



## Church Decoration Gets Go-Ahead

It is widely known that the current fund raising objective of the Friends of St Mary's is to raise sufficient funds to enable the PCC to be in a position to sanction the much-needed internal decoration of our church. The church itself is still a most attractive venue for couples to marry in as seen by the number of weddings held already and still planned for this year, but nevertheless the redecoration is overdue. This has to be undertaken by specialist firms so is not cheap, but I am happy to announce that we have raised sufficient funds so far to enable stage one to start in September this year and the PCC, with whom we are working very closely on this project, will be instructing the builders appropriately.

The Trustees have worked hard, giving up hours of their spare time to get where we are, but we could not have done that without our members' support, generous donations from individuals, a grant from Cobtree Trust and another successful Train Day, courtesy of Sue and Lawrence Martin; despite the dreadful weather it was a spectacular success and generated in excess of £1,600 on the day. The grant from the Cobtree Trust of £3,000 plus funds raised from earlier events mean that our current bank balance is over £17,000. We still have a little more to come from the Train Day, we will be running the bar at the Harvest Supper on the 27<sup>th</sup> September, holding our Autumn Supper Dance on the 14<sup>th</sup> November, providing the BBQ at the Christmas Market on the 12<sup>th</sup> December and we have just been asked to run the bar at the pantomime next year. This means a busy time for us, but so worthwhile.

It would be remiss if I did not pay tribute to the PCC lead by Rev Peter Callway. They have managed the actual project from the start, which is far from straightforward, but we have co-operated closely throughout to bring us happily to where we are now.

I understand that the total cost of the work, which will be done in stages, is in the region of £25,000 plus VAT. There will be other expenses, but between us we are confident that this will be a most successful enterprise for all of you to see quite soon.

Sincere thanks to everyone who has supported us to bring us to where we are now and look forward to seeing you again in the future.

I have just returned from holiday with Alison, and as well as enjoying some time with the family, we had some time just to ourselves. As part of that we explored a new part of Switzerland (which some of you will know has family connections on Alison's side and where we visit fairly frequently). We went off on a journey eastwards towards Lichtenstein and Germany, via the Italian part of Switzerland. We went over amazing mountain passes as high as you can imagine, and along deep valleys where the powerful rivers and waterfalls flowed. We saw vast plains of green in the agricultural areas as well as inhabitable rocky mountaintops. We drove (and walked a bit) along valleys that seemed to go on for ever, breathing in clean fresh air. We were mightily blessed with incredible scenery and beautiful landscapes. It reminded me of the majesty of God's creation and the beauty of this earth, which we are privileged to inhabit and be given stewardship of. It reminded me also of the passage set for the Sunday before we left on holiday which talks of God's love being higher, closer, wider, deeper and further than we can imagine. The scenery was so impressive that it sometimes took our breath away but the thing that is really wonderful is that God, the creator of all of that, wants to be in a relationship with us, and whose love is so deep and wide and tall that we cannot bypass it, whether we try to go over, under or round it, and that he wants us to go further with him and achieve things that are beyond our imagining – the passage (Ephesians 3:14-21) tells us that God wants to do immeasurably more with us and for us than we can ask or imagine. We aren't all able to see mountains and lakes as Alison and I have this past couple of weeks, but if we look for God in the small things of creation – a dewdrop reflecting the sun, a rainbow, a flower bud opening, a bird singing, a butterfly fluttering by – we can be inspired by the wonder of creation, and the depth and height and width and closeness of his love for us, and maybe go a little deeper and further with God than perhaps we had imagined.

## Hunton's Who's Who - Mike Summersgill

Many of you will know Mike from music events at the Village Hall, fortnightly footpath orientations, or perhaps in his newer role as volunteer Pond & Tree Warden. Although he and Christine moved to the village in 2009 to renovate Grafton, their ties to Hunton go back much longer. Two things about Mike he will probably have told you; he's a Civil Engineer and a Yorkshireman – well, maybe just the second one! He's probably also mentioned Kent as being just another 'overseas' posting, albeit of 28 years (actually now longer than he's lived in GodzOwnCounty).

Mike trained to become a Civil Engineer when at Yorkshire Water (also being a part-time local DJ!), and then went to work in the Middle East (UAE/Oman) for most of the 1980's, before moving back to the UK. Having worked on big contaminated land projects in London (Dome, Woolwich Arsenal), he has run his own consultancy firm in recent years (where there's muck, there's brass?); Mike was delighted to be President of his professional Chartered Institution ([www.CIWEM.org](http://www.CIWEM.org)) in 2013-14 and has also been chairman of the regional Institution of Civil Engineers branch, and a Governor at MGS.

The Hunton connection came in 1987, when Christine, Mike, and two very young daughters arrived back at Gatwick ten days after the hurricane, to take up a job with an ex-colleague in Maidstone (at A.G.Weeks & Partners). Looking for a place to rent in the KM, he spotted a small cottage in George Street that was next to a 'PH' on the firm's old Ordnance Survey map. Whittingstall Cottage was an enchanting change from the desert, but the Bull PH next door had closed eight years earlier! In fact, the other pub in the village closed soon after Mike arrived, and so they upped and moved to Loose!

But during that short stay, Christine had enrolled Freya in the local Playgroup and started to help out with her (reception) teaching skills at the Village Hall...and that continued for many years, as Katy and then Paul made nursery friends (with walks/picnics around Reed Court and the Beult that they still remember!). The family used to come back to Hunton for parties & gigs regularly, and were even at the village hall for the Millennium NYE party. Of course, Mike now sees a lot more of the hall as it's treasurer (especially its drainage system recently) and both those 'young' daughters have celebrated their weddings there this summer, along with friends they made at playgroup and later schoolmates.

What Mike particularly likes about Hunton are the lovely quiet and flat routes/paths you can choose to run/cycle, in three directions at least, in the early spring and summer mornings; he's less keen on the frost and fog pockets in autumn, and the 8am/5pm rush hour along East Street. Oh, and the lack of a pub!

## Peter Harvey

It is with sadness that we report the death of Peter Harvey, a resident of Hunton for very many years. Originally from Medway, Peter moved to Bishops Lane with his wife in the 1970s, but after a short period his wife sadly died; the couple did not have children. Throughout his life Peter travelled widely, with the Boy Scout Movement in his early years, on overseas assignments whilst working for the government and, following the death of his wife, visiting numerous countries where tourists had yet to popularise, including Nepal, China, India, remote parts of South America, the Galapagos Islands and even a trip on a Russian ice breaker to Southern Antarctica! An excellent photographer, he kept detailed folders of his photos with captions, telling the story of his amazing adventures.

He was very intelligent (daily completing the Telegraph crossword in record time), articulate, fiercely independent and a private person, who loved the outdoor life but hated people fussing over him. Following several falls over a short period, he decided he could not look after himself any more, despite the willing help from friends and residents in Bishops Lane, and so, now in his nineties, he spent the last two and a half years happily being cared for at The Grove Nursing Home, where he reluctantly attended many trips and in-house functions, including Elvis impersonation events. He lived his life to the full the way *he* wanted to and will be sadly missed.
