



Concerns Raised Over Wares Farm Development

Plans for the major expansion of the Wares Farm industrial site in Redwall Lane was the main agenda item at a recent meeting of the parish council's planning committee. Berry Gardens Ltd, the current occupant of the majority of the existing site owned by Alan Firmin Ltd, is seeking to build a large new packing and storage facility together with offices to facilitate the rapid expansion of its business. This would be situated on agricultural land on the south side of the road opposite the existing site with their current premises leased out as small industrial units. Berry Gardens is a large supplier of soft fruit to major supermarkets with the Redwall Lane site packing for Clockhouse Farm in Coxheath, although around 85% of the fruit currently packed at this site is imported. Although the site is situated just over the Hunton boundary in Linton, it was discussed due to the potential significant impact on the village.

A number of residents attended the meeting, concerned largely that a substantial increase in traffic would have a serious negative impact on Hunton's very narrow roads, particularly Redwall Lane, George Street and East Street, making them extremely hazardous for all road users as well as causing further damage to the roads, verges and private property. They were also concerned by the potential for an increase in lost or misdirected HGVs travelling through the village, which would further exacerbate the situation.

The planning application projects that the development would result in an additional 762 one way car movements, 244 one way van/LGV movements and 92 one way HGV movements per day with up to 30% of car and van movements expected to access the site from the Hunton end of Redwall Lane. Although the application states that all HGVs will route through Linton crossroads, councillors and residents alike felt that it was naïve to assume that they would always take that route as Hunton already has issues with HGVs travelling through its narrow lanes in contravention of the 7.5

Pastoral Letter

Well, what a tumultuous start to 2017 we have seen in the political world. President Donald Trump is just a few weeks into his term of office as I write this, and whatever your political views, there is much controversy surrounding his style of leadership. I follow him on Twitter (@realDonaldTrump and now @POTUS President Of The United States) and it is fascinating to get notification of his latest pronouncement even before it hits the news headlines on the BBC or other sources. The modern world of social media has transformed the way we learn about the world around us, and has created the concepts of “fake news” and “alternative facts”. When sources for news are not checked or verified anybody with a blog or a Twitter account or a Facebook page can publish something that is not real, and before you know it, it has a life of its own and is being understood as the truth.

The Oxford Dictionary word of 2016 was announced as “post-truth” – an adjective defined as “relating to or denoting circumstances in which objective facts are less influential in shaping public opinion than appeals to emotion and personal belief”. They comment that the concept of post-truth has been in existence for the past decade, but there has been a spike in frequency this past year in the context of the EU referendum in the United Kingdom and the presidential election in the United States.

What is truth? Bible accounts tell us that an accused Jesus stood before Pilate on trumped up (no pun intended) charges of insurrection. Pilate interrogated him in response to words Jesus just had uttered. “For this purpose I have come into the world—to bear witness to the truth” (John 18:37b).

When Jesus says, “I am the way, the truth, and the life,” he primarily means two things. First, in a negative sense, he means that his followers are not the truth. So, whenever Christians make truth claims, we need to speak them with a sense of humility. We are not the truth. We don’t hold the truth. Second, and in a positive sense, Jesus means that the truth is like him – nonviolent love. If we truly follow Jesus, we don’t find ourselves primarily attempting to defeat our opponents, but attempting to reconcile with them.

Paul wrote that we can possess all the truth about the mysteries and knowledge of the world, but if we don’t have love we are like a clanging cymbal (1 Corinthians 13). Unlike our post-truth world that emphasizes emotions, biblical love is not an emotion. It’s an action. Love is a verb. It seeks the best for ourselves and for others, including those we call our enemies.

Be blessed during this season of Lent and take time to ponder on the truth of God’s love for the whole world.

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tonne weight limits and should Linton Hill be blocked for any reason, it is inevitable that Hunton Hill would be used as an alternative.

The council agreed that the roads through the village are totally unsuitable for an increase in traffic of this kind and that the negative impact of increased vehicle movements would also be experienced on the wider road network, particularly through the Linton crossroads, the Loose Road and Maidstone town centre, all of which are already heavily congested. Although the application includes suggested improvements to the operation of the Linton crossroads, it is understood that KCC Highways currently have no plans to improve the junction.

