#### Dear All

The evenings are drawing out so fast, the snowdrops already open, crocuses not showing colour except in sheltered places and the daffs seem to want to burst open. So when you read this we may be inches under snow, drowned with yet more rain or perhaps enjoying a 'heat' wave! So it's always difficult to appear topical when writing this letter at this time of year knowing that the letter may have little relevance when read some weeks later. Things change so fast.

This time of year also sees the start of Lent with Easter not far behind. This period of 40 days preparation before the events of Good Friday and Easter is a period when Christians try to prepare for Easter by fasting. By tradition it is seen as a time when Christians are asked to 'give up' things, mainly chocolate or other so called luxury food as a sign of self-examination and reflection. But fasting from food is not the only activity that God is looking for. In the Gospels Jesus commands us to prayer and fast as a means of drawing us closer to God and his work in the world

He said to those listening to his teaching (Matthew 6 v 21) 'Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also'. Where we put our treasure, whether in terms of time, money, energy or even fasting – there our heart will follow. So it is we are reminded that the way of true fasting is a way of prayer, repentance and turning away from self-centred pre-occupation that is often the way of our focus, and to seek the well being of everyone. This involves our whole way of life and living. It means taking time to examine our lives and to take time out of the rush of everyday living, to focus on what is happening around us.

Over these last few weeks we have been bombarded with news and possible changes that we may need time to reflect upon. We see so much abuse of children in society that has gone unrecorded by those in authority, the issue of single sex marriage and what marriage and family life means, corruption and lying in political life and the pressures on those we ask to govern us, are but a few issues being discussed.

Maybe this Lent – we still have a month left – we ought to be focusing not so much on our own well-being - on things that effect us, but more on our relationship with God so that we are motivated by acts of love, which can bring healing and wholeness, to a world that at times we despair over.

Have a good time seeking and searching and perhaps finding a way that puts God first so that our lives are transformed.

## **Trumpeting Spring**

There is no doubt that February's snowdrops are elegant, beautiful and welcome as an indicator that winter must come to an end. However it is not until the daffodils and forsythia get into their stride that we know that spring is truly here. Aesthetically my preference is for snowdrops but few can fail to have their spirits lifted by the sight of waves of yellow mocking March's shrill breezes and trumpeting the release of winter's iron cold grip. March also means Mothering Sunday when daffodils are almost obligatory in the traditional bouquet gifted at the Church service.

There are few wild colonies of daffodils left; in Hunton the churchyard probably has the best host of daffodils available to view at any time. These are the wild form often called lent lilies, smaller than many cultivated types but perfectly formed and gently spreading in their favoured position beneath the trees Christine McSweeney

### **Hunton Club Book Group Review**

#### Running With Scissors By Augusten Burroughs

A 2002 memoir by American writer Burroughs, this book covers the period of Burroughs's adolescent years, beginning at age 12 after a brief overview of his life as a child. Burroughs spends his early childhood in a clean and orderly home, obsessing over his clothes, hair, accessories, and having great potential, with his parents constantly fighting in the background.

This is a supposedly true story of a boy whose mother (a poet with delusions) gave him away to be raised by her unorthodox psychiatrist who bore a striking resemblance to Santa Claus.

So at the age of twelve, Burroughs found himself amidst Victorian squalor living with the doctor's bizarre family, and befriending a paedophile who resided in the backyard shed. The story of an outlaw childhood where rules were unheard of, and the Christmas tree stayed up all year round, where Valium was consumed like candy, and if things got dull an electroshock-therapy machine could provide entertainment. This is a harrowing account of an ordinary boy's survival under the most extraordinary circumstances.

"The worst book I have ever read", "Can it really be this bad?" and "Disgusting". These are just three of the comments made by book group members. It is reviewed as being funny and amusing but only one member found it so. Nine of us began the book but only four finished it. As to the score out of ten, four of us gave it a zero! Overall, the average score was 3.

Our book for February is Among The Fans by Patrick Collins.

### Friends of St. Mary's Church Snow Drop Day

The weather on Sunday the 10th February for our annual snowdrop event was predictably as bad as it usually is cold, wet and snowy. I recall that last year the snowdrops were in fact buried under snow so this year was a slight improvement.

It was fitting that both David and Anke Way were able to visit the church and enjoy the warmth from the congregation, see the doors that they had worked so hard for, dedicated to the church, then enjoy refreshment offered by the Friends before they left.

Snowdrops have long been a part of St. Mary's Churchyard in Hunton but, had it not been for David Way, as well as the churchyard working party and the Friends combining in their efforts, then this annual event would not happen. The continued work means that each year the display becomes even more dramatic with our own snowdrop, the Hunton Giant thriving.

Thanks to all those who donated cakes, coffee tea etc. and to the Friends team plus children who willingly gave up their time to make this event such a success.
