Abide with Me

Watching the FA Cup Final, I was struck by the enthusiasm of that huge crowd as they joined the 'fans choir' to sing 'Abide With Me'. It is the favourite hymn of Queen Elizabeth, it has been sung on sinking ships, at major sporting events and at the passing of loved ones. Hymns are a powerful way to draw near to God and I began to wonder what the story was behind this great hymn and why it continues to be so popular.

The hymn was written by Henry Francis Lyte 1793-1847. He, with his wife Ann, was a faithful pastor in Brixham in Devon. He worked tirelessly ministering to his parish, caring for his family and writing poems and hymns, including 'Praise my Soul the King of Heaven'. In 1844 he was diagnosed with TB and his health began to decline. On September 4th 1847 he gave his farewell message in his church, went for a walk along the beach, then retired to his study and penned 'Abide With Me'. A few days later he died and his last words were Joy and Peace. The music was composed by William Monk, Choir Master at York Minster, and was played at the memorial service. As he often does, God took a sad ending of a life and made something of lasting worth. The opening words of the hymn were taken from the story of the Emmaus road at the end of Luke's gospel. That first Sunday morning, following Jesus' crucifixion, two disciples were walking home. They had heard reports from the women of an empty tomb, but could not believe it. The risen Lord Jesus joined them on the road, but because of their grief and despair they did not recognise him. He spoke to them on the way, and comforted them, and when they arrived home, they asked him simply, 'stay with us', or as it is put in the old version, 'abide with us'. It was only then that they recognised him.

Maybe you are going through a tough time right now. Try giving Jesus the invitation to walk the road with you and stay with you. Perhaps you could use the words of 'Abide with me' as your prayer.

Tree Pests and Diseases – Breaking News

The Forestry Commission have reported that oriental chestnut gall wasp (OCGW) was discovered in a woodland at Farningham, near Swanley in June, the first time this pest has been confirmed as present in the UK. OCGW is an insect of Asian origin that affects sweet chestnut trees. It does not affect horse chestnut or any other widely grown trees in Britain. Its larvae cause abnormal growths, called galls, to form on sweet chestnut leaves, twigs and petioles (the stalks which attach the leaf blades to the stems). These green or rose-coloured galls inhibit the function of the leaves, weakening the tree and making it more susceptible to other pests and diseases. The galls are the most obvious indication of infestation as the wasp itself is tiny and unlikely to be noticed. It does not sting or pose any other risk to humans or animals.

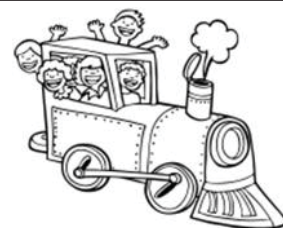

Roe Deer

There have been two recent early morning sightings of roe deer, one in a field on Elphicks Farm and another in Water Lane. Roe deer are native to mainland Britain but became extinct in the south of England by the 17th century. Re-introductions in the 19th century allowed them to re-colonise but until comparatively recently Kent has been free of wild deer, although it seems they are spreading east rapidly. The one spotted in Water Lane was a buck and may well have been the same animal as the one on Elphicks Farm. It would be interesting to know if anyone else has spotted deer around the village – something for our early morning dog walkers to look out for perhaps.

Find a 'Heritage Tree' in Hunton

As part of my new role as Tree Warden, I found out at a training course that there is a 5-year project to record 10,000 'heritage trees' in Kent; that is: old trees, big trees, rare trees, and those that have a cultural significance in communities (such as planted for Jubilee occasions, or in commemoration). The project is about to enter its final year; it has recorded over 8,000 trees and there are 220 volunteer surveyors – it is close to achieving its target, but needs some local help.

Can you help? Have a look at the interactive map on the website (www.btcv.org.uk/cgi-bin/kenttreemap.cgi) and you can see that Linton has 24 trees recorded, Farleigh has 37, Loose has 55, Yalding has 14...and Hunton 2 – those are the Yew in the Churchyard and a Cedar of Lebanon in the Court grounds!

We must have more trees that people know about or suspect are rare, old, or cherished? There's at least one down at Stoneacre at the bottom of George Street that I suspect will qualify. Hadlow's Tree Warden is going to come and visit Hunton and look around with me during the summer – can you ring me (820429) or email me (senseass@btinternet.com) with any thoughts about heritage tree possibilities in the Parish, and I'll go out and take a look (while jogging or checking the ponds!). Thanks in advance.
