#### Restoration Begins on the West Door of the Church

Work commenced on the west door of the church on Monday 1st August. Following adequate protection, the existing door was loaded into a van and the space blocked in. The contractor carrying out the work is Hugh Harrison from South Molton in Devon who was the only person the Diocese of Rochester would accept so it would seem that we have "the best". The programme for the two south doors will be somewhat easier insofar as no temporary doors will be required. The inner south door can act as an external door while the outer one is being repaired. The total anticipated time required to complete the whole of the work is six months.

This project would never have got off the ground had it not been for the tremendous effort of Anke and David Way in securing grants to cover the cost and further offers of help if needed from The Friends of St Mary's. Guy Oliver

"I saw an Angel flying in the midst of Heaven having the everlasting Gospel to preach to all those who dwell on earth" (Revelation14:6)

'Was the car journey ever going to get there?' I thought as we wound our way ever upward Mount Lofty with Brother Gilbert and Richard a student at St. Michael's House. I had that night flown into Adelaide and was on my way to St. Michael's. The place had been established back in the 1940's as a training ground for those hoping to become ordained in the Anglican Church. It was a society of brothers who were dedicated to the training of ordinands. 'Was this the place for me?' I had been thinking and praying about this for some time. Those next few days were to decide my future.

Mount Lofty is just that! The bright lights of the City of Adelaide were just like Christmas tree lights way in the distance. Three massive television masts dwarfed St. Michael's. Away from the House it was very dark and the feeling of remoteness was real.

I had arrived on the evening of St. Michael and All Angels. A special feast day for the House. September 29th is that date in the church calendar when we recall the work of the Angels and that of St. Michael. Three days later I left St. Michael's and returned to England to get ready to move to Adelaide and thus commenced my four years with the brothers learning not only about Christian theology but also how to clean, do my laundry, cut firewood and cook meals! A very thorough training! The month of September is so called because the Latin 'Septem' means 'seven'. The Roman calendar counted September as the 7th month. September is always a special month for me since my visit to the brothers on Michaelmas Day, but also the month of my birth and the month of my marriage to Diana.

#### Hunton Club Book Group - July Review 'My Family and Other Animals'

This is the story of Gerald Durrell's childhood on the Greek island of Corfu and his relationship with his family and some interesting local characters, like Spiro, the taxi driver and Theodore, a scientist who taught Durrell much about the animals and nature of the island and remained a good friend of the family after they moved back to England. The family were a collection of eccentrics: Mother is described as being always either knitting or cooking; oldest brother Larry, who was a budding writer at that time, was always inviting strange artists to come and visit; middle brother Leslie was an outdoor and hunting nut; and sister Margo was always worried about her appearance. Durrell describes his family and some of their adventures, the nature and animals of the island, the animals he kept as pets, and the teachers who tried to educate him with varying success.

The setting of this book is the beautiful picturesque Greek island of Corfu. A young Gerald Durrell and his family set off from cold, depressing England and arrive as if in a dream on the sunny island of Corfu. This island is a veritable treasure of animal life and olive groves. In the narrative, Gerald takes the reader on his explorations of the island. With him, the reader visits old islanders and shares in their bread and olive oil, finds a scorpion and the cure for its poison and even observes a women giving birth in a room where no males are allowed!

The majority of our members agreed that this is a delightful book, easy to read, not exciting or compulsive but beautifully written. We enjoyed the trip back to that period in time on Corfu and could all picture the scene vividly although some thought the "creepy crawlie" chapters were a little too lengthy and became rather boring.

We were left wondering how this lifestyle was funded as nobody seemed to work and there was no mention of his father or a fortune. On the whole enjoyable, amusing and as such we scored the book an overall 6.5. *Jackie*

## HUNTON (B) Book Club - July Review - 'Ines of My Soul' by Isabel Allende

"Not a gripping yarn" I think is a fair comment made by several members of the group, four members of our reading group actually finished the tome with one saying that she was not going to be beaten, a couple of others gave up, feeling life is just to short!

The story is a researched historical fiction as well as being a love story, retelling the story of one woman who played an enormous role in conquering what is now Chile. Inés, a poor seamstress from Spain, comes to the new world in a ship with her niece to search for her husband Juan de Málaga. In reality, she is determined to escape from poverty and the backward thinking of the society she was born into. When she learns her husband is dead, she tries to make it on her own with her nursing and housekeeping skills. After this, Inés wants to move on to other towns in the new world, partly with fear of being found out. It is at this time that she meets Pedro de Valdivia, the conquistador of Chile, and becomes his mistress. Even if the story is filled with battles, cruelty, and blood and gore, the central theme is the passionate love and companionship between two lovers. The violence in the book we all felt was probably slightly too much, and so vividly described. Isabel is obviously a talented and prolific writer and a few of us felt that possibly the score the book received did not credit the writing; however, the content was not everyone's cup of tea! Six readers gave an average score of 3.6. There did not seem to be much enthusiasm to investigate any of the fourteen or so other novels by Isabel Allende.
