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Parish Council Update

The meeting on Tuesday 15th March saw the last sitting of Hunton Parish Council in its present format as all seats are up for election on 5th May this year. Councillor Ron Porter has announced that he does not intend standing for reelection but all other councillors announced that they would be putting their names forward. It was noted that several other people had expressed an interest in joining the parish council so it is likely that there will, for the first time in many years, be a contested election for the 7 seats, which is encouraging and must bode well for the future.

It was reported that the new cricket pavilion was very close to completion and a grand opening is being planned for early May.

Following the closure of Hunton Hill for filling of a number of pot holes it was noted that Barn Hill and Upper Barn Hill had suffered some damage whilst in use as the diversionary route. This, and some large potholes in West Street in particular, have been reported to KCC Highways.

Speedwatch sessions are continuing and agreement has been reached with the Yalding speedwatch team to borrow their equipment to enable the monitoring of vehicle speeds in two directions, or indeed two locations, simultaneously. In closing the meeting a motion was passed to thank Ron for his efforts firstly as Parish Clerk and latterly as a parish councillor. Among the tributes he has received since announcing his retirement was this from KCC Highways: "Over the last few years the relationship between KCC and the parish has improved due to your commitment and understanding. We have often referred to the Hunton model of working together as good practice", and from Councillor Paulina Stockell, "We shall all miss you", a sentiment echoed by all his fellow parish councillors.

Community Warden

My name is Adam McKinley and I work for Kent County Council as a Kent Community Warden in the areas of Coxheath, Hunton, Linton, East Farleigh and West Farleigh. A community warden is a trusted friend in the community, listening to and encouraging vulnerable residents of all ages to resolve problems and enhance their quality of life. My role includes dealing with low-level crime and antisocial behaviour, such as vandalism, graffiti and fly tipping. I can help with neighbourhood disputes (noise, boundaries etc). I can help with parking issues but I must stress that I am not a traffic warden and I will only pass information to Maidstone Borough Council and cannot deal with the situation myself. I work with primary schools on safety in the community and doing lots of fun talks such as "stranger danger", road safety and internet safety. I am accredited to work with Kent Police and regularly meet with PCSO Matt Judges to discuss issues in the area. I have two powers:

Taking names and addresses for people over 18; and

Diverting traffic in an emergency situation

My background is in education and social care for young people. I personally love sports and community spirit and I can see from meeting people in the village that Hunton has that.

I have spent the last six weeks or so in a cancer ward. Not as some act of ministry or piety but because my wife, Alison is there, and will be for several more months. Her prognosis is good, with the aim a complete cure from the lymphoma that has attacked her bones. The damage to the bones means she is immobile at present, hence the long stay. It is an amazing and thought provoking place. The nursing staff are incredibly hard working and caring. The doctors communicate well and regularly and treat patients with respect and dignity. The complexity of the medical conditions and the consequent treatments is amazing and very impressive when you begin to understand how it all works (and I'm the kind of person who needs to know). Most thought provoking however, and cause of much reflection, are the other patients. Without breaking any confidences I would like to share some of their stories. Names are not real, but the people are.

Joan had been ill for a long time. She came in for yet another round of treatment. She was bright, intelligent, a driving force in her family and her business, and a delight to talk to. Everything organised and in its place. One day, it all went wrong, and she began a downward spiral very quickly. She decided that she had had enough and after consultation with the family, she withdrew treatment. She died a few days later, at peace and comfortable, with her family around her.

Chloe had been in for two months after admission because her local hospital was closed. Her family had miles to travel to see her but they came as often as they could. She was a positive, cheery force in the ward who just wanted to get her treatment sorted so she could go home. She went home with a smile.

Janet was a mum, whose teenage daughters, mother and sisters visited almost every day. They laughed a lot, and kissed a lot. Sometimes they laughed at the silly things Janet said because her brain tumour made her confused. They laughed together and with each other, never once demeaning or without love in the laughter. Janet died, peacefully and with her family around her.

The attitudes of these people with whom deep but short term relationships have formed in an alien environment have mostly been inspiring. Several other people have come and gone – either home or sadly passed on. Their approach to a time when their lives are ending has been almost universally one of peace tinged with the immense sadness of those around them. In getting to know them, I have learned a little of their own faith – for some it was strong, and for others tenuous at best.

In this season of Easter we rejoice in the resurrection of Christ and all that means to us. Jesus said that he came so that we can have life in all its fullness (John 10:10) and that he brings hope eternal (John 3:16). I've witnessed both in spades these past few weeks.

