The club is no different in offering all a pub does except dining. The same drinks are offered but at least 15% cheaper. Families and children are welcome and members can enjoy a warm atmosphere amongst friends and neighbours for an annual fee of only £10. So for those who dream for a pub in Hunton, why not give the club a try. Everyone is welcome to visit prior to joining as a member.

The club is closed on Tuesdays but open on other weekday evenings 7.30-11.00pm.

At the weekend it's open Saturday 8.00-11.00pm and on Sundays 12-2.30pm and again at 7.30-10.30pm.

Hello All

August already and I sit writing this during the first really hot spell of the Summer so far. Well, the World Cup in Football turned out to be a damp squib for England, Murray did much better but was beaten on the day by a better player, the English cricket team won the One Day Cricket Series against Australia and the new Government (or do we call it a coalition?) have shown their teeth. Don't you look forward to the peace of August, holidays, the children at home and you can park at Paddock Wood Station to catch a train?

But for one group of people August brings the tension of those examination results held earlier in the summer. For 30 years, as an examination officer, I issued the results to students who over the years increasingly became more and more anxious about the grades they obtained. In the early days the results didn't seem to have the same importance, the results came in by post and often students didn't bother to come in to school to collect them relying on the post to deliver them some days later. Increasingly the results have taken on greater importance in young people's lives and the queue waiting for results grows each year. Expressions of joy and sadness, relief and tears are shown by the students as they open the envelopes. The results are so important for future careers. It is only when we grow older that we realise that life does not depend upon them. What is important at the time, be it the apparently trivial from our team winning a tournament, or the league to the importance of examinations, are simply 'happening' on our journey through life. One of the prayers used by the church says 'that with you (God) as our ruler and guide we may pass through things temporal that we lose not our hold on things eternal.' Let these words be our prayer for the young people today as they wait for those important results amidst all the tension within themselves and from family and friends. Pray that their sights are set on the bigger picture and whatever the results of the examinations their lives will be measured in the end on things eternal - the gifts that God gives us, love, joy, peace, gentleness, forgiveness and not always on the 'successes' of the worlds values.

Pray for the young people waiting for examination results and for those starting new schools, further and higher education and those fortunate to have work to start.

June Book Review: To Kill a Mockingbird by Harper Lee

Atticus Finch is a lawyer in America's Deep South. A man with an enormous conviction in the equality of people regardless of their race, social standing or intellectual ability, he takes on a case to defend a black man accused of raping a white woman. The court case and the events before and after it are told through the eyes of Scout, Atticus's eight-year-old daughter. She and the reader come to know her father's outstanding integrity and stature. Although the book is set in Alabama in the 1930s and highlights the ugliness of racism, it has lessons for us all about all-too-hasty judgements of people we are too slow or too frightened to get to know. The majority, although not all, of the Book Club found the book very readable and felt it had a depth which stayed with us long after finishing it. As the 50th anniversary of To Kill a Mockingbird's publication is currently being celebrated, several of us also listened to a radio programme about it, read some press articles and watched the 1960's film with Gregory Peck as Atticus. The Book Club's score was 8. Our next book is The Vanishing Act of Esme Lennox by Maggie O'Farrell.

School News - End of Year Review

'If it is the end of the year are we soon going to be writing letters to Santa?' A question asked by one of the youngest pupils when her teacher spoke about the end of the academic year. It always seems strange that while the rest of society are in the middle of the year enjoying the sunshine and barbeques schools are reviewing the year and preparing for goodbyes and new beginnings.

As Hunton School reflects on this past school year we have many things to celebrate and think about. In the autumn term we gained Kent Safer School Accreditation and our annual pupil interviews showed again that the children feel safe in our school and that every child can identify someone in the school they would speak to if worried. Once again Hunton School was invited to join events in the local community and we actively participated in the very successful Hunton Flower Festival by producing a copy of a section of the newly renovated stained glass window and two fabric banners depicting village and school life.

In November we had the official opening by Ann Widcombe MP, of our new extension and classroom. There was great excitement as Ms Widcombe brought a film crew from the BBC with her who filmed the whole event! Once again the Nativity and Christingle Service saw St. Mary's Church full to the brim with families and parishioners all enjoying seeing our young children decked in angel and shepherd costumes to once again retell the wondrous story of the birth of Jesus. The snow saw the school only close for two days despite many of the staff travelling long distances; Wellington boots, scarves and the dedicated work of our staff to clear paths meant that science experiments and cooperative games were quickly developed to enhance children's learning using the delights of nature. The plight of the people of Haiti galvanised our children to initiate a range of fund raising activities which later led to a commendation by the Speaker of the House of Commons. The beginning of 2010 was also a great time of sadness for everyone when we were faced with the death of one of our beloved teachers Mrs. Turner, after a brave fight against cancer. Children, parents and staff and governors shared their grief and worked together to support each other.

The children turned out in force for the Mothering Sunday service where children delighted in retelling stories of their mums. Also in March our older children enjoyed a week at an 'outward bound' centre where every child challenged themselves with abseiling, high ropes and zip wires! Trips to enhance learning have been ongoing throughout the year and have included trips to the Sea Life Centre in Hastings and Hestmonseaux to undertake a range of 'hands on' science experiments, Maidstone Museum and Bedgbury Pinetum to name a few! We have also enjoyed a French speaking production by a French drama group and our oldest children have attended a range of workshops where they have learnt about keeping safe and gained awareness about potential dangers in society; skills and knowledge they will need as they move into the next chapter of their education in secondary school.

Our annual sports afternoon, which was originally cancelled due to bad weather, took place at the beginning of June and was thoroughly enjoyed by everyone, even the toddlers, who ran as fast as they could to gain a sticker and a pot of bubbles!

The recent World Cup became a focus for much learning when the children had a competition to learn the 32 flags of the countries competing. Issues surrounding the manufacturing of sports wear in third world countries and the use of cheap labour encouraged our children to pose philosophical questions regarding social injustice and our participation in this when we purchase such items.

The England V Slovenia game which kicked off at 3pm meant that we invited our children to view the game in school with us using the internet and our interactive whiteboard. Everyone was very excited and at 2.45pm we settled down decked in football shirts, face paints and waving flags to watch the game, a memory that we thought would stay with the children for ever. Unfortunately the memory grew as much to our disappointment the internet access failed and we had expectant children and no football match! Quick as a flash Mrs Weston agreed to us decamping to her home to watch the match on her TV!!! Thirty plus children with staff walked to her house and settled in her sitting room!! Bensted Close was filled with loud cheers emitting from the sitting room window and later a group of children enjoying a picnic on the green during half time. Mrs. Weston this year celebrated twenty years of service at Hunton School and her generosity and the high regard in which she is held is reflected in such a kind act.

We have also been very involved in the development of the Hunton Parish Plan. Our children have made a presentation about the village and undertook a vote on the things we like about Hunton and the things we would change. Children then attended the launch to present our results. We are now looking forward to playing a part in 'Hunton Calling!' in September. We have already made a rather large 3D map of the village and undertaken research about Hunton and places of interest. The older children have produced beautiful art work of local properties which are on show in the school entrance.

As this school year draws to an end we are truly grateful for another successful year and thank the local community for their continuous support. We look forward to being part of 'Hunton Calling!!' on 18th September and we send all our youngsters moving onto their new schools all our best wishes and prayers for their well-being and personal fulfilment.
