Keith Eatwell, Chairman of the King George V Playing Fields Committee, reported to the September Parish Council meeting that the sports area had been tidied and the hedges trimmed.

"It looks a lot neater and we received thanks from the bowling club for our actions. However, for the litter bins to be emptied, there has to be access for the Maidstone Borough Council team and without this the bins have been overflowing."

Parish Councillors agreed to check with the Borough Council to see what can be done to remedy the problem.

Borough Councillor Colin Parr warned that the Council was continuing to look into ways that cuts could be made in its finances. "The problem is that if the cuts are too severe in a short space of time it could be really damaging - which is the same situation with the national economy."

Mr Parr reported that the potholes in "the Gorge" at the bottom of Hunton Hill were highly dangerous and he was surprised that there had not been a serious accident. He is pressing for action from the Highways Committee before they make cutbacks in their finances.

He asked Councillors if they had any major issues which they wished to raise at the newly formed Neighbourhood Forums which are bringing the local communities of Yalding, Marden, Coxheath and Staplehurst together to identify any such problems. Leaders of the Forum believe that as a larger group they can have an influence on the decision makers. Hunton Parish Council is to consider its response.

Dear Friends

'O Lord our God how majestic is your name in all the Earth!' (psalm 8:9)

Swallows gathering on the telephone wires tell us that they are getting ready to fly to warmer climes, and that Winter is on the way for us and that the harvest is gathered in.

Two hundred years ago men were not at all certain that birds migrated. The 18th century Swedish botanist and zoologist, Carl Linnaeus believed that swallows hibernated and the naturalist and ornithologist Gilbert White of the same era was only convinced about migration from evidence told to him by his brother, who was chaplain to the Gibraltar garrison, who saw large numbers of birds passing over the rock at different seasons of the year.

Summer and Winter bird-migration is one of the wonders of Mother Nature and of our amazing Creator God. Many theories have been put forward to explain how birds can navigate often over vast distances. How, for instance does a young cuckoo which never knows its parents, find its way unaided to Africa? How do certain young waders migrate from Arctic regions on their own after their parents have flown?

There is certainly much 'hereditary' knowledge that helps, while birds also get to know topographical features such as rivers, coastlines, valleys and the like.

Their 'd-i-y' navigation kit seems to also have that innate sense of time, an internal clock which enables birds to make allowance for the position of the sun or stars overhead, just as the human navigator does with his instruments.

This brings me to mention a recent visit to the Royal Observatory in Greenwich. I have been fascinated by the story of how longitude was discovered since learning about the long history which surrounds this conundrum that faced ships in those long-ago days. King Charles 2nd in 1675 founded the Observatory to enable mariners at sea to find their ship's position from the sun, moon and stars.

Navigators had a major problem, for once out of the sight of land, they had no way of finding their longitude - their position east or west of their home port. They could find the latitude- *continued on back page*

The Hunton Club Book Club Review

Salmon Fishing in the Yemen, By Paul Torday

Spin doctors, scientists and sheiks are joined together in this highly imaginative, enjoyable tale about a project to introduce salmon fishing into the Yemen. Told through a series of emails, diary entries and memos, the novel is a humorous and sometimes moving account of an impossibly difficult project and its impact on the lives of those that surround it.

The book is littered with inferences about the positive, simple outlook of the East, versus the mindless, self serving bureaucracy of the West. This undertone did lead to a debate among the Book Club members about the naivety of the argument, however, all agreed that the obvious joy that the author has in taking large literary sweeps at the Blair Government makes for a highly entertaining read. The Book Club members were also fairly unanimous about the central themes of the book: belief, hope and optimism, in their widest sense. Combined, these three elements make for a deceptively powerful book, which like all good satires, manages to mix comedy with tragedy to dramatic effect. The overall score was 6.5/10.

Out and Out Autumn Outrage

One of Nature's most outrageous colour combinations is to be found at around this time of the year on a native shrub called the Spindle Tree. The shrub for most of the year is fairly unremarkable but come Autumn the leaves deepen from plain green to a fiery autumnal red, a warming sight in its own right. But it is the seed cases which we are interested in. They ripen to a bright pink colour then split open to reveal deep orange fruit, a very daring colour mix which is so rich it comes close to being a clash.

The Latin name of this shrub is *Euonymus Europaeus* but its common name, the Spindle Tree, is widely used and reminds us that its wood was found to be ideal for making spindles for wool spinning. Growing to no more than 6 metres the Spindle Tree can be seen in hedgerows and woodland edge, I'm not certain that I have spotted any growing wild in Hunton but there are a couple in gardens which can be easily seen from public roads. Keep looking and be prepared to be outraged!

how far north or south of the equator they were, by measuring the position of the polar star or the sun, using simple instruments.

Rough estimates of longitude often meant ships were hundreds of miles off course and the inevitable ship wrecks which often happened as unseen rocks and other sea hazards took their toll.

To find longitude the mariner needed to know the time at their home port and the local time for his ship's position. The Earth which spins on its axis (360 degrees in 24 hours) making one hour's difference in local time as 15 degrees of longitude. Local time could be found from the stars or the sun. The simplest way to know the time at home was to take a clock. Accuracy of such devices was hopeless because of the rolling and pitching of the ship at sea.

Many years and many men turned their minds to solve this. The history is long but eventually a man called John Harrison after four attempts at constructing an accurate clock for sea voyages solved the problem. The H4 clock now sits in the Observatory for all to see the intricacies of this construction.

Birds seemed to have solved the problem of navigation long before mankind did!

Psalms rejoice in the creation of the birds and all other animals together with the creation of men and women. It is a wondrous thing which God has done and we praise Him for all these things!
