Pastoral Letter

I'm writing this pastoral letter after returning from a weekend singing with a choir in both of the Liverpool cathedrals. The Roman Catholic Metropolitan Cathedral is modern, round and has some stunning artwork. The Anglican Cathedral is the biggest in the country. It is huge! It also has some beautiful artwork. Cathedrals have long been supporters of the arts - sculpture; painting; tapestry; music; and stained glass. At the moment there is a wooden and iron sculpture called *The Outraged Christ* in the Anglican Cathedral. It shows a Christ who looks as if he is about to leap off of the cross. His mouth is open and he is angry at the injustice. It is challenging. What injustices might Jesus be angry about today?

I also saw a Titian painting, *Supper at Emmaus*, in the Walker Gallery in Liverpool. It shows the moment when, after walking alongside two disciples from Jerusalem to Emmaus without them realising that it was Jesus who walked with them, he was invited to share a meal and at the moment he broke bread they suddenly recognized him. One disciple, on the right of the picture, is in a worshipful pose – he has seen Jesus. The one to the left is shown in a posture of surprise. It is hard to know why they didn't recognise him earlier but they had seen Jesus die on the cross three days earlier. They weren't expecting to see him; they were grieving and may not even have given him a second glance.

We don't know what Jesus looked like; we have no photographs or images from that time. If he was unrecognisable by people who had known him he could turn up anywhere and not be recognised. Could he be the homeless person that you passed by recently and that I passed in Liverpool? Could he be an asylum seeker? Could he be a hungry child in the Yemen? Could he be a lonely old man that lives along your road? The answer is yes, he could.

"For I was hungry and you gave me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave me something to drink, I was a stranger and you invited me in, I needed clothes and you clothed me, I was ill and you looked after me ... whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers and sisters of mine, you did for me." Matthew 25 v 35, 36, 40.

Doing nothing is not an option. Christian discipleship is not easy!

Flood Resilience

As you may be aware the Environment Agency has undertaken research into what can be done to prevent a repeat of the floods of 2013 and 2000. Modelling of flood prevention schemes such as flood storage areas on the Beult and the Teise, and the raising of the height of the Leigh barrier on the Medway were carried out. Unfortunately for a number of reasons the former two were deemed to be not practicable. MBC commissioned its own consultants to look at the various schemes and have more or less agreed with the EA. What the EA are proposing to carry out is the "Middle Medway Flood Resilience Scheme". Councillor Heaton attended one of the meetings to launch this scheme. Residents of properties who are thought to be at risk of a one in twenty year flood (or one in twenty risk per year) will have the opportunity for a feasibility survey to see whether they are suitable for property level resilience schemes. If this is thought not practicable, phase two will look at whether community level resilience is an option (localised walls and embankments for example). The EA aims to have an exhibition of these proposals at Yalding, Marden and Collier Street on the 9th, 10th and 11th June, where questions can be put to EA staff.

Members of the Parish Council attend the Joint Parishes Flood Group, which the EA recognise as the local forum for flood related matters. If you have any questions please contact Councillors Gary Thomas and David Heaton initially.

Working Parties

In the past few months the club has needed to replace the central heating boiler, install a new oil tank and carry out extensive roof insulation, replacement and repair. These major repairs obviously required hiring professional tradesmen, cost £20,000 and have severely drained the club's finances. However, there are a number of smaller tasks that still need doing and the committee believes that they can be carried out by volunteers on the basis that "many hands make light work". Two working parties will take place on 8th and 15th July from 10am to undertake the following jobs:

- Cellar room – ceiling and wall cleaning
- Toilets – damp wall cleaning / replace skirting boards
- Store room – general cleaning and tidying
- Front door – wood preserve
- Front, rear and sides weeding
- Painting sink bar flap

Please come along and help on one or both days – with a good turn out of volunteers it should not take long.

Management Committee

The committee currently comprises of the Chairman (Phil Nichols), Treasurer (Lisa Halliday), nine committee members and two Trustees (Roger Crooks and Peter Day). Phil Nichols is also acting secretary and after 12 years on the committee is stepping down, although will remain an active volunteer. In order to maintain the Club Premises Licence to retail alcohol it is essential that the club has a full Management Team to include a Chairman and Secretary. The roles are not particularly onerous as with the committee's help the functions are autonomous. West Street Closure

Road surface improvement work is scheduled to be carried out on West Street between the junctions with East Street and Mill Lane (but not including the section in front of the school between Bensted Close and Bishops Lane). The works will start on **Wednesday 31st May for three days** and will be completed after the weekend on **Monday 5th June**. Working hours will be between **7am and 7pm**. During the works it will be necessary to close the road completely for the safety of both the workforce and road users. The diversion route will be via Hunton Hill, Upper Hunton Hill, Heath Road, Ewell Lane, Smith's Hill, Yalding Hill and Vicarage Road (and vice versa).
