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# **HGVs and Road Safety Discussed at Parish Council Meeting**

Around 40 local residents attended the parish council meeting on 20<sup>th</sup> September where increased HGVs and the safety of Hunton's roads were on the agenda, an issue brought sharply into focus the previous week when one of many concrete mixing lorries travelling to Amsbury Farm recently, crashed into the entrance of Hunton school. As Clive Baxter, the owner of Amsbury Farm, was in attendance much of the discussion surrounded the current activities and recent expansion at the farm.

Mr Baxter explained that due to rising wage costs he needed a robotic grader, which would cut the number of staff required. A farmers' cooperative, Fruition PO Ltd, had invested in the machinery and he had financed the extension to house it. He had leased his packing and storage operation to Fruition, who would be packing and storing his fruit and fruit from other local growers. To comply with insurance requirements they had concreted over the yard and added some extensions, laying half an acre of concrete in total. The crash at the school had been an unfortunate incident, which was caused by the driver of the lorry sneezing violently and losing control.

Cllr Tony Stanbridgae expressed local residents concerns about the increasing number of HGVs on village roads and the problems this caused. The largest amounts of these were from Fruition at Amsbury Farm. He understood that they were not only servicing local farms, but were also importing fruit. Amsbury Farm had become a distribution centre. Residents had heard that there could be large increases in traffic but didn't know the truth. This raised serious concerns about road safety and increased road damage. There needed to be a traffic management plan in place to protect the community.

Cllr Annette Trought asked Mr Baxter to quantify the number of HGV movements a day but Mr Baxter was unable to provide this information. He did say that due to increased cropping rates there would be an increase in traffic. When pressed further about current traffic volumes he said that he could give this information but not during harvest. He conceded that signage was a problem but it was difficult to improve as he didn't own the land on East Street leading up to his farm.

Concerns were also raised about inconsistencies in Amsbury Farm's planning applications and adjustments to buildings

#### **Pastoral Letter**

November has become the traditional time for remembrance with All Souls, All Saints Day and Remembrance Sunday in the month. This is also the month in which, with the issuing of the Christmas stamps, for the last 50 years my thoughts turn to my Christmas letter and the events of the past year. Ever since I got married, 50 years ago this year, this has become a regular yearly event and I get down the calendar and look back over the year. It's always an interesting time. This year has turned up one interesting fact. I have four grandchildren and the eldest has just gone to university, the next to secondary school, the third to kindergarten and the youngest to preschool. To quote a certain Prime Minister of the past, 'Education, education, education and education! But there are other events/happenings that are recorded. Not all happy memories but in the main the memories are good. As I reflect on the year I remember an email I received about some good news that someone wanted to share and it ended with the words "God is good!" Looking at the events of the year could I actually say 'God is good' to some of the events? My answer was "no". Ought we to be considering God as being "good" or "bad"? We know that God wants the best for us and in that sense he is "good". But ought we to look on God in that way? If we do then aren't we on the road to disappointment when the news isn't good? 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not in accordance with approved plans. Borough ClIr Brian Mortimer mentioned the application recently submitted to determine whether prior approval was needed to build the extension to house the mechanical grader under the rules of permitted development. It stated that there would be "no impact on the existing vehicle movements". It did not mention that the packing and storage facilities were being leased to Fruition, something which might constitute a change of use, and did not include the newly laid adjacent areas of concrete hard-standing for which there didn't appear to be consent. He felt that a proper planning application should be submitted so the council could make an informed decision and could look at whether a traffic management plan was needed.

Mr Baxter said that nothing had changed; he had been packing and storing other people's fruit for a long time. Cllr Stanbridge responded that the nature of the business may not have changed, but the scale had and nothing had been done to manage the increasing traffic. Mr Baxter said that there had been no increase in operations and activity to date and offered to speak to Fruition to arrange for the parish council to visit.

A local resident commented that he found the large number of Clockhouse Farm vehicles to be more of a problem and more dangerous than the HGVs going to Amsbury Farm.
