## Lottery Grant for School

Hunton Primary School is delighted to have been awarded £8,665 from the Big Lottery Fund for a sensory and development room. The grant will enable the school to redevelop a classroom so that it provides a great environment for helping the children's social and emotional development during extra-curricular provisions.

The room will encourage a variety of different activities, with special areas for art, computer use and reading and with furniture that can be easily moved about to allow for activities requiring more space, including dance, art and drama sessions. The new classroom will allow a great variety of new activities to take place at the school. In addition the room will be used as a 'sensory' play area for children to use during lunch hours and will host new lunchtime and after-school clubs as well as being used as a resource during the daily breakfast club.

The school would like to thank Mr Elson and Mr Eaton wholeheartedly for their time and dedication in order to secure the funding on behalf of the school.

## After the Housing Needs Survey - A Neighbourhood Plan for Hunton

Hunton Parish Council has taken the decision to produce a Neighbourhood Plan for the village. This will replace the Parish Plan but will incorporate and build upon areas of concern identified within it. The Neighbourhood Plan will be the definitive statement of the vision for the development of the village over the next 20 years. To produce this Neighbourhood Plan, the Parish Plan Steering Committee will commission an independent piece of work that will establish exactly what the village wants to keep, to change and to develop over the next 20 years. Work will commence in 2015.

Dear Friends

Another year has gone and another lies ahead. Do you look back on 2014 and say, "Thank God that 2014 is over and I hope next year will be better"? I know people who do every year and look forward to the New Year as a fresh start, a change of fortune, an opportunity to move forward with hope. Sad really to have to wait each year for that moment as 1<sup>st</sup> January is a purely human idea and is part of the way our world is organised. Until 1752 in England the New Year began on 25<sup>th</sup> March as the year beginning and ending was related to the seasons for farmers. In Scotland the change took place in 1600 and for the next 150 years England and Scotland marked the New Year on different days yet still had the same calendar. We still have a remnant of this in the tax year, which begins on 6<sup>th</sup> April, because when the calendar was changed 11 days were taken off the year, so the next day to 25<sup>th</sup> March became 6<sup>th</sup> April. Confused? Google it and all will be revealed!

In reality the start of any new year is really simply a start of something we need to count from; in other words, a new start. Which of course raises the question of why we need new starts? We have our birthday, our wedding anniversary and a new school year as examples of new starts. We could simply mark our birthday by counting days since we were born, so I would be around 24,300 days today! Every day would then be a fresh start; every moment in fact would be the beginning of something new.

So as a new year approaches what are you going to begin and what are you going to put behind you? What are you going to hang onto and what are you leaving behind? For each of us it will be something different and personal. It may be to do with relationships with others or even with ourselves. It may be that you want to achieve something that you have put off for a long time or even finish something started years ago. Whatever it is, you actually don't have to wait until that arbitrary date of 1<sup>st</sup> January. Each moment is a moment to take hold of and to move forward with fresh hopes and new beginnings.

Maybe the place for a new start is in our relationship with the God who created the world and everything in it. Paul, writing to the church in Corinth said, "Therefore if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; the old has gone and the new has come!" (2 Corinthians 5 v 17) It is our relationship with God that is so important in all our dealings with others. Not that we should be perfect but that we should be aiming at seeking the best way forward in everything we try to do and the best way is always in union with the one who created us, loves us and on the cross brought us into that perfect relationship with him.

## Potholes Being Addressed

Following a meeting with representatives from KCC Highways we are pleased to note that many of the worst potholes in the village roads have been fixed. The job is, however, far from finished and we will continue to push for the remaining work to be completed as soon as possible. We will also be looking into possible longer-term solutions to the perennial issue of road verge subsidence. If you are aware of any potholes then please report them to KCC Highways on 03000 418181 and also to us (with the reference number you are given) so we can monitor progress on your behalf.

### As the Wet Weather Approaches...

We all remember the floods of last year and the way that ditches, drains and roads were inundated as the rain fell. We would like to ask you all to please:

- Report to the Parish Council and KCC (on 03000 418181) any blocked drains or localised flooding you come across in the village.
- Ensure any drainage ditches on your land are clear of dams and obstructions (the Environment Agency require you to do this).
- Report to the Parish Council any sewers that are discharging via manholes etc. and also report sewage discharge to Southern Water (0845 2720845). If no action is taken the Environment Agency (0800 807060) needs to be notified and they will 'encourage' Southern Water to take action.
- If you do contact any of the agencies above please let your Parish Council know (with any reference number or incident number you are given) so we can monitor and chase on your behalf.

In addition, please report to the Parish Council any footpaths that you come across that need clearing and remember that if you have hedges on your property that are obstructing a footpath it is your responsibility to trim them back.

## Parish Council Vacancy

Following the resignation of Cllr Les Leonard, the parish council is seeking to fill the vacant position by co-option. If you are interested in becoming a parish councillor please submit a written expression of interest by 9<sup>th</sup> January 2015 to the Clerk, Mrs Sharon Goodwin, 11 Barton Road, Maidstone, Kent, ME15 7BU or by email to [huntonpc@googlemail.com](mailto:huntonpc@googlemail.com). To be eligible for the role you must be 18 years or older, be a British Citizen or a citizen of the Commonwealth or European Union and not be subject to a bankruptcy order or have been convicted in the UK within the last five years of any offence for which a prison sentence over three months was imposed. You must also satisfy at least ONE of the following:

- Be registered as a local government elector for the parish;
- Have occupied any land or premises in the parish, as owner or tenant, for the whole of the preceding 12 months;
- Your principal or only place of work during the preceding 12 months has been in the parish;
- Have lived in the parish or within 4.8 km of it for the whole of the preceding 12 months.

## Village Club AGM

The Village Club's AGM was held in early December and gave the chairman the opportunity to express his thanks to all of the volunteers who keep the club functioning. It was also an opportunity to update the members on club matters. Membership within the village is strong and there remains a reasonably healthy bank balance. Events such as the "Pop-Up Shop" and "Lunches" had been well attended and the donations, which totalled in excess of £600, made to the Club by the organisers, were gratefully received. The quiz nights, fun darts tournament, race night and pizza event had also proved popular but it would be good to see more members using the Club in the evening. The treasurer, Doug Redfarn, who is standing down from the position after 10 years loyal service, cautioned that the bar takings are at a dangerously low level and if they continue at such a level are unlikely to cover the cost of electricity and heating in 2015, making the income from the darts team and functions of crucial importance. Repairs / replacement of the flat roofs are likely to be required as are five replacement windows for the toilets, so the balance of £13,643 is likely to be greatly reduced during the year unless more income can be generated. A proposal to increase the annual subscription by £2 and to maintain the £5 discount for payment before 28<sup>th</sup> February was accepted at the meeting, (so members wishing to take advantage of the discount should renew early). The chairman expressed a wish for all persons attending functions at the club to be members so that there is no infringement of rules and regulations and, with the subscription being comparatively low compared to other clubs, hoped there would not be any difficulties with paying this. With more daytime functions planned the club is becoming more of a village community centre and as such should have a future. The committee would like to wish everyone a Happy New Year.
