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## Parish Council AGM - Village Feedback

Hunton Primary School teacher, Catherine Wickham, reported that the 20mph speed limit in West Street had made the road a lot safer for the children while the safety situation would be further improved when the footpath from the Village Hall to Bensted Close is completed and pupils can use it to walk to and from the school. The busy school team continues to achieve high standards.

The Village Hall has a new booking secretary and caretaker said David Heaton. In the past Applause has staged events but with cutbacks in funding the Hall Committee is now successfully running them. The solar panels are expected to result in savings of £1500 a year.

King George V Playing Field Chairman, Danny Peacock, said the newly installed play equipment was well used. The state of the car park continued to cause concern but the cost of total repair was estimated to be too high at present. The annual meeting is on July 4<sup>th</sup>.

St Mary's Church was losing members of the congregation but newcomers kept the numbers about the same said churchwarden Alison Ellman-Brown adding that the Christmas Festival had been hugely successful encouraging more events to take place. The Church supported the School and David Jones had put in a great deal of work during the interregnum with other volunteers working hard to maintain the centuries-old church.

Hunton Herald had been kept busy reporting on a range of local events and organisations, said co-editor David Heaton with thanks to all those supplying features. Funds raised from advertising had been donated to Peace Cottages, the Village Club and for the new lighting equipment used at the Christmas Festival.

Hunton Parish Plan Committee's Annette Trought outlined highway and transport matters covered by other reports. Members had operated speed watch equipment gaining instant results in slowing down drivers. The Pop Up Shop had been a success while the fifth litter pick team had tidied up the Village. The Community Orchard Group had produced a questionnaire, which had the highest number of returns of the group of parishes bidding for funding.

Hunton Bowls Club is trying to recruit new members from the Village, said Danny Peacock adding that both the ladies and gents teams had enjoyed success last season.

Hunton Wanderers Cricket Club had seen a period of flux last year when groundsman John Adams stepped down. But this was a catalyst to bring the Club together, said Chairman Simon Taylor with two keen members now preparing the pitch with £1400 spent on maintaining the wicket surface, which despite the terrible winter weather was now in excellent condition.

Hunton Football Club, celebrating its 115<sup>th</sup> anniversary, is one of the oldest in Maidstone with teams in the Premier and Division One leagues. David Elliott said that recruitment was difficult and if any players or supporters wanted to join the Club they would be welcome. There were 22 players aged between 17 and 35.

Hunton Village Club membership was down with 30 not renewing, said Phil Nichols urging more visitors from the Village to use the club facilities. It is difficult to engage volunteer bar staff if there are only a few customers. On a positive note Parish Plan and other committee meetings were held in the Club while the Lent Lunches had proved popular with funds raised for new lighting and re-decoration by volunteers.

Peace Cottage Charity, the Village almshouses, had seen refurbishments take place in two houses in 2012 with further work to two more this summer, said Liz Oliver. Roof guttering downpipes had been cleared and sloping ramps are being installed for wheelchairs. *(continued over page)*

A few years ago a very good friend of ours took a break from ministry for a sabbatical and decided to put his trust in God and follow Jesus' command found in Luke chapter nine to "take nothing for the journey – no staff, no bag, no money, no extra shirt" when he sent out the twelve disciples. This friend dressed in a tunic similar to a monk's habit and left to walk around North Yorkshire for a month. The hospitality he received on his journey was amazing, and he never once had to fall back on the emergency credit card tucked in his sock!

Alison and I join you here in the United Benefice of Coxheath, East Farleigh, Hunton, Linton, and West Farleigh on a journey of faith that already has over 1,000 years of history. There is a Japanese proverb that says "when you have completed 95 per cent of the journey, you are only half way there". We know that there is a great heritage on which to build and a future, which will go far beyond our time here, and my desire is to build on the past to provide for the future life of worship across the benefice. It is an amazing privilege to journey in faith with you, our brothers and sisters in Christ, for this small part of that journey. As we each take our part we will, as St. Paul says, "speaking the truth in love ... grow to become in every respect the mature body of him who is the head, that is, Christ."

My desire is to see each person affirmed in who they are in Christ, to discover or re-discover their gifts, abilities, talents, and passion and then be released, equipped, enabled to serve Christ and each other that we might better travel the journey of faith together.

## The 75 year Old Pavilion

Hunton Wanderers Cricket Club has made a plea to the Parish Council for advice and support in its bid to replace the 75 year old pavilion which is riddled with woodworm and in danger of falling down.

Chairman, Simon Taylor, reported to Councillors that the building, despite club members' efforts to extend its life, is suffering from the cladding falling to pieces and the gable ends leaning out dangerously.

"The pavilion is on land purchased by the Council from Mrs Campbell-Bannerman of Hunton Court, so the club has no rights of ownership or tenancy over it and is unable to secure a grant to rebuild the pavilion. The full cost of around £65,000 for changing rooms, kitchen and showers, could possibly be obtained from Sport England under its Inspired Facilities scheme."

To gain this grant, the Club has asked the Council to consider options, including granting the Wanderers a formal tenancy at a nominal rent; making a funding bid on behalf of the club; or adopting the responsibility of carrying out the renovations or replacing the pavilion with the support of the cricketers.

"We are not asking the Council to take the difficult or expensive route as we can do most of the practical work. But without input from the Council as guardians of the site, the Club is locked in the current situation until the pavilion simply falls down in a few years time," said Mr Taylor.

Another alternative would be to develop a much larger combined multi-purpose sports and community building but this could cost between £150,000 and £200,000.

The Council called an emergency meeting with the cricket, football and bowls club officers to discuss a future replacement pavilion.

## Visit to Loose Valley
