It was the last flight into Adelaide Airport that evening of the 29thSeptember. It was Michaelmas Day. I stepped out into the now seemingly deserted concourse to see Brother Gilbert there to greet me. As we drove up the winding hill the lights of the City became ever distant as we arrived at St. Michael's House, the home of the Society of the Sacred Mission whose mission there was to train young men for Ordination. I was there to see if I was being called to ordination in that unusual environment, and then to see if I truly was! The rest was history for I returned to England and resigned from my job with a High Street Bank and spent the next four years with the brothers and nine other students studying, and I might add, cleaning and cooking! It was a thorough training. I was later ordained to serve in the Diocese of Tasmania where for eight years I progressed from an Assistant Curate to be in charge of a number of small rural communities. I also found a wife! Diana.

Over the ensuing years I served back in England in the Dioceses of Lincoln, Bath and Wells, Europe and this the Diocese of Rochester. My 'final' move is to the Diocese of Exeter.

Europe was a challenge in that I was a chaplain to ex-pats on the Western end of the Costa del Sol. It was no holiday I might add but a busy and exciting three years of my ministry.

Now it is time to say farewell to another group of parishioners who have all been our friends over seven years in Kent. There have been many events, challenges and activities that I can look back on over these years and cherish them all (well, most!)

I thank all who have contributed to the life and worship of the five churches; to my fellow Clergy and Readers and all who have served as Churchwardens, PCC members and in the many other tasks which people give of their time and talents lovingly towards the ministry the church offers.

The Bible reminds us through the words of Jesus that we are fellow workers in His vineyard. That means that we are working in some area or corner of this Estate and the Estate owner is the Lord Jesus Himself.

I wish you well in this part of the vineyard, and we both assure you of our prayers in the days to come, and that the next Incumbent will be a man or woman of God's choosing.

The following prayer may be helpful as you pray and contemplate the future:

'Great Shepherd, you have committed your flock to those who serve you as pastors and teachers; we now ask and pray that you will send to us the person of your choosing that he or she may serve you faithfully in these parishes of Coxheath, East Farleigh, Hunton, Linton and West Farleigh. Hunton Club Book Group AA Stranger's Child by Alan Hollinghurst

Set at five different moments of time, spanning 1913 – 2008, A Stranger's Child is a story about the repercussions of the life and times of Cecil Valence. Cecil is sly, rich, irrepressible, handsome and selfish in equal measure. A man of broad sexual preferences, his impact on a visit to the home of a Cambridge university friend has implications for the entire family and beyond. Over the course of that one weekend, teasing and seducing his friend, George Sawle, and George's sister, Daphne, Cecil writes a poem. When Cecil dies during the war, the poem becomes famous, perhaps beyond its merits. As one character comments, Cecil is "a first-rate example of the second-rate poet who enters into common consciousness more deeply than many great masters."

Despite his death, Cecil remains a constant figure throughout the novel, at some moments taking centre stage, and at others, hovering in the shadows. The realities and detail of that one weekend are lost in time, and replaced by hearsay and an alternative 'history' that emerge as the characters strive to add their own twist to the events.

The Book Group agreed that the idea of the novel was appealing, and most of us thoroughly enjoyed the first section, detailing the events of the infamous weekend. However, despite the beautiful prose, the whole group felt disappointed by the book. At times, it appeared that the author was extremely self indulgent, constantly reminding you of his literary prowess rather than moving the plot along. It is a novel teeming with intellect, class and sexual snobbery and for that, the Group scored it a woeful 5.

One question kept a few of us going through the 600 page tome; the title. Who was "A Stranger's Child? A quick 'Google' revealed the answer. The phrase "the stranger's child" comes from a poem by Tennyson. In an interview with The Oxonian Review this year, Hollinghurst commented of the epigraph that "[t]he music of the words is absolutely wonderful, marvellously sad and consoling all at once. It fitted exactly with an idea I wanted to pursue in the book about the unknowability of the future".

Next up is "Baking Cakes in Kigali", by Gaile Parkin.
