I am shamelessly stealing the content for this month's pastoral letter from 'Cilla McKenzie. This is based on a talk she gave at a recent lunchtime service. As you may know, John and 'Cilla have decided to move away, and we are ever grateful for the ministry and friendship they have shared with us and especially the church fellowship at Linton. The church calendar helps us remember people and their actions by dedicating a day to them. William Wilberforce, Olaudah Equiano and Thomas Clarkson, who were anti-slavery campaigners, had such a day. These three men used their positions of personal influence and power to work for the freedom of others whom they had never met. The British campaign to abolish the slave trade is generally considered to have begun in the 1870s with the establishment of the anti-slavery committees and the presentation to parliament of the first 'slave trade petition' in 1783. The same year, William Wilberforce, whilst dining with an old friend, met slavery abolitionist the Rev. James Ramsay. Ramsay had been a clergyman in the Isle of Kitts in the Leeward Isles and a medical supervisor on the plantations there. What Ramsay witnessed of the conditions endured by the slaves, both at sea and on the plantations, horrified him. Of the 11 million Africans exported for slavery about 1.4 million died during the voyage.

On returning to England after 15 years he accepted the Benefice of Teston in 1781. (This is one of our neighbouring parishes and you may know that two of William Wilberforce's sons were later Rector of East Farleigh). There he met Sir Charles and Lady Middleton and others interested in promoting Christianity and moral improvements in Britain and overseas – a group that later became known as the Testonites.

They were appalled at Ramsey's reports of the depraved lifestyles of slave owners and the cruel treatment of the slaves in the British sugar colonies. The anti-slavery group, then, was born at Teston and, at the urging of Lady Middleton, Sir Charles suggested that William Wilberforce bring forward the abolition of the slave trade in parliament. Although he felt inadequate for the task he pursued it with vigour for 18 years and in 1807 the slave trade was finally abolished. This did not, however, free those who were already slaves – it was not until 1833 that an act was passed giving freedom to all slaves in the British Empire. William Wilberforce made his final anti-slavery speech in Maidstone in 1833.

The modern day slave trade is, of course, largely to do with people trafficking where people are bought and sold for sexual exploitation, forced labour, street crime, domestic servitude or even the sale of organs and human sacrifice. Men, women and children are trafficked within their own countries and across international borders. Trafficking affects every continent and every country. It is estimated that there are still 2 million men, women and children trafficked each year. You can find out more, and learn about what individuals can do at www.stopthetraffic.org. Let us pray that the work of the great reformers will not be forgotten and be inspired by their great efforts.

In last month's Herald we explained that St Mary's has two old pine pews that are in need of a new home or homes. The two pews are 93 inches (2.36m) long and are complete with both their arms intact. We would love the pews to remain in the parish and are therefore offering them to residents first. We are happy to sell the pews singly or as a pair. As a guide we are hoping for bids in excess of £100 for each pew, but any reasonable bid will be considered by the PCC.

To ensure fairness we will be conducting a blind auction for the pews and are looking to receive sealed bids by Saturday 13th September 2014, which is the date of the Antiques and Craft Fair at St Mary's. Bids, which should be in sealed envelopes marked "Hunton Pews", can be left at the Fair itself or delivered beforehand to the Rector, Rev Peter Callway, The Rectory, 144 Heath Road, Coxheath, ME17 4PL. The purchaser(s) will need to arrange collection of the pew(s) from the church.
