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## **Annual Village Meeting**

The Annual Village Meeting on 22<sup>nd</sup> May was well attended, helped along by a free buffet supper and a revamped format. The early part of the meeting saw reports from the police, community warden, borough and county councillors, and the parish council. This was followed by a newly introduced question and answer session which prompted some interesting discussion on subjects including planning consent for buildings listed before 1932, the progress of flood prevention measures on the Beult and the resurfacing of Hunton Hill. However, much of this session was dominated by the planning application for the Wares Farm development in Redwall Lane. As Maidstone Borough Council will be responsible for determining the application with KCC Highways being a major consultee, it was helpful to have two of our borough councillors, Emily Fermor and Richard Webb, and our county councillor, Paulina Stockell on hand to respond to the points raised.

The main concern of residents was the increase in HGVs and other traffic that the site would generate. Cllr Fermor confirmed that the application would go before MBC's Planning Committee, with KCC deciding if they were happy with the highways situation or not, but that it would be difficult for the committee to reject it, particularly if KCC did not object on highways grounds. A resident said that they got the feeling that the application would be approved despite the many objections and they could not understand why that was the case. Cllr Webb explained that the planning committee must follow planning policies when making their decision and can only turn it down on certain grounds. If KCC did not object it could still be turned down for other reasons, on environmental grounds for example.

It was commented that it made no sense to site the development so far from the motorway when around 80% of fruit packed by Berry Gardens is imported. Cllr David Heaton, who was chairing the meeting in Cllr Gary Thomas' absence, said that Berry Gardens was just the tenant and that Firmins own the site. From what he had heard Berry Gardens might not end up using the entire site and that Firmins were looking for a distribution centre for their own business.

Another resident asked if there was anything else that the people in Hunton could do to put more pressure on, to which Cllrs Fermor, Webb and Stockell suggested lobbying the members of the planning committee and KCC Highways, and perhaps putting a petition together. Suggestions from other residents included inviting the Director of Highways to a meeting, perhaps in conjunction with Linton Parish Council, to discuss how they arrive at their recommendations on the application, and joining with other parishes to employ a specialist consultant to look at highways issues.

Following an interval for a delicious supper kindly organised by Lesley and Roger Lee, village clubs and organisations gave reports on their activities over the last year, copies of which can be found on the Hunton website.

#### **Pastoral Letter**

I am writing this on the day after the General Election, which saw a major change in the balance of seats in the UK Parliament. It was quite a surprise to all of us — expert and novice alike — and reflects and echoes the turbulent and unpredictable political landscape here and elsewhere in the world. As Christians, the Bible encourages us to take an active role in society, and to be a force for social transformation, so the old adage of not mixing religion and politics really doesn't apply. I work very hard to keep party politics out of the pulpit (and my Twitter and Facebook feeds) but take a keen interest in what is going on in the political world. Christians in Politics is an all-party, non-denominational organisation which seeks to encourage and inspire Christians to get involved in politics and public life. I recommend them as a source of balanced information, who give a good account of how politics and faith can — indeed must — go hand in hand.

We are exhorted to pray for our political leaders and the Archbishop of Canterbury writes today, "I encourage all Christians, and people of all faiths and no faith, to hold our political leaders in their thoughts and prayers at this time. My prayer is that they may know the love and presence of God, made known through Jesus Christ, as they continue their discussions and prepare to take on the weighty responsibility of leadership."

Whatever your reaction to the result of the election, I want to remind us that in these uncertain and unpredictable times, there is an unchangeable truth that nothing can separate us from the love of God through Jesus Christ and that we can put our faith in him. Hebrews 11 verse 1 says this, "Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see." As we work together to find the best way forward for our nation, let us put our faith and trust in God, and allow him to inspire us to do all we can to make the world a better place.

It was riveting!

Our third activity was teaching us what we needed in life, we had 16 cards and we had to pick 12 cards of what we needed. Then we had to get rid of 4, it was very challenging! At the end we had to do a presentation of what cards we got. Our last activity was a fascinating tour around The Spike and we got to learn a bunch of new things!

#### **Gardening Club Visits Allington Castle**

Gardening club members, relations and friends visited Allington Castle on 6<sup>th</sup> June for a fascinating and informative guided tour of the castle and gardens. The original medieval moated castle was built in the 12<sup>th</sup> century by the banks of the Medway and at one time was owned by Sir Thomas Wyatt who hosted Henry VIII and Anne Boleyn. After a period of dereliction, it has been gradually restored by several owners since 1905 and is currently the residence of Sir Robert and Lady Worcester. Sir Robert is an American who founded MORI polls. We were shown around many parts of the castle including the Great Hall, where we had afternoon tea. The gardens are set in 42 acres of grounds but are maintained beautifully by just three gardeners! We saw many features such as lily ponds, nut walks, rose gardens and a lavender walk. Unfortunately the castle is not open to the public but is available for weddings and as a film location. We are very grateful to Edna Dennison who organised this special tour over a year ago.

#### **Lorrywatch Volunteers Wanted**

Hunton Parish Council is actively looking for volunteers to help record details of HGVs that pass through Hunton's weight limit zones. The data that is gathered is passed to the Freight Officer at Kent County Council. If HGVs are seen twice in the village then the company concerned is contacted and in some instances fines are issued. Volunteers need only commit to two or three hours, with each session being one hour. Volunteers carry out sessions in pairs and the appropriate guidance on safety will be provided. We hope to be able to operate at least two sessions per month depending on the number of volunteers. We are all aware of the increasing levels of HGV traffic in Hunton and any help to record and potentially reduce this traffic would be hugely appreciated. #### Arts and Crafts Gardens

The WI's June meeting was open to non-members and the speaker was Stephen Harmer who gave a fascinating talk on the development of gardens over the last 150 years, illustrated by some beautiful slides. Arts and Crafts gardens are the quintessential English garden, taking inspiration from nature and landscape but also embracing many overseas influences. The Victorians reacted against Capability Brown's "boring" landscapes with a hotchpotch of formal, artificial gardens using lots of bedding plants. The Arts and Crafts Movement was vehemently against annual bedding and produced designs inspired by the Italian Renaissance with hard landscaping and symmetry but everything softened by perennials. Their gardens aspired to carefully controlled views into the countryside often framed by "windows". They drew up a long list of rules for gardens which included: surrounding the house, a sports lawn, strong hedges to obscure parts of the garden, use of local building materials, gnarled fruit trees, pergolas, formal pools, pots and urns and many other requirements. Unfortunately they also wanted new and unusual plants and imported Japanese knotweed and giant hogweed!

The movement declined after WW1, when there was insufficient manpower for the upkeep of these large gardens. Since then, there has not been a definitive style of garden design, although many members could identify elements of Arts and Crafts in their own gardens.