Councillors were also concerned at the loss of a large area of open countryside and that the development would not integrate into the local landscape, and felt that as 85% of the fruit would be imported with HGVs travelling to and from the site via the M2 and M20, it made much more sense to site the development significantly closer to the motorway network. Overall it was agreed that the proposed development would inflict significant harm on the immediate area, the surrounding villages and Maidstone town and that the parish council would write to the Maidstone Borough Council planning department expressing their objections.

Parish Council Precept

Councillors agreed that the parish precept for 2017/18 should remain the same as last year at £25,000, which is equivalent to an annual charge of £79.19 for a Band D property.

Hunton Village Club Chairman – Job Description

This role is a part time, voluntary position, involving approximately five hours of time per month.

Hunton Village Club is a small, members social club comprising of approximately 180 members. The club owns its own premises, which are also used by the local community for various functions. There are no employees, with the day-to-day operations being carried out by volunteers.

The chairman is to ensure the club operates in a sustainable manner to the benefit of its members and as a communal facility to Hunton village. Responsible for:

- The operations of the club in accordance with legal requirements and the club rules.

- The Management Committee comprising of club officers (secretary and treasurer), committee members and two trustees

- Chairing monthly meetings of the Management Committee.

- Delegation of tasks to the Management Committee.

- Receiving reports from time to time from the club's officers and committee members.

- Financial administration to avoid annual losses.

- Health and safety of volunteers, members and visitors.

- Ensuring the building and facilities are maintained in a good state of repair and are fit for purpose.

- Adequate property, public and third party liability insurance being in place at all times.

- Chairing the Annual General Meeting and providing a report to the members at same.

This position requires an individual with leadership qualities, a basic knowledge of small business operation, being a strong communicator, imaginative and innovative.

Spot on WI

The speakers at our February meeting, David and Sue Heaton, are well known to many members and so are their wonderful pork products! They set up "Spot on Produce" in response to their concerns of what we are all eating, aiming to produce high quality, local, rare breed pork. After purchasing 10 acres of agricultural land in Hunton in 2010, they chose Gloucester Old Spot pigs as they are quite docile and do not dig too much! There are only 184 breeders of Gloucester Old Spot pigs in the country with a total of 416 sows. Their boar (Gerry) is one of only 20 of his breed line, so Hunton is making a contribution to the preservation of this rare breed. Although David had a background in agriculture, Sue had never met a pig until she attended a pig course in Sussex! Photos and videos of the farm showed very happy pigs and cute piglets enjoying wallowing in mud, playing in straw and dozing in the sun. Gerry, a real character at 350kg still likes having his tummy tickled. David gave an amusing and quite explicit account of their limited success with artificial insemination - Gerry is now more reliable! Spot On Produce has branched out into producing lamb as well, with a flock of around 40 pedigree Southdown sheep, with 24 ewes due to lamb in about 6 weeks' time.

Our March WI meeting will be on the subject of buttons by Alison Ellman-Brown, postponed from January. Doors open at the Village Club at 7.15pm on 7th March, coffee and cake will be served and new members are welcome.

Salad and Supper

Over 30 members gathered at the village club on 17th February for a Gardening Club supper and a talk by Andrew Howe, the Technical and Quality Manager at Laurence J Betts Limited. Laurence Betts farms salad crops in Kent including the fields around Hunton church and the village hall; in total they produce 22 million heads of lettuce and 1400 tons of baby leaf salads per year. Andrew explained their process from preparation of the ground through planting and irrigation to harvest. Their large customers include Tesco and McDonalds but also 40% is sold as their own brand. In the winter they import from Spain and Italy to maintain continuity of supply. Members thanked Andrew for a fascinating insight into the workings of a local agricultural producer as well as those that helped Lesley Lee supply another excellent supper. Members were reminded that contributions to the plant and produce stall for the village fete on 17th June would be most welcome.
