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Green Light for Wares Farm Development

Maidstone Borough Council's Planning Committee has given the go ahead for the construction of a huge packing, storage and distribution centre at Wares Farm on Redwall Lane. At their meeting on 6th July they approved the application by Alan Firmin Ltd and Berry Gardens, which had been recommended for approval by the planning department, despite strong objections from both Hunton and Linton Parish Councils and numerous local residents. Hunton Parish Council Chairman Gary Thomas, and Borough Councillors Emily Fermor and Richard Webb were amongst those who addressed the meeting and spoke eloquently against the development. Cllr Fermor said that there was a growing feeling amongst residents that they were not being listened to and urged the planning committee to demonstrate that they "don't just represent residents who are most well connected, know how to work the system better or write the biggest cheques".

Around 65 Hunton and Linton residents had written to the borough council expressing their concerns about issues including harm to the countryside, noise and the impact on wildlife, but the common theme in virtually all of the objections was the large increase in traffic on a totally unsuitable road network. Kent Highways did not object to the application subject to a number of conditions including measures to prevent HGVs from turning left towards Hunton when leaving the site, an HGV routeing agreement, improvements to the junction of Redwall Lane with the A229, and the applicant giving a piece of land and a financial contribution towards improvements to the Linton crossroads (although it is very unclear as to whether KCC have any plans to implement the crossroad improvements in the foreseeable future). They did state that they were not entirely happy with the impact on the road network to the west of the site (which includes Hunton) but that the impact could not be deemed to be severe so they could not object on this basis.

As Kent Highways had not objected, the Chairman of the Planning Committee, Cllr Clive English, refused to allow members to waste time discussing the traffic and road safety implications and directed them to only weigh the harm to the landscape against the economic benefits, the lack of alternative sites within the borough and the proposed ecological enhancement. Despite some strong opposition from a small number of committee members, the application was approved by 9 votes to 4.

Hunton Parish Council went on to consider the decision at it's meeting on 17th July, where there was frustration expressed at the planning system in general, the conduct of the meeting and a general feeling that the Chairman of the Planning Committee had been out of order in not allowing members to speak about highways issues nor allow any objection on these grounds. Borough Councillor Brian Mortimer advised that unfortunately there was no right of appeal for third parties against a planning decision and that the only possibility would be to request a judicial review, which would be hugely expensive for the parish council and may well not succeed. A representative from Hunton Parish Council would be included on the Delivery and Monitoring Committee that was going to be set up to oversee the development, which would give the council the opportunity to push for traffic mitigation measures should they prove necessary.

This month I relinquish my duties as Lay Reader! Obviously there will be a few regrets, but life is a journey through which we must move with thought and prayer. New demands come our way, and we should be ready for them. I believe that the Rector is empowered to call upon my services on an occasional basis if he so wishes: so you may not entirely have seen the last of me!!

this year we raised approximately £900 net. This money will go into the Fete and Village Events Fund, which ensures that we can afford to put on next year's fete and build up funds that we can use to purchase items to support village events.

July Parish Council Meeting in Brief

Police – Four crimes were reported in the village between 4th May and 13th July: a burglary on East Street, theft of a motor vehicle on Hilltop, an attempted burglary on Redwall Lane and theft of a statue on Lughorse Lane.

Community Warden – Adam McKinley is now working closely with GP surgeries in Coxheath and Yalding to help local residents with issues such as getting a lifeline, help with benefits (young and old), care, gaining access to groups and general support. He is helping two clients in Hunton referred by Yalding Surgery. He is trying to arrange a surgery with the PCSO on local issues.

Playing Field – The low post and rail fence by the car park is to be replaced with a two rail fence and gate. The multiplay equipment is to be refurbished and grant applications are being pursued with a view to purchasing a nest swing and replacing the safety surface under the play equipment.

Village Hall – Hiring of the hall for teen parties is to be limited to villagers. The insurance claim for the replacement of the hot water tank has been approved.

Village Club – Two working parties have taken place to tidy up and carry out routine maintenance. The hedge at the front has been cut back. No one has come forward to take over the role of Chairman, which is a major problem.

Lorry Watch – A number of monitoring sessions have taken place on East Street recently. A new volunteer has come forward.

Speedwatch – Unavailability of members for personal reasons has meant that the group is struggling to get out with any regularity. The group is also without a coordinator since Steve Wyles and Helen Ward have both had to step down due to other commitments.

Traffic and Road Safety – Councillors agreed to form a working party to consider in detail what can be done to tackle the traffic problems and road safety issues around the village.
