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County Councillor Upset Over Footpath Delays

Kent County Council work to construct a footpath between the Village Hall and Bensted Close, due for completion by the end of May, was delayed when specially-built wooden bridges "went astray".

Upset over the further delays, Parish Council Chairman, Roger Sawtell, contacted KCC to learn that the bridges, despite being labelled for Hunton, were used by another contract manager.

"We were all annoyed by this latest delay after agreements were finally received from the two landowners giving the go-ahead for the footpath, which we hoped would be completed in time for the Village fete."

Apologising, Kent Councillor, Paulina Stockell said that she had called an emergency meeting with the director

responsible for the work, who was also disappointed by the delay and has now made the work "number one priority."

Rector to Leave for Pastures New

The following letter was read to all the church congregations on Sunday 8th July:

For some time both Diana and I have felt that we need to slow down in our parish work and ministry. The recent death of my mother has in one sense changed the situation we are currently in and, with both of us having some health issues to consider, I have decided that it is time to semi-retire from my work and, to that end, I have been offered the care of five very small villages in the Diocese of Exeter in the county of Devon. The post is part-stipendiary and part-time. The parishes are near the town of Honiton and comprise of: - Offwell, Cotleigh, Northleigh, Farway and Widworthy. The appointment will commence after the statutory three months' notice, in mid-October.

We have worked in the South West before and I have many contacts and friends in that area. We will be returning to an area we know well.

I have been grateful for the seven years I have ministered here and leave the parishes in the very capable hands of Revd's. David Jones, Eileen Doyle and Cilla McKenzie, together with the Readers and an Evangelist (Kay) soon to be commissioned.

There will be other opportunities to talk to you all personally in the coming weeks about all of this and my prayer is that God may already have in mind the person He wants to take you on towards the next few years of Christian witness in this United Benefice.

Dear Friends,

What a Summer! Was there ever such rainfall for so long?! I have just heard that the water companies have called off the hose-pipe ban.

I am reminded of that verse from Samuel Taylor Coleridge's poem of the Ancient Mariner in which we read of the experiences of a sailor who upon returning from a long sea voyage tells of his adventures on the high seas, not least the shooting of an albatross and the misfortune which followed.

'Water, water everywhere, and all the boards did shrink, water, water everywhere nor any drop to drink'.

We often take water from the tap as granted. Yet, without a ready source of water our bodies will cease to function. Our bodies are mostly made up of water. Approximately 85% of the brain, 80% of blood and 70% of the body's muscles. Every cell in the body needs water. Water cushions the joints – carries oxygen and nutrients to our cells and regulates the body temperature. These functions plus many others are all water dependent, so it is no surprise that we are all recommended to drink 6 to 8 glasses of water a day – (some say that tea and coffee do not count).

Whilst visiting Trengwainton Gardens a few years ago – it is a National Trust garden near Penzance, I was fascinated to discover that the walled vegetable garden as viewed from a high wall overlooking the garden has been constructed with the same dimensions as Noah's Ark! Noah knew a lot about water! (Read Genesis chapters 6-9). The Ark itself does pose some interesting practical questions as it bobbed about on that vast expanse of sea. With all those animals aboard what happened about waste disposal and the lighting of the interior? There have been many alleged sightings of Noah's Ark over the years – Mount Ararat in modern day Turkey is still explored today as that is where we are told the Ark came to rest. I do believe we can trust the Biblical account and that all the practical aspects were taken care of by God.

All these facts and figures about the importance of water in our bodies and all the many things it does reminds me of that verse in Psalm 139 verse 14: 'I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made'. Can we doubt that our bodies are made by a Wonderful Creator and that 'Adam's Ale' is His provision to keep us going! With love and prayers,

A series of locations with uncertain accuracy placed him in the Champagne-Ardenne region 25km (15 miles) north of Troyes, 303 miles from his last location. (Last year Lyster took the westerly route into Africa, through Iberia).

This means that all the tagged English Cuckoos are now on their way south!

The much heralded footpath from the Village Hall to Bensted Close should be in place before the start of next term and residents are asked for a little more patience if there are any further delays in the completion of that work.

Hunton Club Book Group A

'The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society', by Mary Ann Shaffer

The title of the novel refers to the spur-of-the-moment alibi created when a group of wartime Guernsey islanders were discovered breaking the curfew by the occupying German soldiers. There was a severe food shortage and inhabitants were subsisting on a meagre diet, which included potato peelings. The group were feasting on a pig they had managed to conceal. Gradually the literary society acquires reality as the group start to read and discuss books. Literature becomes a refuge from their grim situation.

The book is written in the form of letters between Juliet Ashton, a writer based in London and various islanders who were members of the society. The novel has a light touch with gentle humour but serious underlying substance.

Most, but not all, of the group enjoyed the novel. Comments included: "..a good sense of the deprivation under German occupation ...people's coping mechanisms made you warm to them." Members' scores ranged from 4 to 8 with an average score of 6.5 out of 10.

Next month's book is The Stranger's Child by Alan Hollinghurst.
