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#### Parish Council News

Increasing Concern over Caravans - Nine angry residents attended the November meeting of the Parish Council to express their alarm at plans for a change of use of land in Lughorse Lane to provide two plots for gypsy travellers. Councillors agreed to strongly object to the plans. One caravan is already sited on one of the nine plots of land on the south side of the lane. Borough Councillor, Brian Mortimer, stated that one of the reasons temporary permission was granted on one of the plots three years ago was because the inspector that gave permission did not want to see the applicant become homeless, so three years temporary permission seemed a sensible timescale for MBC to find a permanent site. However some residents reported that the applicant had a home elsewhere and was not always living on site. Further more Cllr Mortimer said that he fully understood the anger over the latest application and has agreed to meet with residents to help fight this application.

Parish Councillor David Heaton said that the Environment Agency had expressed concern that the new plans for a site for gypsy travellers included the installation of a cesspit. There were fears that a nearby stream could become polluted. It was reported that the Borough Council was originally looking to accommodate 36 gypsy travellers and this number had now been increased to 93. It was understood that the Council had received 20 applications for gypsy sites in one week.

Mr Mortimer said that he could understand residents' alarm and agreed to attend a meeting with them.

**Traffic Troubles** - Resident Jacqui Francis whose cat was killed by a motorist outside her home in West Street, has expressed alarm at the speed of traffic, fearing that it would not be long before a serious accident occurs.

She suggested organising a petition calling for action to be taken in a bid to slow speeding vehicles. Parish Councillor Ron Porter, who had suffered three cats being killed in the street, felt that perhaps support could be sought from neighbouring Yalding and Linton which have similar traffic problems.

"We witnessed the chaos that occurred on Barn Hill and in Lughorse Lane where there were several accidents when these narrow lanes were used by increased traffic due to the closure of Hunton Hill."

The police had carried out speed checks in West Street and the Parish Council is to ascertain the results.

Kent County Council is reviewing all A and B roads in the county until 2014 but Parish Councillors feared that until someone was killed in a road accident no action would be taken.

A Hunton Summer Fete is on the Cards - Three Hunton groups are combining their efforts to organise a Hunton Summer Fete for 2011 with a provisional date set for June  $25^{th}$ .

Keith Eatwell, Chairman of the King George V Playing Fields said that the fete organisation was a little onerous for one group and was pleased to learn of the support from the Hunton Parish Plan group and the Friends of St Mary's. Initially it was planned for the proceeds to go towards the new footpath between the Village Hall and Bensted Close but now it has been decided that money raised should be used to help provide new children's play equipment for the playing fields. The Village Hall car park is again in need of repair work and the Parish Council is to investigate possible solutions to the problem. It is also seeking to find out who is responsible for emptying the litter bins at the playing fields which are getting filled and not being emptied.

Funds Raised for Children in Need The Children in need 'Family Art and Craft' day in November raised £150 with the help from friends and local families.

## Hunton Club Book Club November 2010 Review - 'Mansfield Park' by Jane Austen

Fanny Price, the eldest of nine siblings, is rescued from a life of relative poverty and drudgery when she is taken in by her wealthy relatives, Sir and Lady Bertram. At first she is terrified in the huge house with her well-meaning, but rather selfish and careless cousins, but her cousin Edmund (the younger of the two Bertram brothers) takes pity on her and shows her kindness and friendship. Thus starts the love Fanny feels for Edmund throughout the book.

While she has the benefits of a good home and an education, she is always a bit outside the Bertram family, and her other aunt, Mrs. Norris, never stops making her aware that she is lucky to be there on their sufferance. She becomes the helper and companion of the air-headed Lady Bertram, and puts up with a lot of fairly ill treatment with grace and forbearance. While Sir Thomas Bertram and his eldest son are away in the West Indies, the young and handsome Crawford siblings arrive in the area, and shake things up considerably.

The siblings are orphaned, good-looking and wealthy, and Henry Crawford, while a gentleman, is clearly a bit of a rake. Mary Crawford, his charming sister, has a fortune of nearly 20,000 pounds and feels drawn to Edmund, even though he is the younger son, and planning to become a clergyman. She makes an effort to befriend Fanny, and seems amused by her brother's flirtation with both the Bertram sisters, even though Maria Bertram, the older, is engaged to another man.

Once Maria Bertram marries her rich, but ridiculous and silly suitor, and her younger sister Julia is hurt by Henry Crawford's attentions to her sister, he sets out to make Fanny Price fall in love with him instead. This backfires, and he falls in love with her instead, finally offering for her. Fanny is appalled, having quietly watched as he toyed with her cousins, and as she's in love with Edmund, refuses him multiple times. Edmund, however, only has eyes for the lively Miss Crawford.

Whilst the majority of our group really enjoyed reading this book once they mastered the language, a few found it rather slow and long winded. However we all had rather strong feelings about most of the characters. Fanny although very kind and self-sacrificing, is sometimes rather feeble. Edmund could do with a little push. Aunt Norris, was every ones worst nightmare, and Sir Thomas was really quite kind and loveable. Some of us felt that the ending appeared "rushed" as if the book was long enough and had to finish. A lovely "read" which we scored 8.

'Let us go to Bethlehem and see this thing which has come to pass'.

Since Bethlehem sits on a ridge, the shepherds probably had to walk up the two or so miles from the fields to the town.

To see 'this thing' as reported by Saint Luke. In the original Greek text this means literally 'word' or 'reality'. The shepherds knew that they had received a word from God, and the reality of it was that the Messiah had been born that same day. The reality was something that they could confirm tangibly because the angel gave them a sign to look for: a baby wrapped in cloths lying in a manger. Their hearts were without doubt so excited and eager to see 'this thing'.

It is clear that the shepherds had a revelation from God and believed it! Their experience and their obedient, faithful response was really comparable to how people come to a saving faith in Jesus Christ. Salvation comes by hearing a message from God, by hearing and believing the truth about Jesus (Romans 10:9-10)

We read that they 'came with haste' - literally 'with great enthusiasm and eagerness' as they searched for the mother, father and divine child.

'Has anyone heard of the birth of a child this night?' asked the shepherds as they looked everywhere in that little town. Before long they 'found Mary and Joseph, and the Babe lying in a manger'.

The shepherds' response after finding Jesus continues our analogy of what happens when God saves people. They tell others. Now and again I have witnessed folk who have that life-changing experience being excited and ready to share with others. These shepherds were changed men - we read: 'they made widely known the saying which was told them concerning this child'.

In reality, these shepherds became the first New Testament Evangelists!

'All those who heard it marvelled at what at those things which the shepherds had told them'.

So this well loved account which we will read again soon and sing that carol about shepherds watching their flocks by night, is once more a pattern that illustrates the Christian life. You first hear the Gospel telling of Jesus (for me that was when I was a very small boy) -then you begin to believe it, and then you pursue and embrace Jesus. Having become a witness to your conversion, you begin to share that with others and change one's lifestyle in obedience to the Good News and under the power of God's Holy Spirit.

One becomes to realise 'I am a child of God', and study and ponder God's Word so that it changes one in order to attain to that life for which I (you) was created.

We know nothing much else about those shepherds - but we can be sure that their lives were changed forever. Tending their sheep on that hillside, as Jesus the Good Shepherd tends us his flock today.
