Dear friends,

On May 10th at a petrol station in Larkfield, I was in collision with a vehicle, which necessitated me being taken to hospital. Surgery followed a week later and subsequently I discover that I have a broken leg and a smashed up ankle. I will be out of action because of lack of mobility for some weeks and consequently I am dictating this into my iPad isn't technology wonderful? I have to say that the support from the police, the ambulance paramedics, and the hospital staff at Maidstone and Pembury, from ancillary staff through to consultants and surgeons, was top notch. I was kept well informed of options and progress and could not have wished for better care.

Personally, I'm not of the school of thought that says that 'all things happen for a reason', but I do believe, as the Bible tells us, that God is intimately interested in what happens to us and that he will use all of our circumstances for good. He will seek to discover what is best for us wherever we are and whatever is going on in our lives. The difficulty, of course, is that in the middle of whatever is happening for us, whether we are physically hurt or struggling emotionally, or full of stress or illness, it's hard to acknowledge and sense God's presence in our lives in the midst of the challenge. But as the Psalmist tells us, no matter what our circumstances, even as we walk through the darkest valley, God's desire as that of a shepherd is to guide by his rod and to protect by his staff. I pray that whatever is happening in your life at present, whether joy or frustration, peace or struggle, you will be aware of God walking alongside you and sharing his love and peace. And if I might be so bold, I pray that for myself too!

Hunton Book Club Review - 'A Passage to India' by E M Forster

When Adela Quested and her elderly companion Mrs Moore arrive in the Indian town of Chandrapore, they quickly feel trapped by its insular and prejudiced 'Anglo-Indian' community. Determined to escape the parochial English enclave and explore the 'real India' they seek the guidance of the charming and mercurial Dr Aziz, a cultivated Indian Muslim. But a mysterious incident occurs while they are exploring the Marabar caves with Aziz, and the wellrespected doctor soon finds himself at the centre of a scandal that rouses violent passions among both the British and their Indian subjects. A masterly portrait of a society in the grip of imperialism, A Passage to India compellingly depicts the fate of individuals caught between the great political and cultural conflicts of the modern world.

There were rather mixed feelings about this book. Two members loved it, enjoyed the story, and thought it was very well written, whilst another two were disappointed as they thought it rather slow with too much conversation. The dialogue was sometimes confusing as it was not clear who was "speaking". The remainder of us did not finish the book. However the Book was still scored as 7.
