village Hall bookings were down, perhaps because of the recession but there were "green shoots showing" with a surge in reservations. The hall was in good shape and on a financially sound footing with plans to improve the frontage.

School News Headmistress Sue Wood said that last year the Village School had scored above the national average in the SATS exams, while Ofsted and Church of England inspections produced outstanding reports.

The school is looking forward to the opening of the fourth classroom on June 8th which will make a big difference with 12 reception pupils having a class of their own. She thanked the Parish Council for its efforts in getting a footpath constructed between the Village Hall and Bensted Close, enabling parents to park and bring pupils to school, improving the safety conditions and reducing the number of cars in the village centre.

The Village Club Allan Peckham said that the Village Club has been enhanced and improved and the committee is always looking for support from villagers. Improvements had been made to the electrical circuits and flat roof while new carpets and toilets had been installed after flooding. A variety of events are regularly arranged from bingo to race nights. Membership is down, but thanks to members' voluntary efforts, finances are in good health.

The Alms Houses Ruth Porter reported that the electrical system had been improved at the Peace Cottages almshouses and that central heating was to be installed as part of a five year plan.

The occupants have remained the same and when asked what improvements they would like, some called for shower installations; lowering windows to let in more light and kitchen improvements. Beryl Wenham was thanked for keeping the gardens in good shape.

St Mary's Church Alison Ellman-Brown said the St Mary's Church congregation was steady at an average 18, while the festive services had been well attended. The strong and enthusiastic fabrics committee led by David Way was working well, while his wife Anke was proving successful in sourcing grants. Bell ringers were playing regularly while a team of volunteers keep the churchyard tidy. Ron Porter said that the Friends of St Mary's, aiming to maximise the benefits of the church and preserve its beauty, is now an officially established charity and had received donations topping £2000. Members are being sought for a £10 annual subscription.

Likewise we have seen an increase in the number of injuries sustained by our pets, so that Grove Lane now appears more dangerous than the roads of central London.

Pets teach our children compassion and respect for life in all its forms. We ask all those who drive in or along Grove Lane to please do the same.

Out and Out - Don't Try This at Home

There are some unwelcome guests in our gardens which seem to be able to defy eradication. I am talking about the larger weeds, such things as tree seedlings and brambles which grow undetected amongst shrubs and the first you know of them is when they wave mature branches at you triumphantly above your carefully nurtured and loved shrubs. A new method which I may be trying in my garden is to cut off these stems, somewhere near the ground if possible, and then carefully paint the cut end with a concentrated solution of glyphosate. If I was to try this I would buy a bottle of the liquid which is designed to be diluted for spraying and use it neat painting it on with a small brush. This means the chemical goes exactly where it is needed and reduces the possibility of spray drift. EU regulations probably outlaw this unproven method (always read instructions and take the necessary precautions

when using any chemicals around the garden) so don't say you saw it here but suffice it to say that over the winter there are several dead looking stumps of elderberry and ash around my garden and a few sick but still living specimens of bramble and wild rose, if at first you don't succeed try, try again.

Hunton Club Book Group April 2009 Book Review Savage Garden by Mark Mills

Adam Strickland, a Cambridge student in 1958 is in search of a subject for his thesis. His mentor presents him with one which gives Adam the opportunity to spend the summer in Tuscany to study a 16th Century memorial garden belonging to the wealthy Docci family. Adam jumps at the opportunity but isn't quite prepared for what he finds when he arrives at the mysterious Docci Villa situated high in the bucolic hills of Tuscany.

The garden surrounding the villa is a complex warren of groves and grottos which has been laid out by a grieving husband to the memory of his dead wife Flora who died at the age of 25 in 1548. Immediately Adam falls under the spell of the garden and of Villa Docci and is struck that there is something discordant in the garden including a rather provocative marble statue of the banker's wife which crowns the nine-tiered amphitheatre.

Adam is warned by some people of the dangers of getting too close to the Villa and that 'people have a tendency to die there'. Meanwhile, the aging Signora Docci who lies alone in her bedroom at the Villa offers Adam the free run of the house except the top floor, the door to which, Adam is told must remain locked. Intrigued by this Adam finds himself compelled to investigate and discovers that the Docci family have some dark skeletons hidden away. By the end of the summer Adam uncovers two stories of love, revenge and murder separated by 400 years.

This book triggered a mixed response from the Group. Some members were disappointed and found it slow, boring and badly written and did not finish it. Others could not engage with the characters and felt that the parallel stories were unnecessary. It was generally agreed that the language was not appropriate for the 1950s. However, a small minority enjoyed the intrigue of the story, felt the beautiful descriptions of the Tuscan landscape captured the atmosphere of an Italian summer, the elegance of the garden and they also empathised with some of the main characters.

Scores for this book ranged from 4 to 8 giving an average of 5 1/2 out of 10. There is no set book for May so members will read a book of their choice and report back to the Group next month.

I always tend to talk about the qualities of our God. The Father who created, the Son who redeemed us by the cross, and the Holy Sprit who makes God real to us today and empowers us to do His work.

Simple examples are often used - Water, steam and ice, as all school boys and girls in the chemistry lab will know, is H20. Saint Patrick used the example of the shamrock leaf.

Trinity Sunday falls on the Sunday after Pentecost. That festival of the church recalls how the disciples, having returned to Jerusalem awaited the coming of the 'power from on high'.

That was the promise of Jesus to his disciples as he left them at the Ascension. Their commission was to 'make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit'. This work on which they were about to embark could not be done without supernatural strength. This 'power from on high' was unknown to them until that first day of Pentecost when as the Scriptures report they were all 'filled' with Holy Spirit.

It is in this empowering that we too are given the strength to be faithful, and to do the Lord's work.

Those who have done the 'Alpha' course will know that three sessions are used to teach about the Holy Spirit. Usually it is taught over a whole day. But it is more than just Teaching, it is experiencing.

As we remember this month the Holy Trinity (Coxheath Church has this as its dedication) and also that first day of Pentecost, we recall that great commission of Jesus given to the disciples which has been passed down to us today, and in the power of the same Holy Spirit in the Name of the Holy Trinity we seek to be the people God created us to be.