Other cultures and countries such as France, Brazil, Turkey, South Africa, Greece, Poland and Lithuania were represented. Pupils sampled traditional foods, sang songs, danced, wrote postcards and prayed in different languages. The day ended with a lovely assembly where the children were able to showcase what they had learnt.



History of Sissinghurst

The WI had a real treat at the March meeting with Stephen Harmer speaking on the history of Sissinghurst. Stephen gave a very lively, informative and amusing account of the history and the life and times of Vita and Harold Sackville-West/Nicolson and, more recently, the role of the NT at Sissinghurst. The famous tower was originally built to watch Elizabethan hunts in the extensive grounds and was used as a look out in WW2. Vita was very much a hands on gardener and worked to Harold's formal design to create an Arts and Crafts garden with many separate 'rooms'. She was influenced by other gardeners and by gardens she had seen, especially in Italy. Their unusual lifestyle, which included living in several different buildings around the grounds, meant they were always walking around the gardens, so her attention to detail was constant. Despite 30 years of work, Vita never thought the garden was finished. After her death in 1962, the NT took over and made some modifications to the planting, with the approval of her son, Nigel, to accommodate the high number of visitors.

All agreed this was one of the best so far and are now looking forward to the meeting on 5th April when Paul Ledger with dog Yorick will be enlightening us on Hearing Dogs for Deaf People. As always, new members and guests are welcome to come along to this friendly group.

Discontinuation of Saturday Freighter Service

Maidstone Borough Council has announced that the Saturday Freighter Service, which collects household waste from pick-up points around the borough, is to be discontinued. Due to the introduction of more environmentally friendly ways to dispose of the borough's rubbish, such as the kerbside recycling and garden waste services, the number of people using it has fallen dramatically. The last collection for Hunton will be on Saturday 16th April from 1.40pm-2.10pm in the village hall car park.

Book Group Review – The Tiger's Wife by Tea Obreht

Tea Obreht's first novel, *The Tiger's Wife*, contains elements of magical realism, family drama, and war narrative. Set in contemporary Yugoslavia but featuring many passages set in the past, the novel forms a tapestry of people and events as it sets out to capture the personality of an entire region. The narrator is Natalia Stefanovic, a young doctor who has grown up in an unnamed Yugoslavian city with her mother and grandparents. Whilst on an aid mission Natalia learns that her grandfather has died from cancer. Natalia begins to recall the stories her grandfather told her over the years, many involving the remote village where he grew up and two supernatural characters, the tiger's wife and the deathless man.

Few of us read the whole book but here are one member's thoughts:

"This book was an enjoyable read with some parts of it compelling and intriguing. I was fascinated to see how it would all come together with everything slotting into place, but this is where I thought the book failed. It did keep me hooked until the last page, but there was no resolution. For me this made the read unsatisfactory. My score out of ten is six."

Scams on the Rise – Huntonwatch Reports

Recent spells of bad weather have resulted, almost predictably, in a spate of scams by people looking to take advantage of us when we are most vulnerable. Common themes include "you have loose tiles on your roof which must be fixed - let me have a look for you". "I see your fences are damaged, I can fix them for you at a very reasonable rate" - you get the idea. Our advice is simple. If you are approached by anyone offering to do some work, do NOT agree without checking them out first. These people will take your money and if they actually do the job (even if it is not necessary in the first place) the workmanship is likely to be poor. If you need repairs carried out, approach companies who have been recommended to you, or who are listed in Checkatrade or have 'WHICH' accreditation. If you think you may have fallen for a scam, or you are unhappy about work done for you, then contacting the Trading Standards Office is a good place to start.

There has also been an increase in financial scams. Themes here are alleged "overpayment of council tax", "criminal use of your account", and "checks on details because of a systems upgrade at the bank or other financial organisation". In all cases the scammers at some point seek to get you to reveal your PIN and password. Barclays Bank is running an advertising campaign on TV at the moment to alert you to this type of fraud. Be aware - banks, building societies and police will NEVER ask you for a full PIN or password. If you receive one of these calls then take a note of the number and let us know.

Although crime in Hunton remains low there was a theft of some material from the village hall car park. Unfortunately for the culprits they were unaware of the security cameras and we have been able to pass significant information to the police.

We continue to see a steady trickle of new members with three more households joining since the turn of the year. We provide regular updates via the Hunton Herald.
