## Parish Plan First Big Step

At our meeting in April, Councillor Glyn Charlton from East Farleigh Parish shared the highs and lows of the experience of getting Tovil and East Farleigh Parish Plans to fruition. The development of each of the plans was quite different, one taking two years and the other completed in about 12 months. Glyn agreed that the process needed to be short to keep people focused and on board. Glyn thought that Hunton was extremely lucky to have so many people attending the meetings and that Hunton, being a small village, should do well with the engagement through the process of the questionnaire. We would like to break the record on the percentage of returns we get of the questionnaire!

We learnt that it was important at the stage of developing the plan, following on from the analysis of the questionnaire results, that the priority areas within the plan are what the village wanted. You may be aware in the local press the interest that the 'village green' in East Farleigh has raised (or not!), both in terms of those that want it, and those that are opposed to it. It has created some animated debate within East Farleigh Village.

Carl Adams (Rural Officer, Action with Communities in Rural Kent) also added, referring to Postling's plan, that the Parish Plan could be just as much about what it was that we did not want to change in the village, and that Hunton particularly is such a lovely place to live that there are many things we would not want to change. We are really keen that our plan is a true consensus of what we all want for our village and the only way we can know that is to ensure that as many people as possible are engaged in completing the questionnaire that we aim to launch in September.

On Thursday 20th May at 7.30pm at Hunton Village Hall, we have our ideas night to give the village an opportunity to raise the issues that they wish considered in the questionnaire. Please come along. Cheese and wine will be provided. It would be helpful if you could indicate if you are coming so that we know how many we are catering for. #### Hi Fellow Voters

By the time you read this letter it will be all over or at least we'll all be fed up with elections and be glad to know the World Cup is only weeks away. With a projection that so many people are disillusioned with Government and politics I wonder how many of us will vote and if we do why? All my life I have lived in areas which are considered 'safe seats' that I feel like moving to a place where my vote may actually change the status quo in returning its member. I think it is sad that we have come to this point. My grandparents had three front windows and in each one they placed the sticker for each of the main parties. Staunched Socialists they became disenchanted with voting as they also lived in a town which always returned the same MP, year after year. At election times I sometimes wonder what is actually important in life. Is it worth it? Ought we to take a stand and simply refuse to vote until politics cleans itself up or the way we vote changes? Is opting out a responsible stance?

I think not, as to opt out of anything gives others the chance and the excuse to feel that their way is the correct way. We are called as Christians to be salt and light in the world. To speak out against those who would run rough shod over the weak, disadvantaged and those without a voice. To be light, to shine in the darkness and to demonstrate that there are other ways than those who respond to the loudest and powerful. We may be a lone voice as was the speaker at a recent Parish Council meeting who spoke up in favour of the traffic calming scheme in Coxheath against, what some see as, the democratic voice of the majority. Sometimes the lone voice gathers momentum as those who are afraid to stand up to the perceived wisdom of the mass, join in and a new movement grows to challenge accepted views. The history of the world is full of the lone voice! Their view may not be right but at least it can be heard and not drowned out. So if you didn't vote then you had your chance and can't moan when decisions are made. To those who did, well done, and I can only hope your voice will be heard but at least you spoke up and made your point. The events of Easter show that Jesus did just that. The crowds welcomed him, then in a week called for his death. He triumphed over the power of evil - one lone person made all the difference! Are you another lone voice?

### Out and Out Succession Planning

It must be the aim of all keen gardeners to develop a garden which is attractive for a long season. Choosing plants which flower at different times through the season is a good starting point. Spring bulbs will flower before perennials have started, plant them together for a succession of flowering. Some perennials will flower later than others, the red unfurling stems of peony work well with primulas, then the open leaves give shade and the sumptuous flowers follow. Once the peony flower is over perhaps a hardy fuchsia nearby will take up the baton or a clematis could be encouraged to wend its way over the flowerless peony.

It is not just flowers which can be made to work like this; hosta and fern foliage will both put on a show following on from miniature narcissi, unwinding themselves from their winter rest and spreading their leaves over the dying foliage of the bulbs.

This challenge is certainly easier if you can find enjoyment in the unfurling of leaves, in shoots bursting through the ground and in the huge variety of leaf colours and shapes as well as the anticipation of a flower about to open. But with a little planning and a few nursery visits any garden can be encouraged to extend its season of interest. Christine McSweeney

### School News

Upper School are keeping with their topic on Ancient Greece and focusing on Greek art, myths and legends. They will be learning about the Battle of Troy and designing and making Greek pots. They have been on a residential trip to Swattenden, The children have participated in a range of outward bound activities including mountain biking, wall climbing, high ropes, zip lines and abseiling.

Middle School went on a trip to Canterbury to visit the Roman Museum where they descended the steps to the museum - each one represented 100 years of history! Travelling back nearly 2000 years they saw what Roman Canterbury would have looked like, including evidence from the baths and market place. They had fun trying on Roman sandals and robes and making a magnetic mosaic design. They saw original mosaic floors which were found after bombing in World War II and found out how their under-floor heating worked - the stacks of tiles were still standing! They were able to handle some replica Roman artefacts and sort them according to what they were made from, how they were made and who might have owned them.

Lower School are covering the topic 'Talking Time' where they will be learning about how people have told the time through history. The children will be making sundials and sand timers in design technology.

Reception Class have begun their topic 'New life and growing'. The children have a wonderful garden centre as their role play area in their classroom and Reception children visited Brookside Garden Centre and took part in a treasure hunt and really enjoyed recording their answers on clipboards. They held stick insects and stroked gerbils, hamsters, guinea pigs and rabbits. They looked at the fish and explored the plants outside. It was a lovely morning. The children will continue to learn Jolly Phonics to support their reading and writing skills and they will be very busy in the garden planting a variety of seeds and plants.

Hunton School's annual May Fayre will this year be on Sunday 23rd May from 11.30am until 3.30pm. Attractions will include dance displays from local dance schools, a licensed bar and BBQ, bouncy castle, tombola, raffle, cake stall, lucky dip, teas, face painting and lots more.
