



## Pothole Problems

Wheel-breaking, tyre-busting potholes in Hunton roads, aggravated by January's Arctic weather conditions, have been reported to the Kent highways team by the Parish Council.

Chairman, Roger Sawtell, said that a highways engineer had visited the village and was surprised to find that the potholes were in several roads around the Parish and not just on Hunton Hill as he had been advised. He agreed to repairs being carried out.

It was reported that in the past, holes filled temporarily by the county had resulted in the filler tarmac coming out within weeks whereas those repaired by the Electricity Board had lasted years. Maidstone Borough Councillor, John Wilson, reported his disappointment that after two years of lobbying the issue of heavy lorries using the country lanes was only briefly featured in the latest Kent strategy report 'Growth without Gridlock'.

"Hunton Councillor, Gary Thomas and myself have been pressing for action since 2007 and have been fobbed off by County officials in the past. And now this integrated transport strategy plan barely mentions the problem of articulated lorries.

"All we want is information and feedback on the routes these lorries are taking - where they are coming from and going to. Maybe they are on local business which could be alright - we just want to know," said Cllr Wilson adding that after his latest approach, action had been promised by Geoff Mee the County Director of Integrated Transport Strategy.

Councillor Thomas stressed the dangers for walkers using the Greensand Way, a popular Kent route, and descending the steep steps onto Hunton Hill, a busy local carriageway.

## Report from King George V Playing Field

In his report from the King George V Playing Fields, Keith Eatwell said that the Committee was looking into plans to replace the netting at the edge of the village bowls club after cricket balls had been hit onto the bowling greens last season. He said that the children's play equipment was in good condition.

One snowdrop ('Atkinsii') is showing white, but as yet no sign of *Galanthus Nivalis*, the native snowdrop. By the time you read this, these snowdrops should be ready to go and gardeners' long wait for the start of the season will be over.

# HUNTON BOOK GROUP REVIEW    DECEMBER 2009

## **The Shack by William Paul Young**

Mackenzie (Mack) Allen Philip's, decides one weekend to take his children on a camping trip until tragedy strikes in the most unexpected way. As Mack's two older children are out canoeing they lose control and the canoe flips over. Yet while his attention is focused on saving them, a serial killer abducts his younger daughter Missy. As the search progresses, the dress she had been wearing is found torn and bloodied in a shack, high up in the mountains, implying that she has been murdered.

What follows for Mack is described as *The Great Sadness*. Mack cannot forgive himself, and blames God for allowing such a tragedy to happen to him and his family. Until, one day Mack finds a note in his post box, signed "Papa" (God) inviting him to return to the shack. Unsure if it is a cruel joke, curiosity gets the better of Mack and he decides to return to the scene of his daughter's murder.

Here the story departs from reality and enters a world where Mack meets Papa (God) portrayed in the form of a black woman, Jesus as an ordinary man in jeans and t-shirt, and Sarayu (The Holy Spirit) as an Asian woman. Mack spends the weekend with them in a world where time and reality no longer exists as we know it, and during that time finds healing, peace, deeper understanding and forgiveness about life. The questions he has to face are challenging and painful, but gradually Papa, Jesus and Sarayu work to bring healing into Mack's life and enable him to understand what a relationship with them is supposed to be and how that reflects in his relationship with others.

The book is certainly not theology as most think of it and clearly Young is making assumptions about the nature and reality of God based on a human understanding of Scripture. However, he has taken a bold step in trying to communicate something about God in a fresh and unusual way to the reader, told through the life of Mack, even if some may initially find the idea of portraying God as a black African-American woman somewhat difficult (as did I). Above all, what is communicated is the depth of God's love for humanity and his desire for relationship with us out of free choice, a relationship that is active and living and is lived every moment of every day. It is this relationship that ultimately impacts the entire way we relate to and see others.

Most have wrestled with similar questions as Mack, at some point in their lives in some form. In particular this book would be especially relevant to anyone experiencing suffering in his or her own life. *The Shack* has the potential to be a source of healing and encouragement to some. It will not be what you expect, it may be uncomfortable and it is certainly not conventional.

**The Shack** drove the group into a deep, open and lively discussion and as the evening progressed, it was clear that this book had provoked and challenged us in one way or another; some loved this book and some rejected it.

I enjoyed this book and would thoroughly recommend it as well worth a read. Our average score for **The Shack** was 5.

## **School News**

### **It's all Greek to me**

The children in Upper School will be studying the Ancient Greeks and learning about significant events in Ancient Greek history; comparing beliefs and ideas of Athenians and Spartans and finding out about the Battle of Marathon. During the term the children will compare sources of information about the Trojan horse and use a range of sources to discover more about ancient games and discover why the Olympics were revived. They will have the opportunity to consider the designs of the pottery and make their own replica pots using clay.

The Middle School children have begun to learn about the Romans and the founding of Rome and the two main characters (Romulus and Remus). They will examine how the Roman Empire changed areas, for example, the invasion of Britain, and to find out about aspects of family life in Roman times, including what a Roman Villa looked like and about Roman hygiene and how they introduced public baths, toilets and sewers to Britain.

Lower School children will be learning about traditional costumes around the world, different clothes worn in different climates and they will use maps to plot where clothes are produced. Then they will focus on India, the clothes worn, including at an Indian wedding and consider the jewellery and weaving patterns.

Reception class will be learning about space, looking at rockets, stars, planets, aliens, the moon and lots of exciting cooking activities with a space theme.

### **Fund Raising**

The end of service collection after the Christingle Service raised £99.53 for the Children's Society and this month the children at Hunton School have taken responsibility to assist earthquake victims to rebuild their lives and their communities by planning a programme of fundraising activities that includes 'Bob a Job' week - children to do jobs around the home that they do not normally do to raise money, such as hoovering, dusting, tidying, cooking, walking the dog, cleaning shoes, making breakfast, making cups of tea; and a bring and buy sale and cake sale.

Well, I'm not suggesting you give up making mistakes although for me I'm going to give up thinking that when problems arise it is a problem for other people to solve. No, I'm thinking that maybe I ought to be contemplating the problems that I cause other people by my mistakes. Saying we're going to do something to time, like many of the trades and professions we deal with, is one annoying habit we can easily get into ourselves. Do we always deliver on time and can we be trusted to complete a task we have offered to do? Are we reliable? Can people trust us to do what we promise? Are we lazy and rely on others? There's so many things that we can look at in our lives that involve 'giving' up but also 'giving out' to others. Giving up chocolate might make the chocolate producers redundant! All our actions, good and bad have a consequence. Surely an attitude of serving each other, being aware of others, is the message that Jesus encouraged his followers to strive for. He encouraged people to love and to serve and to be aware of their actions. In the parable of the talents Jesus says 'I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did it for me.' We need to treat everyone with respect in our approach to them and maybe Lent is our opportunity to think about the ways we can 'give up' the things that prevent this happening in our lives.
