Hunton's Heritage

Combined Flower Festival and Historical Exhibition 4th, 5th, 6th and 7th October

I was talking to a friend recently about the state of my diary - it always seems to be packed with things to do! When it is displayed on a sheet for the month it can be quite horrific. My friend looked and said -'And where is your time?'

I remember being at a concert once given by Marilyn Baker (a blind musician/evangelist) and she said that we can be so busy sometimes doing work, even God's work, that we have no time <u>for</u> Him. I am sure you are familiar with the story of Mary & Martha in Luke 10. Martha is dashing about preparing a meal whilst Mary is sitting listening to Jesus teach. Martha complains but Jesus says that Mary 'had chosen the better part'.

You don't need to be a regular church goer to need time to stop, reflect, take stock. Some find time to go 'on retreat' which is something I find valuable. I haven't done a residential for a number of years - the last one was spent at the Trappist Monastery on Caldey Island, just off the coast near Tenby. The day trip boat didn't sail for four days so we were 'stranded' and it was wonderful, quiet and peaceful, joining the monastic offices and walking the island - Yes I did get up for Vigils (3:30am)!

I am much more successful at booking a quiet day. Some people host these either in their home or in their garden and they give participants the opportunity to take 'time out' without the mobile or ipad! The structure of the day varies depending on the host/group - some may remember the quiet days we had in Linton Church on a number of occasions.

I used to love taking solitary walks when I had a dog. Living in, or near the countryside gave me the opportunity to reflect, pray, think through problems and enjoy the wonderful sights of nature; solitary walks are not the same without a furry companion!! On Caldey a friend and I did manage an accompanied 'silent walk', walking together without the gossip/chat.

If you can't get away then find a quiet spot in the garden or the house to 'retreat to' and ignore the phone or emails. A group I belong to are currently praying daily for a situation. We discussed the best time to pray 'together' and agreed a good time of day for most people. We pray wherever we are knowing the others are doing the same.

Those who use Daily Bread Bible notes may have read the reflection:

He gives me work that I may seek His rest,

He gives me strength to meet the hardest test;

And as I walk in providential grace,

I find that joy goes with me, at God's pace. — Gustafson

So I ask - where is your time? Where ever and when ever I hope it is a blessing.

Call for Action at Danger Junction

Fearing that there could be a fatal accident on a dangerous road junction in Hunton, a 20 year-old village student has urged the Parish Council to take action to make the intersection safer.

Alice Simmons told last month's annual meeting that her older sister Hannah had been involved in a serious accident in which her car was badly damaged when she was trying to pull out of Bishops Lane into West Street.

"The problem is that motorists – often parents visiting the school - park on the other side of the junction forcing cars travelling from Yalding to pull out onto the wrong side of the road making it dangerous for the drivers whose sightline is restricted when they come out from Bishop/Water Lane"

Former Councillor, Lorraine Redfarn, who works at the school, said that the staff were aware of the problem and in the past police had attended and requested that motorists park sensibly in West Street. "Often they seem to follow the police advice for a couple of days and then return to parking in the same places."

Acting Chairman, Gary Thomas, said that the council was aware of the difficulties that arose for village residents and had considered the possibility of seeking parking restrictions or cones in West Street to try to ease the situation. The situation could be improved when the footpath opens later in June between Bensted Close and the Village Hall, allowing parents to park there instead of in West Street so that pupils could use the path to get to the school.

The matter is being put on the agenda of the next council meeting as one of urgency.

Councillors decided to oppose a variation of a condition of planning permission granted on appeal (being the change of use of land to residential for three mobile homes for a gypsy family) to allow for the stationing of a further two mobile homes for family members at Mulberry Farm in East Street. Neighbours attended to express their views.

A report from chairman Roger Sawtell, was presented by Gary Thomas. Reports were also given by representatives from 15 village groups and organisations and will appear in next month's Herald.

Pie, Pickles & Pint Night




Saturday 6th July from 8.00pm

Eight highly talented young musicians arrived in Hunton to play the opening gig of their major venue tour (yes, Hunton Village Hall made it into the listings of a national newspaper "The Independent" that day). They arrived in sunshine with little knowledge of the venue and what to expect. A wonderful house totalling 90 arrived and the scene is set. The first half was performed by Basquiat Strings. They played beautiful chamber style jazz with lovely interplay among the four parts cello, guitar, double bass and drums. Difficult playing and for some in the audience quite difficult to get into but no dispute about the high quality of the playing.

The second set by 6-piece Oriole was a compelling affirmation of all the talent on display. Haunting, beautiful and always rhythmical Brazilain-Spanish flavours poured out of the musicians underpinned by the great tenor sax playing of Idris Rahman and the fabulously sympathetic and insistent drumming of Seb Rochford. Most of the titles were from their last album 'Every New Day' which is one to try to listen out for. The musicians had a great night and so did we. A memorable gig. Thank you to all those who made it possible.

Sarah McQuaid appeared on stage at Hunton Village Hall on 10th May and put on a fine show that left the audience buzzing with appreciation.
