# **Housing Survey Update**

The Parish Council has received the results of the Housing Needs Survey that was commissioned by Mr David Hubble, a private landowner now living in the West Country. The land that he owns is agricultural land alongside Bensted Close. The survey included a draft proposal for development of that land. The return rate for the questionnaire was 42%, which is higher than the standard return rate for such surveys. Below is a summary of the report's key findings:

- 88% of respondents were AGAINST such a development.
- 7% of respondents supported the development.
- 5% were 'unsure'.
- There may be a potential need for up to 3 open market homes for 2 couples and 1 family (the report does not venture an opinion as to whether or not this need would be met by natural turnover).

Respondents were given the opportunity to comment in their own words on their response to the proposed plan. The report lists 86 comments of which 5 were supportive of the scheme to some degree with all referring to the housing element but none specifically supporting the proposed village facilities. The remainder (just over 94%) were not supportive. The Parish Council will take account of these findings in the creation of its updated Neighbourhood Plan, the objective of which is to secure and develop the future of Hunton as decided by the village. We will keep everyone informed of progress over the coming months. Further correspondence has been circulated to the village stating Mr Hubble's intention to continue to pursue this matter.

#### Dear Friends

During the summer I sang a few services in Lichfield Cathedral with a choir that I am a member of. With the start of the First World War Centenary they had a display of memorabilia, modern art and poetry. Next to one lithograph there was a poem by Wilfred Owen, a poet who was killed in the trenches. As I read the poem, which was about Abraham and Isaac, I looked at the picture. Yes, there was Abraham with his son bound up and laid upon the makeshift altar. Yes, I thought, then the angel of the Lord tells Abraham not to slay his son and God provided a ram caught in a thicket instead. I looked at the picture. Yes, there was the ram and the angel. At that point, however, the poem departed from the Bible story and ended with the words, 'But the old man would not so, but slew his son, And half the seed of Europe, one by one' and there in the picture were rows and rows of soldiers queuing up to be slain. That really shocked me.

Of course, Wilfred Owen was using a familiar Bible story as a framework to present a very tragic truth – the huge loss of young men. World War I was meant to be the war to end all wars. Sadly we know only too well that there has been almost continual war somewhere in the world since then. Today, Syria, Iraq, Ukraine and Afghanistan spring immediately to mind.

I am writing this as the Invictus Games are taking place. Each one of the competitors has had an injury caused, for the most part, by war, a life-changing moment but one that has not destroyed their spirit to strive with courage and fortitude to succeed in sport as part of their rehabilitation.

This summer I had what could have been a life-changing moment. In fact, in some ways it was. I had an accident as I walked with my family beside a river in Devon, falling down the riverbank, colliding with tree roots and ending up in the water. I was taken to hospital with a crushed vertebra ... but three days later I walked out of the hospital! This story could have ended so differently.

Whilst in hospital I was visited by a Pastoral Visitor, a lovely lady who spoke with me and then knelt down and prayed with me. I can't tell you how comforting this was and, somehow, it made me want to draw nearer to God myself. A favourite verse sprang to mind. 'Come near to God and he will come near to you' (James 4:8).

Do you take the time to be still, to be near to God, listening to him? It is so easy to get caught up in the busyness of life with so many things competing for our attention that being still with God can often get pushed out; I know it does for me. How can we know God's voice and his will for us if we don't spend time with him? Fortunately, Abraham knew God's voice and did not slay his son. Can we be this certain with the choices we make?

#### **End of Season Sports Roundup**

#### Hunton Wanderers Cricket Club

It has been a year of mixed fortunes for our three league sides. Our Saturday 1<sup>st</sup> XI finished 4<sup>th</sup> in its Kent Regional Cricket League division, winning and losing an almost equal number of games. With some better performances we could have been competing for promotion; however it just wouldn't be Hunton without our infamous and spectacular batting collapses. Highlights included the double win over local rivals Yalding; the low point of the year was probably our match away against Holborough. Having dismissed the opposition for 57 on an atrocious wicket, we were unbelievably bowled out for 27. We even got a headline in the KM!

The Saturday 2<sup>nd</sup> XI gamely battled on despite often having a shortage of

personnel. When they won games it was a day of major triumph; when they lost they took it in good heart and came back for more. What was most encouraging was that we didn't have to cancel a single fixture and always got a side out, when teams around us were conceding fixtures and some even withdrawing from the league.

Following our promotion last year, the Sunday Kent Village League side had high expectations for the 2014 season. After an excellent start, with a record beating 340 scored against Harbledown, we underachieved for the rest of the season to the extent

that we lost games we expected to win, not to mention the poor weather in July and August, which robbed us of points in three games. Nevertheless, due to a restructuring in the league this year, we find ourselves promoted to Division 5, despite a mid-table finish.

This is a time of anticipation, more than a little worry but above all optimism that the cricket club is about to embark on a new and positive era. This has been borne out by the enthusiasm of our members, the hard work of those involved every week with preparing wickets, raising teams and organising on the day, and our fundraising efforts – about £3,000 over the past three years towards the pavilion project.

Our thanks also go to the Parish Council, Paulina Stockell and our Borough Councillors for their support. The pavilion is a village project and we are delighted that so many local people are embracing it with enthusiasm.
