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# Hunton Village Club – The Future

Following last month's article and editorial I was pleased to be contacted by a number of villagers who expressed their concern and willingness to support the club in the best way that they could. I believe the Herald article also encouraged members and some non-members to attend the AGM and express their views regarding the future. The committee advised that the club's income had just exceeded expenditure due in part to the donations made following the lunches, income from the bar at functions (including darts matches) and a reduction in costs with closures on Fridays and Saturdays. The committee also informed the meeting of discussions that had been held with potential business investors relating to a number of possibilities including transforming the club into a 'food hub', selling local produce, with kitchen stations to provide apprenticeships for young chefs together with a 'micro pub'. There had also been discussions with consultants regarding lottery funding for specific projects. What became quite clear was the attendees' total lack of appetite for business investment but a strong desire to expand the club into a more community focussed establishment. There was a suggestion that perhaps the village hall and club should merge under one banner and committee so that they can further complement one another. Other suggestions were made including the installation of kitchen facilities and better advertising to let people know that it is possible to hire the club for functions. All of the suggestions will be considered by the committee in the coming weeks. It was a successful, thought provoking meeting, with the icing on the cake for me being Liz Ridgway volunteering to become the new Club Secretary.

#### Pastoral Letter

Another year comes round again and with it the thoughts from previous years. One hundred years ago my grandparents got married, seventy-five years ago my parents did the same and fifty years ago, on 1st January 1966, I got married. (25 years ago nothing happened!). Strange how figures, numbers and events can form patterns when we least expect them. When I taught mathematics there were always two series that occurred in natural life that led to the lesson on 'the birds and the bees'. One sequence was the human one; each of us required 2 parents, 4 grandparents, 8 great grandparents and so on. The other was a sequence, which was named after a 13<sup>th</sup> century mathematician, Fibonacci. The sequence begins 1,1,2,3,5,8,13,21... each new number is the sum of the previous two. Looks good but in natural life it occurs in many places not least in the life of bees! A bee is sexed by the type of parents it has. So a male bee only has a mother and no father whilst a female bee has both mother and father! If we therefore trace back the family of a male bee, he has a mother, who had a mother and father, who in turn only had 3 grandparents and then 5 great grandparents and so on. There, it's wonderful what we find out at times!

But what has this to do with a new year? In one sense absolutely nothing. But on the other hand, if you're the sort of person who can be amazed at the wonders of this world, a world that God created, you can be amazed at what at first can look ordinary and unconnected becoming part of some amazing pattern and we are opened up to the true wonders of life with all its beauty, wonder and amazing pattern. All we have to do is to look, be open to ideas, to see the world through eyes that are like a child who when they see something for themselves for the first time can be so excited. So as we begin a new year look for the patterns, the wonder and the joy that we can find around us, keep looking, listening and being amazed and excited about what 2016 may offer you and accept the opportunities that we are given.

Over the past two years, these volunteer-led events (14 of them) have been attended by 800 people and produced a surplus for hall funds of £2,000, helping to fund maintenance and new equipment, but it is evident that enthusiasm is waning and we need to take soundings within the local community as to why that is.

### **History of Peace Cottages**

Peace Cottages, the village alms-houses in West Street, were founded in 1899 by Mr Thomas Duncombe Eden who belonged to a wealthy, old North Country family but had been long acquainted with Hunton, being a cousin and son-in-law of Rev Robert Moore, who was rector of this parish for 63 years until his death in 1865. The intention of the founder was to "provide a home for aged and infirm persons members of the Church of England and inhabitants past and present of the Parish of Hunton who would otherwise be probably compelled to end their days in the Union Workhouse." (The Maidstone Union Workhouse was in Coxheath and would no doubt have been a frightening reality for the poorest members of the community.) Peace Cottages were described in his obituary as his "latest gift to Hunton" and although "his generous-hearted and open handed benevolence was experienced by many and known by few" it is mentioned that he also provided assistance to the Cheveney Institute, the Boys' Brigade and to beautify St Mary's Church. Mr Eden died at Cheveney in June 1899 at the age of 88 and was buried at Hunton church, his coffin being "borne to the graveside by the gardeners and others employed at Cheveney at their own request". As the cottages had just been completed it was considered touchingly appropriate that they should be formally opened on the day of his funeral by the Bishop of Wakefield, Dr George Rodney Eden, another cousin.

Thomas Eden was also a cousin of Mrs Emmeline Bethea Alexander, mother-in-law of Lt Colonel Arthur Close Borton, who owned Cheveney, and grandmother of Air Vice Marshall Amyas (Biffy) Eden Borton (after whom Borton class at the village school is named) and Lt Colonel Arthur (Bosky) Drummond Borton (who was awarded the VC for bravery in the first world war). In December 1899 Mrs Alexander conveyed the cottages to the Canterbury Diocesan Trustees and became the first administrative trustee of the charity. She also gave an endowment of £6,000, which was invested in stock with the dividends being used for the maintenance, upkeep and insurance of the cottages. Any excess was used for the benefit of the "inmates", who each received a weekly allowance and an additional allowance at Christmas (although the allowance ceased in 1954 following the introduction of the state pension). In addition a nurse to attend the poor of the parish and the inmates of Peace Cottages was employed and housed in one of the cottages.

There was a list of rules that the inmates were required to follow, which were displayed on the wall in each cottage and included:

- Each of the Inmates unless prevented by sickness is expected to attend Divine Worship every Sunday.
- No Inmate shall at any time make use of blasphemous, bitter or uncharitable words; nor shall any of them use personal violence to another.
- The inmates shall daily (except on Sundays) before 10 o'clock in the morning, sweep and clean the space before their respective dwellings, and the staircases and passages of the same.
- No Inmate shall remain out of his or her house during the night without previous leave being obtained from the Trustee.

Although the rules have no doubt changed over the years, and the "inmates" have become residents, the cottages are still held in trust by the Diocesan Trustees and managed by administrative trustees within the village.

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#### Speedwatch

The Hunton speedwatch team was out for three sessions during the last week of November as part of a countywide speedwatch action week. The team braved the rain, the high winds and the gesticulations from a mindless few as they tried to educate drivers to be more speed aware. Results were encouraging in one sense (we saw less of the 'high end' speeding we had seen earlier in the month) but not so in another (almost 6% of motorists still believe it is OK to drive past the school at around 40mph when the advisory speed limit is half that figure). The fastest speed recorded was 46mph and the driver made no attempt to slow down - indeed the sound of the car suggested that they sped up after they had passed us! This driver has since received a letter from the police for high-end speeding. Another driver that we recorded has received a letter from the police for speeding for a second time within a 12-month period. These letters are 'educational' in that they do not carry any driver penalties but persistent offenders can expect a visit from the police and sometimes the speedwatch team may be accompanied by police with speed guns, which will allow them to prosecute drivers. Speeding traffic was high on the list of things that Hunton residents do not like and we will be out again as often as we can in the New Year.
