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# **Wares Farm Planning Application**

A formal planning application has now been submitted for the expansion of the Wares Farm industrial site in Redwall Lane. The proposal is to build a new storage, packing and distribution facility on the Southern side of Redwall Lane for the use of Berry Gardens Ltd, the company that currently occupies the main part of the current site. The company is expanding rapidly and expects to double its workforce to over 900 employees. The existing buildings will be retained and it is envisaged that they will be let as small light industrial units. The main direct impact on Hunton appears to be an expected increase in traffic through the village. Whilst the application includes some proposals to help mitigate the impact of increased traffic movements at the Redwall Lane / Linton Hill junction and at the Linton Crossroads, there seems to be little consideration of Hunton other than signage to route HGVs towards the A229 when leaving the site. The application can be viewed on the Maidstone Borough Council website, planning application number 16/508659/FULL. There are over 60 documents, which you may not wish to plough through, but the "Planning Statement" gives a summary of the proposal. If you wish to express your view of the development to MBC this can be done in writing, via email or via the planning portal on the website.

I recently visited a friend who has moved from London to Greatstone. She is now coming to terms with having a mile and a half round trip to the nearest post box, learning how the council deal with refuse/recycling and not having a major shopping centre on the doorstep. She is thrilled to be able to walk the dog on the beach each day, the better air quality that is improving her health, getting to recognise birds in the garden and the thrill of hearing the RHD railway as it crosses the end of the road. She is also trying to learn some of the history of "The Marsh" which makes it special.

What she does not like is the number of cars delivering and collecting children from school. Parents block the road, despite a huge school car park; they will not give way to residents trying to get home and some arrive an hour before school ends then sit waiting with the engine running blowing fumes across the school car park. Nationally tests have shown that the most polluted air in a community is often around the school. I wonder how many parents actually need the car for the school pick up? We know from our own schools that some children live too far away to walk but others live within a reasonable distance. #### January Parish Council Meeting Roundup

**Police** - PCSO Megan Day had responded to the questions asked at the last meeting about the two traffic incidents in West Street. With regard to the concrete mixing lorry that hit the school barrier, Megan understands that this was not dealt with at the time as it should have been. One report of this was called in from a receptionist at the school; the information passed to the police was that the lorry had hit the barrier due to parked cars and could a PCSO and a Warden attend for advice about parking restrictions. As a result of this information the call was not seen as immediate and therefore no police officers attended. The incident where the two parked cars were written off was seen as a civil case as there were no injuries. The driver causing the accident exchanged insurance details and there was no proof that he was speeding, so there was no further action to take.

Megan has now moved on from our area. Her role is being covered by a PCSO from another area until a new permanent PCSO can be appointed.

**Playing Field** - The committee is looking at new play equipment and exploring possible funding opportunities. The contract for litter bin emptying has been changed from MBC to a private company at a quarter of the previous cost.

**Village Hall** - The number of weddings held in the hall this year will be capped at 16 with priority given to 10 community events. New roman blinds will be purchased to replace the ageing curtains.

**Footpaths** - The Water Lane footbridge over the Beult, which has been closed for some time as the wooden supports are rotten, is due to be replaced in the summer by Public Rights of Way (PROW). A resident had raised the problem of accessing footpaths with large dogs when there are stiles. Cllr David Heaton said that stiles do not have to be dog accessible but that PROW encourage their replacement with gates, which they will supply to landowners for £25.

Roads - Cllr Jonathan Goddard had asked Kent Highways to review the positioning of the current 7.5t weight limit on East Street to ensure that it is operating correctly and stopping HGVs from using the village roads inappropriately. KCC advised that the cost of any adjustments would be around £2,000 and there was no money available for it. He also asked about traffic calming outside the school, but again there was no money available. The parish council is to look into alternative means of funding. Cllr Goddard has signed up to the Lorry Watch scheme and it is hoped to run this in conjunction with Speedwatch.

#### **The French Connection**

Plans are afoot for Hunton to host a visit from representatives of Montauban De Picardie, a village in the Somme area of northern France, with the possibility of exploring a formal twinning. Maidstone has connections with Montauban going back to the early 1920s, and as the village is of a similar size and nature to Hunton, with a church, village hall and some great countryside around it, Borough Councillor Brian Mortimer felt that Hunton would be the ideal place to host the visit. The history of the connection with Maidstone is explained in this extract from a book written by Brian:

"After the devastation of the First World War, northern France was no more than a land of rubble, mud and a nation that in parts did not have even the basic utilities that we all take for granted today. Towns and villages that included churches, schools, homes, town halls electric and water supplies were all gone. In 1920 a charitable organisation named "The British League of Help" was set up with a single purpose to provide aid to the communities of northern France devastated by the Great War. Almost 100 British towns took on the challenge to adopt their chosen "Godchild". It was usual to select the town or village for adoption where British service men and women from their town had been involved in a significant military operation. Maidstone adopted Montauban De Picardie mainly because the Royal West Kent Regiment, who were raised in Maidstone, fought in and around Montauban in the first week of the "Battle of the Somme" and where many Kentish men were laid to rest in local cemeteries."

As a result, over £20,000 was raised by public subscription, an enormous sum in the 1920s, which provided a water tower for fresh water, electricity for the first time and even enough money to allow children from the village to come to Maidstone and Kent for a month's holiday.

In the run up to the centenary of the beginning of the First World War, Brian was instrumental in re-establishing contact with Montauban and on August 20<sup>th</sup> 2014 representatives from Maidstone went over to the village where they were "met royally with flags a-flying by Montauban's mayor of 38 years standing, M. Gilbert Froment…councillors and other members of the local population."

Plans for the return visit are very much in their infancy, but it is hoped that it can be arranged for later this year possibly in April.

#### **Festive Family Fun**

It was wonderful to see so many families out together enjoying the entertainment in the village over the festive period. Avanti & Artizani: 6 Impossible Things played to a full house at the village hall on 29<sup>th</sup> December, taking the audience on a thoroughly entertaining journey of bizarre twists and turns, culminating in the unexpected appearance of a 10 feet tall lobster called Maureen! It was also a busy night for the karaoke at the village club on New Years Eve with lots of new faces. Vocalists of all ages sang their way through hits spanning six decades including some crowd-pleasing numbers that had the whole room joining in. To quote someone who had only been along to listen before but decided to sing this time, "I would never have put us down as karaoke sort of people but they really are fun at the club!" The next karaoke evening will be on Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> March, so put the date in your diary now.
